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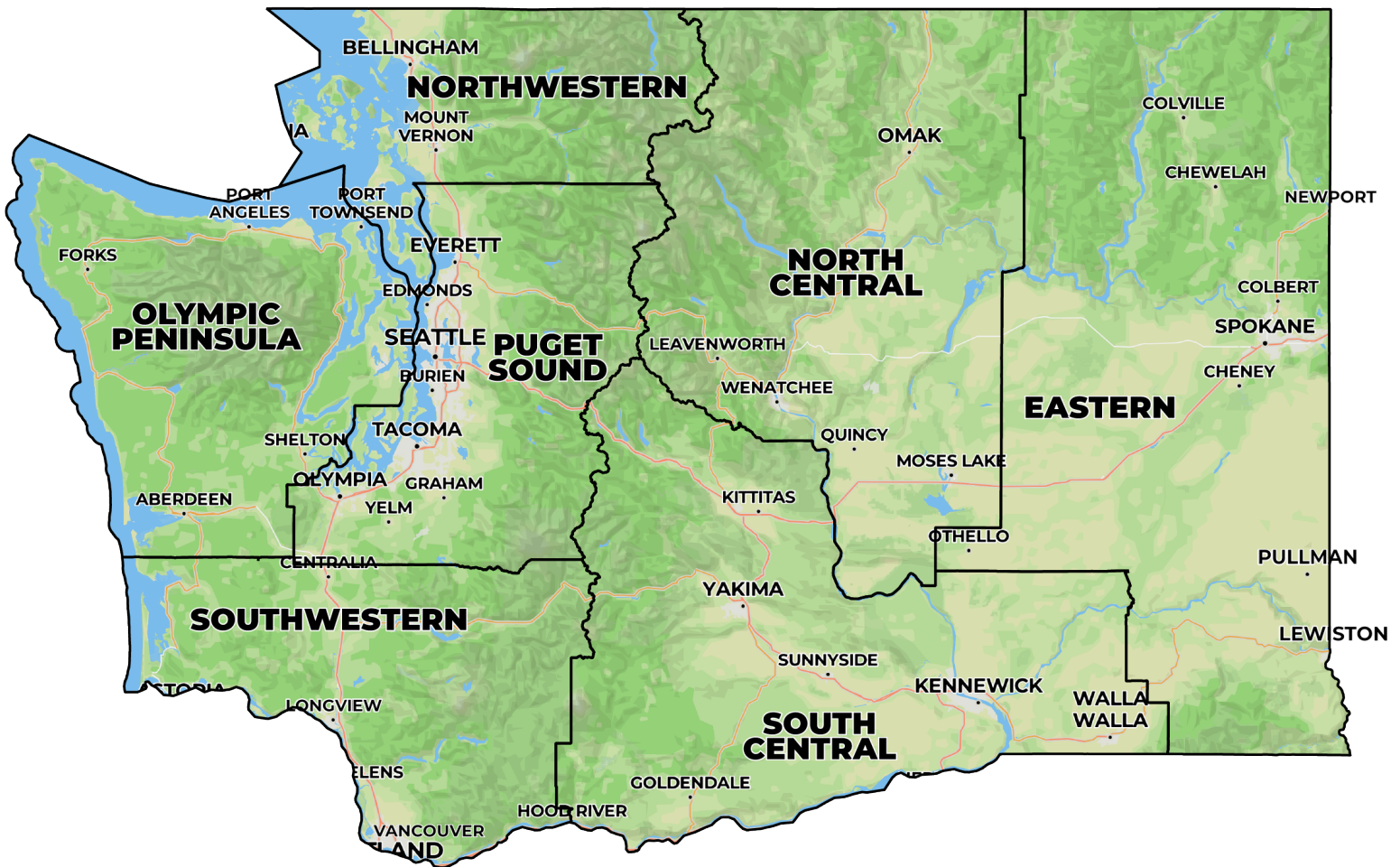

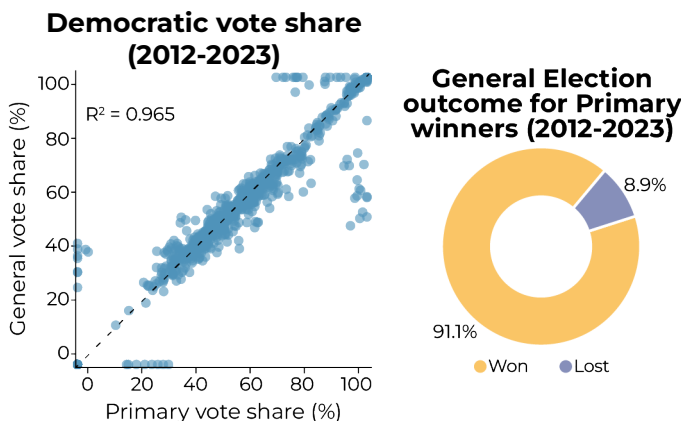
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# Washington State

## Introduction

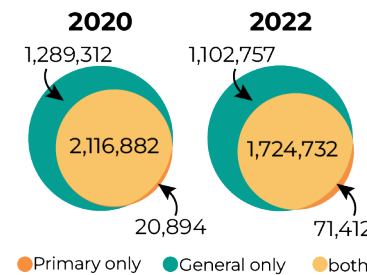
Washington State's Primary Elections are a useful barometer for understanding voter sentiment and enthusiasm, both locally and nationally. Since Washington has an open Primary Election, all candidates appear on the same ballot and the top two advance to the General Election, regardless of party. While Washington State has become a reliably blue state – supporting Democratic candidates by ~12% more than the rest of the nation – the precise margin between Democratic and Republican candidates for Congress can be used to infer Democratic enthusiasm nationwide. In the 2024 Primary Election, Washington voters supported Democratic candidates for Congress by a 16% margin, larger than the margins in 2020 (+14%) or 2022 (+8.5%), suggesting modest increases in voter enthusiasm for Democratic candidates, at least in statewide and national races.

Washington's Primary is also highly predictive of General Election outcomes. From 2012-2023, the vote share for Democratic candidates across all jurisdictions and offices in the Primary Election significantly and positively correlated with their vote share in the General Election. The Democratic vote share from the Primary to the General differed by <5% in 90% of races, and <1% in 62% of races. Moreover, 91% of candidates who finished first in the Primary Election went on to win in the General Election.

