KEYNOTE SPEAKERS



< DR. KEITH DELAPLANE,

MBE, PhD, is Professor of Entomology, Walter B. Hill Fellow, and Honey Bee Program Director at the University of Georgia. He has a long association with honey bees, beginning when his father bought him a beginner's kit when he was 13. Dr. Delaplane has authored, co-authored, or edited more than 200 publications, books and research articles on honey bees.

KAMON REYNOLDS >

has been keeping bees in north central Tennessee for 20 years. He is the co-founder of Hive Life, one of North America's largest bee conferences, and the founder of Tennessee's Bees, which specializes in quality bee genetics, pure Tennessee honey, and honey bee education. With his wife Laurel, Reynolds keeps 300+ hives, and has filmed hundreds of educational videos to help new and veteran beekeepers around the world keep bees successfully.



< DR. JEFF HARRIS is a university beekeeping extension specialist at Mississippi State University. He has more than 50 years of experience with bees that includes commercial queen rearing, package bee sales, and commercial honey production. After receiving his doctoral degree from LSU, he spent more than 15 years in research at USDA-ARS in Baton Rouge, where he bred honey bees for resistance to varroa mites. His current duties include extension, teaching, and research.

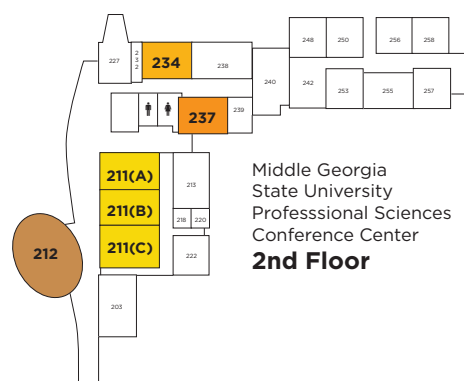
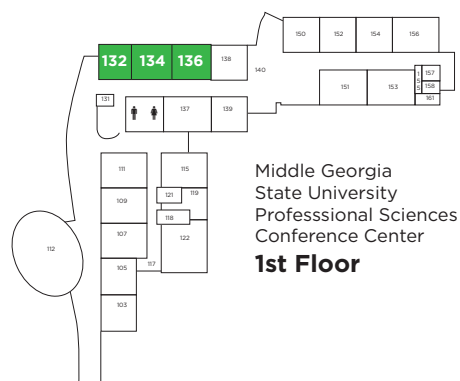

NUCS: A HIDDEN RESOURCE FOR THE BACKYARD BEEKEEPER

– “Nucs” are small honey bee colonies housed in small hives. This talk will cover how to make and manage a nucleus hive in your apiary to help you better prepare for swarm control, re-queening, selling bees, and more.

MARY LACKSEN is a Georgia Master Beekeeper and started beekeeping in 2008. She and her daughter operate BeeCo Apiaries (beecoapiaries.com) located in Sparta, Georgia, and sell nucleus hives, packages, queens, and honey.

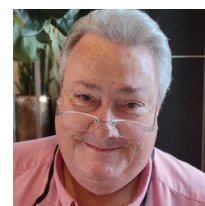


ROOM 211 ABC (MAIN MEETING ROOM)