As a vote-by-mail state with same-day registration, voting in Washington State is considerably easier than most other states. All registered voters are mailed a ballot and voter guide ~2-3 weeks before Election Day, and voters can return their ballots via the mail or in one of 600 dropboxes spread throughout the state. Voters are also not required to register with a party to participate in the Primary, removing partisan barriers to voting. Turnout in the Primary – when there are comparatively few barriers to voting, relative to other states – can be used both to gauge voter enthusiasm, and to get a sense of what turnout in the General may be.

In recent years, the vast majority of Washingtonians who vote in the Primary also vote in the General – 99% in 2020 and 97% in 2022 – so who votes in August can be viewed as a starting point for November's electorate. Importantly, considerable turnout gaps by age and

race were present throughout Washington in the 2024 Primary, so a General electorate that is representative of the entire state will require concerted, intentional outreach to historically less-engaged voters – particularly young voters and voters of color. Otherwise, older, whiter voters will continue to have an outsized influence over electoral outcomes in Washington State.

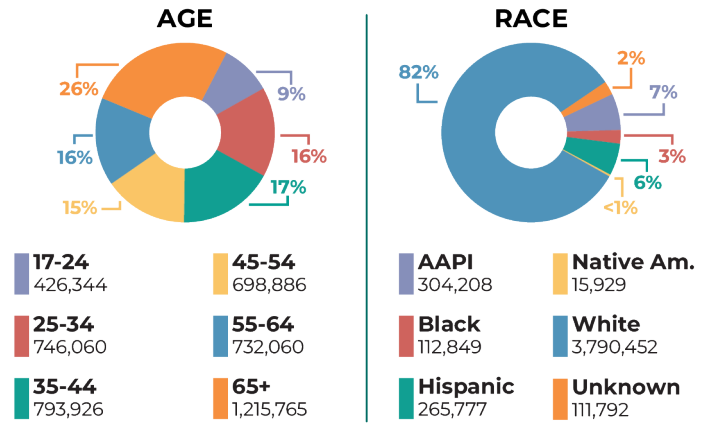
In this chapter, we dive into the demographics of Washington State's electorate in 2024, present voter turnout statistics for specific demographic groups in the 2024 Primary Election, give a brief overview of voter outreach work done by WCA Data Hub partners ahead of the 2024 Primary Election, and dig into results for statewide races that were on the ballot. In the following chapters, we break down the electorate, turnout, and results for specific congressional districts (Chapter 2), legislative districts (Chapter 3), and individual regions of Washington state (Chapters 4-10).

# Washington's electorate

Washington's electorate currently includes 4,874,877 registered voters, including 84,728 people who registered to vote in the first 6 months of 2024. Older voters remain the largest share of Washington's electorate: voters over the age of 64 comprise 26% of the electorate, followed by 35-44 year olds (17%) and 25-34 year olds (16%). 17-24 year olds make up the smallest share of the electorate (9%), but are the fastest growing segment of the electorate. Notably, 17 year olds are eligible to vote in Washington's Primary Election if they will turn 18 before November's General Election; in some parts of the state, turnout of 17-24 years old surpassed turnout of 25-34 year olds, indicating unusual enthusiasm among the youngest segment of the electorate.

Washington's electorate is more than 80% White, with voters of color – including Asian American and Pacific Islander (AAPI), Black, Hispanic, and Native American voters – accounting for just 18% of all registered voters. However, the proportion of people of color in the electorate varies considerably by age group: voters of color comprise just 9.2% of the electorate over the age of 65, but 26.4% of the electorate under the age of 35. Newly registered voters in Washington are also more racially diverse compared to the overall electorate, with people of color accounting for more than two-thirds of new voters in 2024.

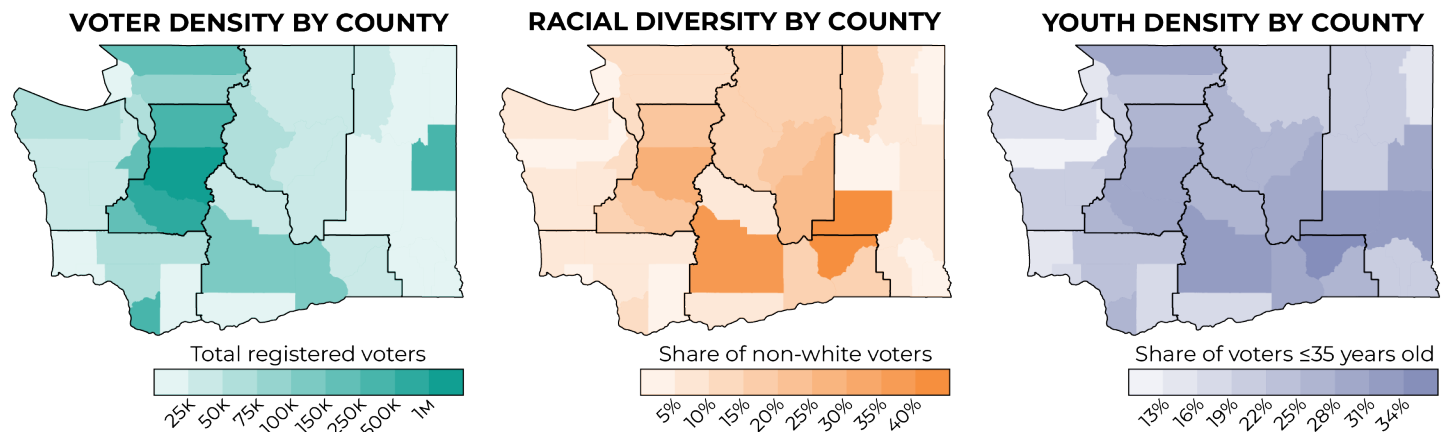
From the rolling hills of the Palouse in Eastern WA to the Cascades in Central WA and the lush forests on the Olympic Peninsula, Washington is an incredibly diverse state topographically. Accordingly, the composition of Washington's electorate varies widely across different

regions. The majority of all registered voters live in the Puget Sound (55%), with another 24% elsewhere in Western Washington (Northwest = 6.7%, Olympic Peninsula = 7.6%, Southwest = 10.2%) and just 21% east of the Cascades (North Central = 3.2%, South Central = 8.0%, Eastern = 9.8%).

This geographic divide is only deepening with newly registered voters: nearly 57% live in the Puget Sound, 25% live elsewhere in Western Washington (Northwest = 5.9%, Olympic Peninsula = 7.2%, Southwest = 12.1%), and fewer than 18% live east of the Cascades (North Central = 2.6%, South Central = 7.1%, Eastern = 8.3%). The growth in Washington's electorate is being driven by young voters and voters of color independent of region: young voters account for more than 60% of new voters in every region (60.7% to 69.9%), and voters of color account for more than 50% of new voters in every region (51.2% to 65.9%).



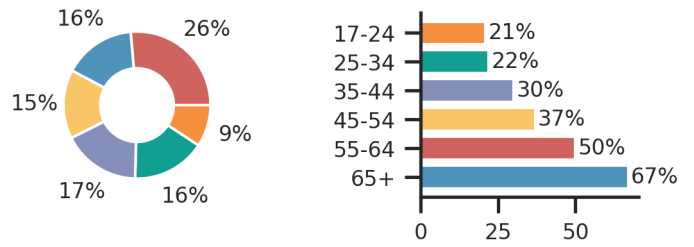
**Fig 1.4 | Geographic distribution of Washington's 2024 Primary electorate.** Left: total registered voters by county; center, non-White share of each county's electorate; right: share of each county's electorate under the age of 36 years old.

# Voter turnout

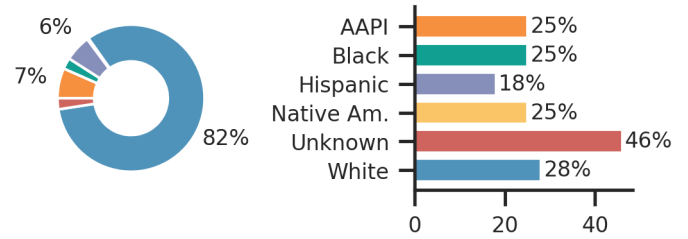
2,015,612 voters cast ballots in Washington's 2024 Primary Election – including 86,399 voters who were not on Washington's voter file in late July, indicative of a surge in new voter registrations. Although the vast majority of ballots (98.8%) were accepted, nearly 10,000 ballots were rejected because of signature issues (6,346 returned with a signature that did not match the signature on file, 2,775 returned without a signature) and 15,009 ballots were rejected because they were received too late (after the 8pm deadline on August 6th).

Statewide voter turnout in the 2024 Primary Election (41.8%) was 1.4% higher than the 2022 Primary Election and 12.6% lower than the 2020 General Election. As in most U.S. elections, turnout increased across ages and was higher for White voters than voters of color. Despite comprising similar segments of the electorate, turnout of voters 65 and older was more than triple that of voters 25-34. In fact, voters 65 and older cast more than 42% of all ballots in the 2024 Primary Election, while voters 35 and under cast just 13% of all ballots. Turnout of White voters was ~1.8x higher than that of AAPI, Black, and Native American voters, and

## REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY AGE

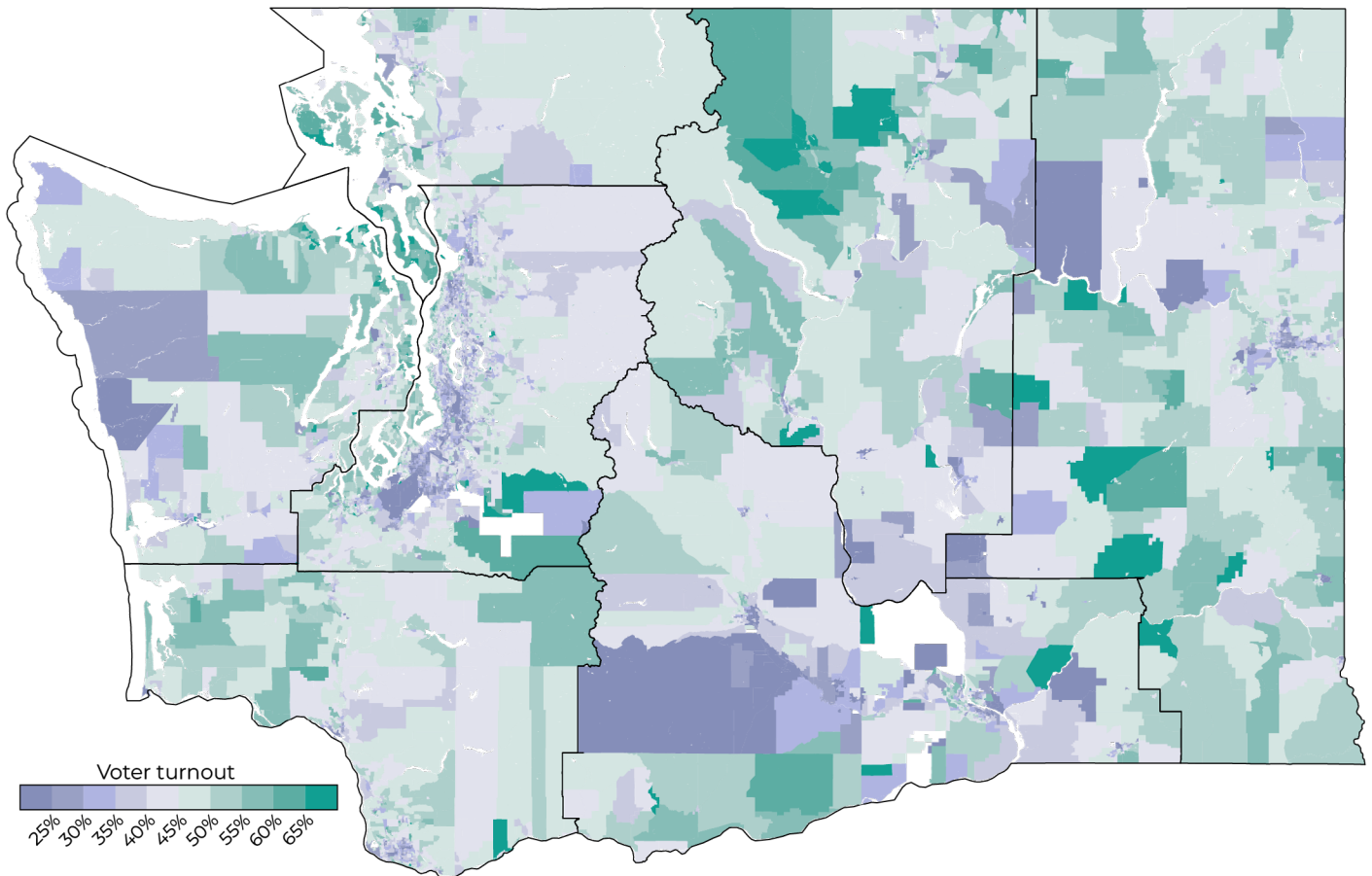


## REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY RACE



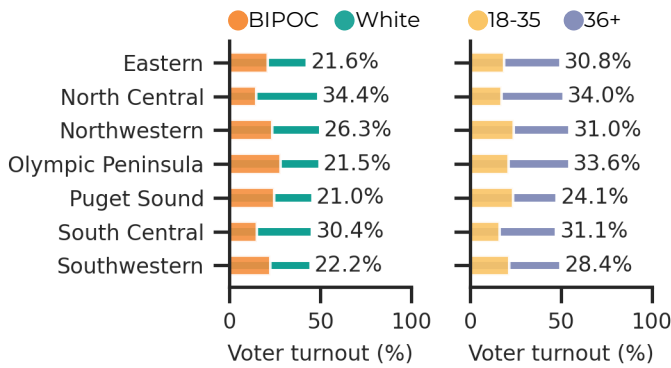
**Fig 1.5 | Voter turnout in the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout.

~2.5x higher than that of Hispanic voters, regardless of age. While stark, these turnout disparities are relatively common: the electorate that votes in Washington's Primary tends to be considerably older and whiter than

the electorate that shows up in the General – though whether or not young voters and voters of color actually vote in November will depend considerably on outreach from campaigns and trusted community messengers.

The turnout gap by race (White voters vs voters of color) was high in North Central WA and South Central WA – despite those regions having relatively large Hispanic populations – and low in Eastern WA and the Olympic Peninsula – regions with relatively few voters of color. Conversely, the turnout gap by age was highest in parts of the state with few numbers of young voters – the Olympic Peninsula and North Central WA. The exception to these patterns was the Puget Sound, which has the highest density of both voters of color and young voters in the state, and had the lowest turnout gaps by race and by age.

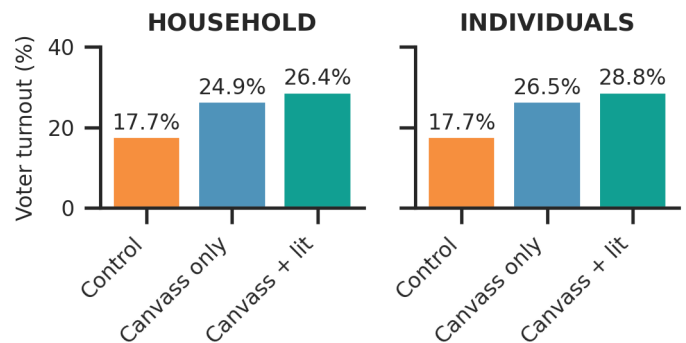
Overall, voter turnout was highest in the Olympic Peninsula (47.5%) and Northwestern WA (47.1%) and lowest in South Central WA (38.2%) and the Puget Sound (40.9%). This is similar to past elections in Washington, and intuitive based on demographic differences in turnout: counties with electorates that are majority White – such as San Juan and Jefferson – had the highest turnout in the state (56.8% and 58.6%, respectively), while counties with more racially-diverse electorates – such as Adams, Franklin, and Yakima – had the lowest turnout in the state (32.3%, 33%, and 34.2%, respectively). Moreover, turnout was comparatively lower in cities than in rural parts of the state, consistent with similar trends in recent elections.

## Voter outreach

A key piece of our work at Washington Community Alliance's Data Hub is supporting our network of more than 70 community-based organizations with their civic engagement work throughout the year, including voter registration, legislative advocacy, voter education, and

get-out-the-vote (GOTV) programs. From June 1st through mid-August, 14 of our Data Hub partners were actively engaged in voter outreach work. Together, these partners made 466,262 unique voter contact attempts and reached a total of 266,705 voters. This included 49,857 door knocks, 195,423 phone calls, 26,672 text messages, and 194,310 mailers and postcards. Notably, the contact rate – the percentage of outreach attempts that led to an actual interaction with a voter – varied across contact methods: phone calls had the highest contact rate at 32.4%, followed by door knocks at 17.9% and text messages at just 0.4%.

This year, Washington CAN partnered with Dr. Maricruz Osorio (Bentley College) and Dr. Stephanie DeMora (Stony Brook University) to replicate an experiment (Davenport et al., 2010) that investigated the additive effects of leaving behind information about individuals' voting history after canvassing on turnout. This experiment followed a similar design, and focused on households in Seattle's City Council District 2. Households were randomly assigned to one of three groups: a control group (no canvassing), a "canvass-only" group (traditional canvassing), or a "canvass + lit" group (traditional canvassing, plus a leave-behind copy of their vote history). Among voters who were successfully contacted, turnout of those in the "canvass-only" group was 7.21% higher than the control group, while turnout of those in the "canvass + lit" group was 8.72% higher than the control group. These effects persist after accounting for differences in who was contacted vs not home (4.84% and 7.86%). Moreover, focusing solely on the individuals who were canvassed (instead of entire households), these effects become even more pronounced (+8.77% for "canvass-only" and +11.06% for "canvass + lit"). Together, these data highlight the power of in-person canvassing on turnout of infrequent voters, and show how canvassing can have a carryover effect onto other voters in canvassed households.



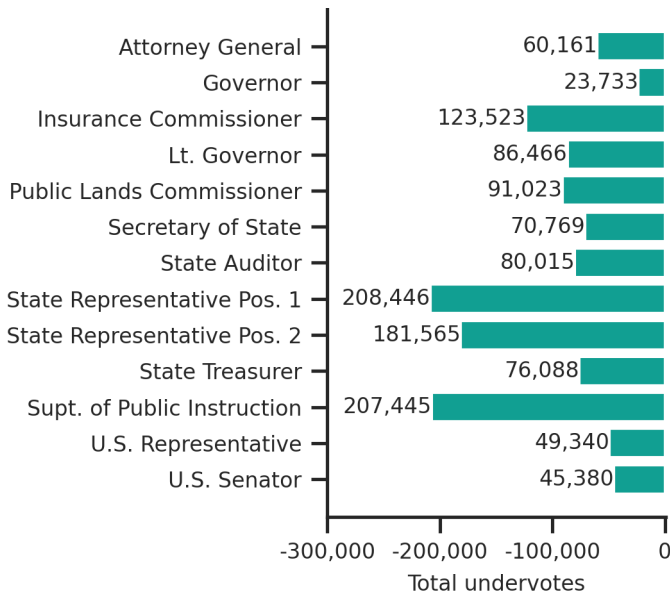
**Fig 1.8 | Effect of WA CAN's canvassing on turnout in the 2024 Primary Election.** Values show overall turnout by group, separated for (left) entire households and (right) individuals who were directly canvassed.

# Election results

Voters in Washington cast ballots in ten statewide races in the 2024 Primary Election, including a U.S. Senate race and open races for Governor, Attorney General, Commissioner of Public Lands, Insurance Commissioner, and State Auditor. In each race, the top two candidates with the most votes will advance to the 2024 General Election. For all graphs showing election results, bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and incumbents are indicated with an asterisk.

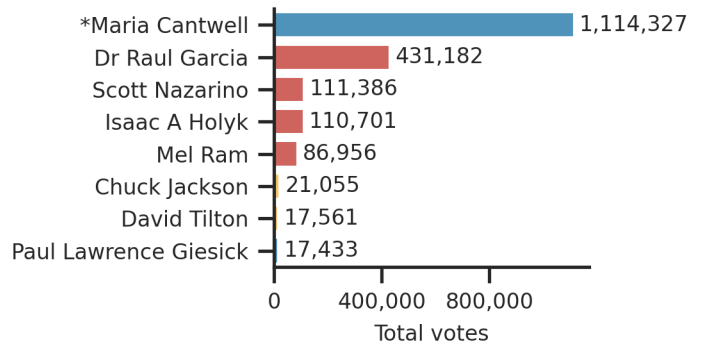
Although 1,994,096 total votes were counted in the 2024 Primary, the actual vote total for all statewide races fell short of that number. This phenomenon – in which voters cast a ballot but leave some races blank – is known as undervoting, and it varies considerably by jurisdiction and office. In the 2024 Primary, undervoting was higher for down-ballot races, for positions that are less well-known, and for races with many candidates from the same party. Undervoting was lowest for the Governor's race (23,733) and for federal races (U.S. Representative = 49,340, U.S. Senator = 45,380), and highest for the nonpartisan statewide Superintendent of Public Instruction race (207,445) and for state legislative races (State Rep. Pos. 1 = 208,446, State Rep. Pos. 2 = 181,565). Across all races, undervoting in the 2024 Primary was ~100,300 votes per race, or 5% of all votes cast – comparable to undervoting in the 2020 Primary Election (5.1%) and the 2022 Primary Election (5.0%).

## UNDERVOTES BY OFFICE



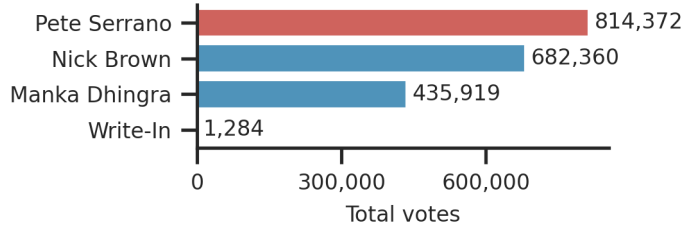
**Fig 1.9 | Undervotes in the the 2024 Primary Election varied by office, ranging from 23k to 208k.** Undervotes are calculated as the total ballots cast minus the total votes cast for a given office, indicating how many voters left that race blank.

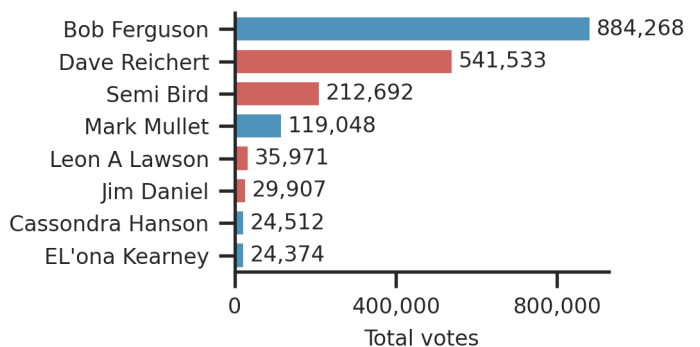
Incumbent Maria Cantwell (D) finished first in the race for U.S. Senator with 57.2% of the vote, followed by Dr. Raul Garcia (R) with 22.1%, Scott Nazarino (R) with 5.7%, Isaac A Holyk (R) with 5.7%, Mel Ram (R) with 4.5%, Chuck Jackson (I) with 1.1%, David Tilton (I) with 0.9%, and Paul Lawrence Giesick (D) with 0.9%.

## ATTORNEY GENERAL



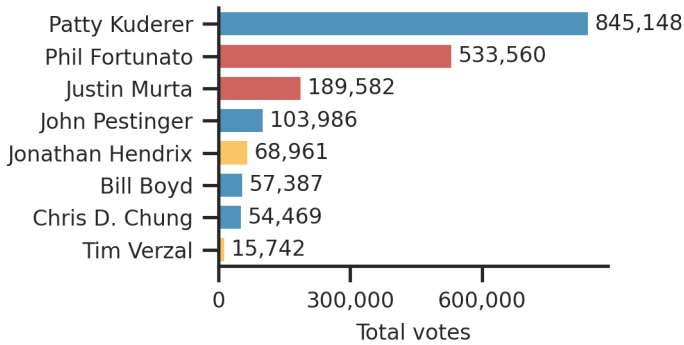
Pete Serrano (R) finished first in the race for Attorney General with 42.1% of the vote, followed by Nick Brown (D) with 35.3% and Manka Dhingra (D) with 22.5%.

## GOVERNOR



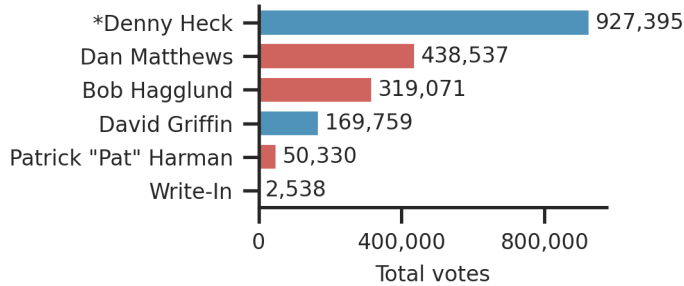
Bob Ferguson (D) finished first in the race for Governor with 44.9% of the vote, followed by Dave Reichert (R) with 27.5%, Semi Bird (R) with 10.8%, Mark Mullet (D) with 6.0%, Leon A Lawson (R) with 1.8%, Jim Daniel (R) with 1.5%, Cassandra Magdalene Hanson (D) with 1.2%, and EL'ona Kearney (D) with 1.2%. All other candidates received <1%.

### INSURANCE COMMISSIONER



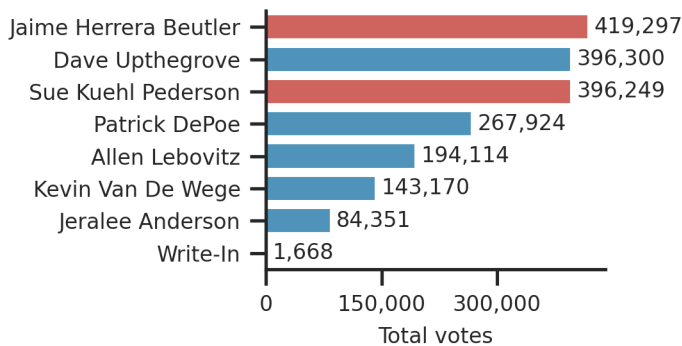
Patty Kuderer (D) finished first in the race for Insurance Commissioner with 45.2% of the vote, followed by Phil Fortunato (R) with 28.5%, Justin Murta (R) with 10.1%, John Pestinger (D) with 5.6%, Jonathan Hendrix (I) with 3.7%, Bill Boyd (D) with 3.1%, Chris D. Chung (D) with 2.9%, and Tim Verzal (I) with 0.8%.

### LT. GOVERNOR



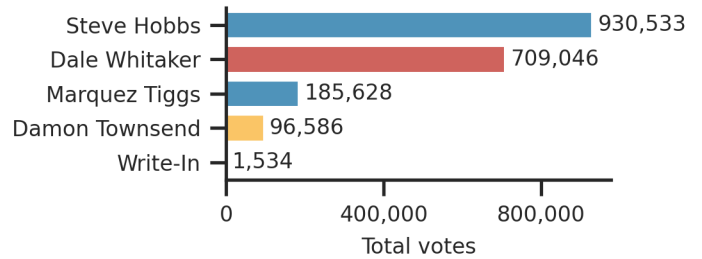
Incumbent Denny Heck (D) finished first in the race for Lieutenant Governor with 48.6% of the vote, followed by Dan Matthews (R) with 23.0%, Bob Hagglund (R) with 16.7%, David Griffin (D) with 8.9%, and Patrick "Pat" Harman (R) with 2.6%.

### PUBLIC LANDS COMMISSIONER



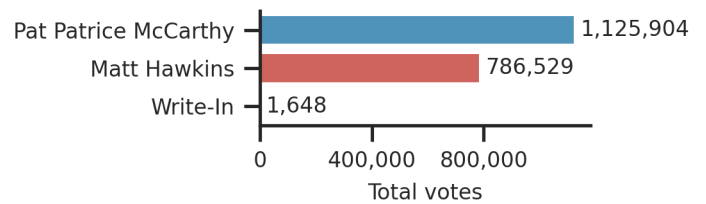
Jaime Herrera Beutler (R) finished first in the race for Public Lands Commissioner with 22.0% of the vote, followed by Dave Upthegrove (D) with 20.8%, Sue Kuehl Pederson (R) with 20.8%, Patrick DePoe (D) with 14.1%, Allen Lebovitz (D) with 10.2%, Kevin Van De Wege (D) with 7.5%, and Jeralee Anderson (D) with 4.4%. As of August 28th, a hand recount was underway to confirm the votes.

### SECRETARY OF STATE



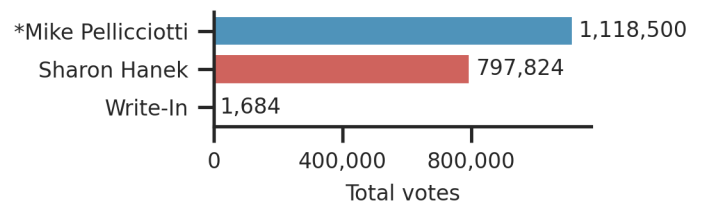
Incumbent Steve Hobbs (D) finished first in the race for Secretary of State with 48.4% of the vote, followed by Dale Whitaker (R) with 36.9%, Marquez Tiggs (D) with 9.7%, and Damon Townsend (I) with 5.0%.

### STATE AUDITOR



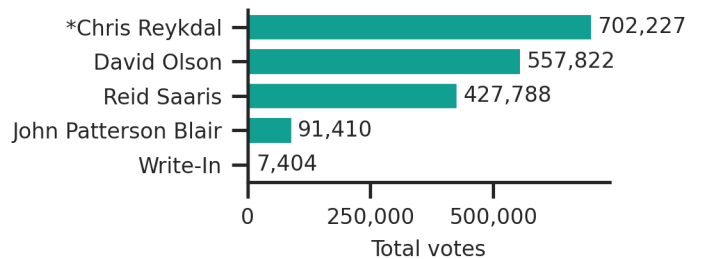
Pat Patrice McCarthy (D) finished first in the race for State Auditor with 58.8% of the vote, followed by Matt Hawkins (R) with 41.1%.

### STATE TREASURER



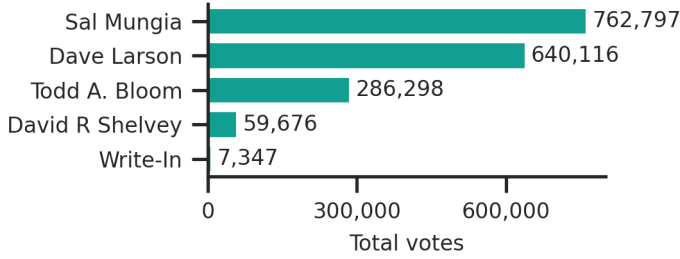
Incumbent Mike Pellicciotti (D) finished first in the race for State Treasurer with 58.3% of the vote, followed by Sharon Hanek (R) with 41.6%.

Incumbent Chris Reykdal finished first in the race for Superintendent of Public Instruction with 39.3% of the vote, followed by David Olson with 31.2%, Reid Saaris with 23.9%, and John Patterson Blair with 5.1%.

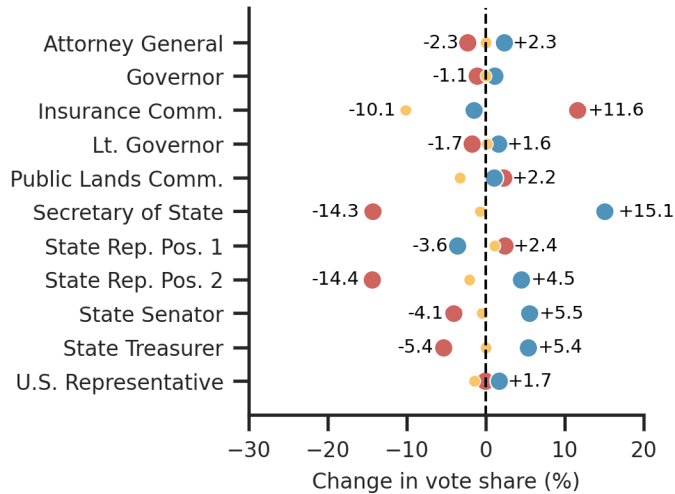

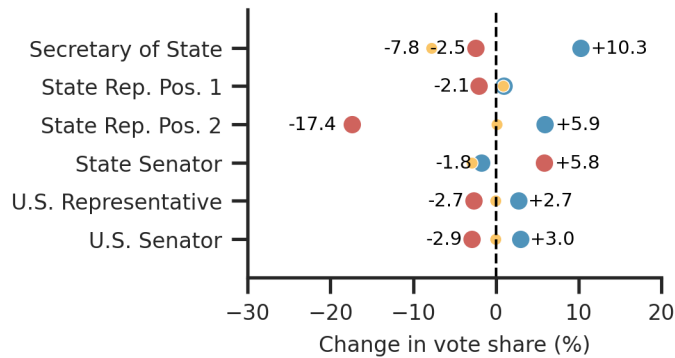
Sal Mungia finished first in the race for Supreme Court Justice Pos. 2 with 43.4% of the vote, followed by Dave Larson with 36.5%, Todd A. Bloom with 16.3%, and David R Shelvey with 3.4%.

Statewide, Democratic candidates for state legislative, congressional, and state executive offices received an average of 15.8% more votes than Republican candidates (57.1% vs. 41.3%), a 4% increase from the 2020 Primary Election (54.3% vs. 42.6%) and a 5.8% increase from the 2022 Primary Election (52.8% vs. 42.8%). ### VOTE SWING, 2020 to 2024

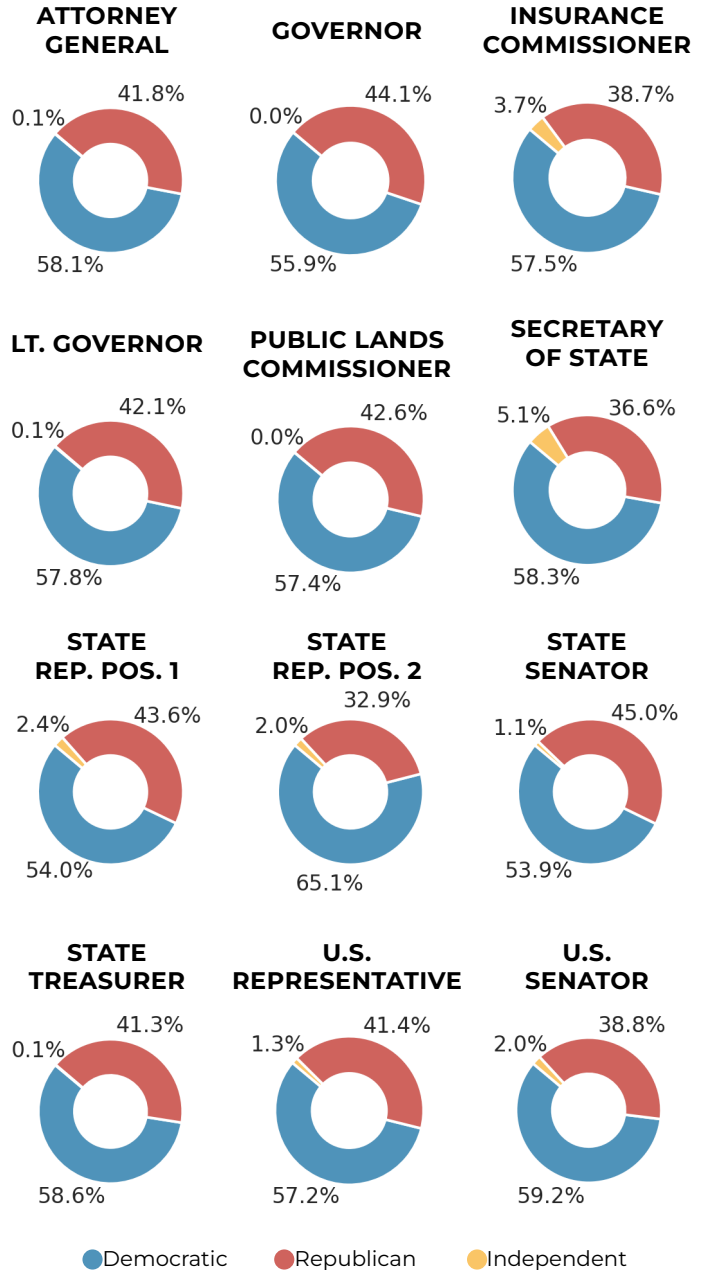


### VOTE SWING, 2022 to 2024

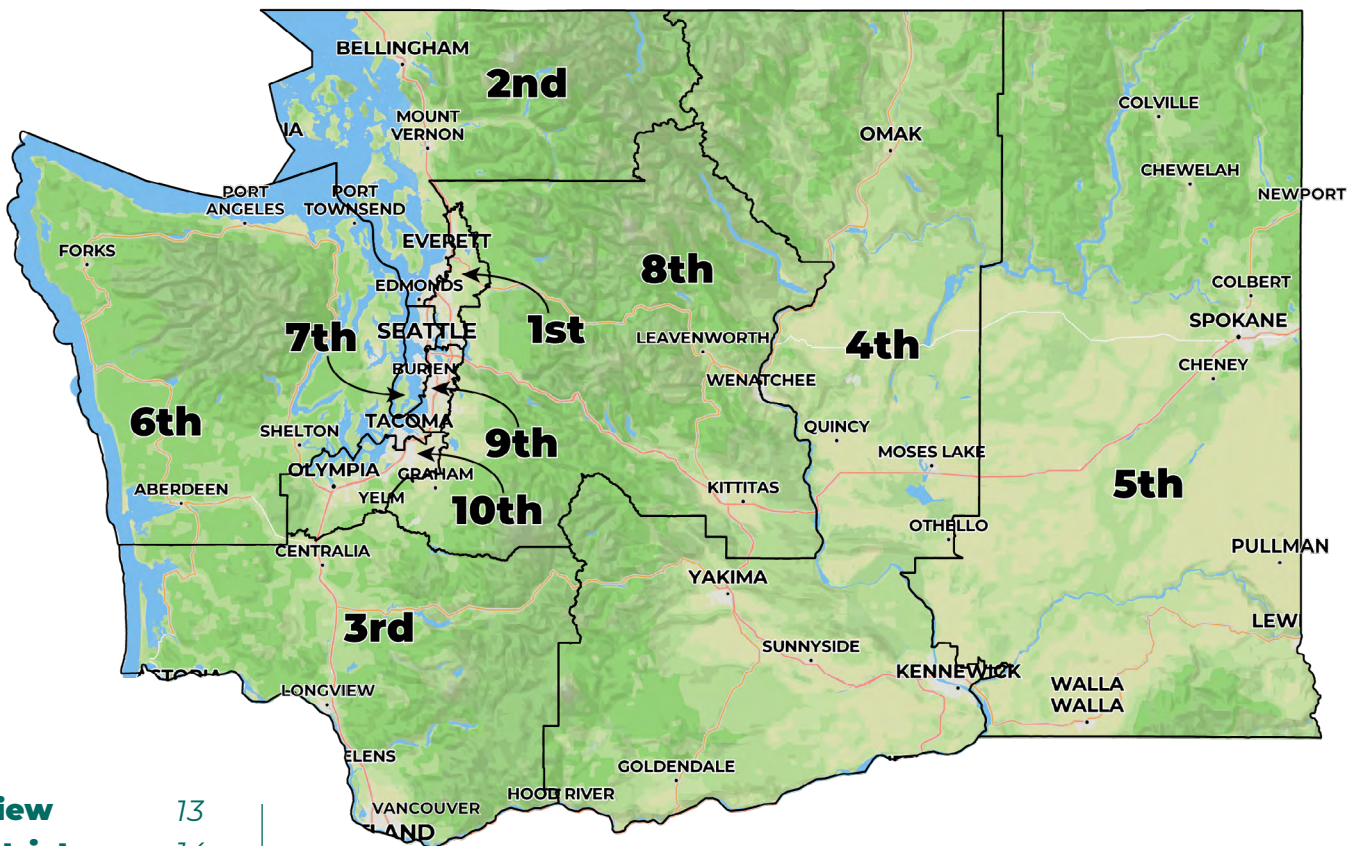
candidates for all statewide offices – with the exception of Insurance Commissioner – increased their overall vote share relative to 2020. Similarly, Democratic candidates for federal offices and most state legislative offices increased their overall vote share relative to 2022, with the exception of a handful of uncontested State Senate races. Together, these shifts reflect an overall increased enthusiasm for Democratic candidates in 2024.

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# Overview

## Background & election results

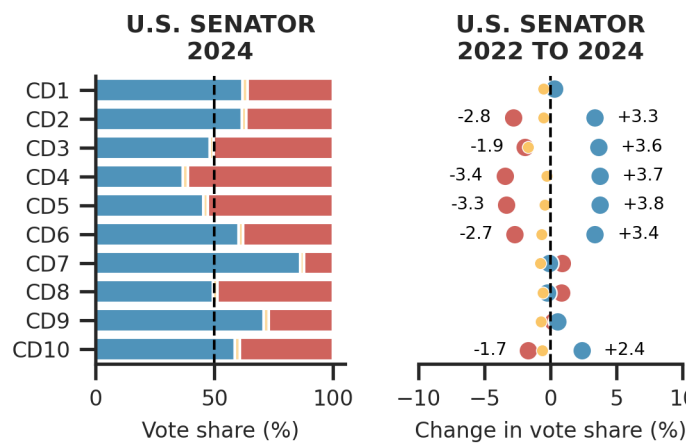
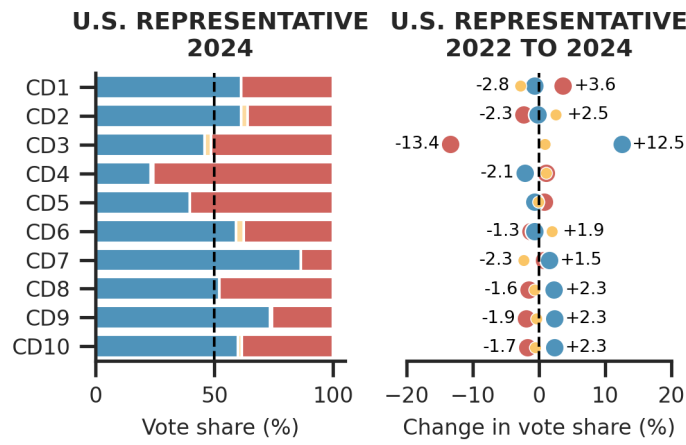
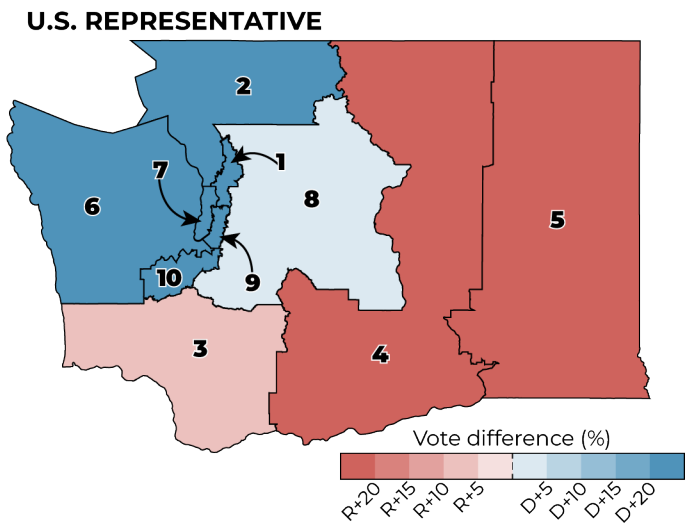
Washington State's congressional delegation currently includes eight Democrats and two Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives, and two Democrats in the U.S. Senate. Sen. Maria Cantwell (D) received her largest vote ever in a Primary Election, outperforming Sen. Patty Murray (D)'s margins in her 2022 re-election bid. Cantwell is safely on-track to win a fifth term in the U.S. Senate.

Incumbent Democratic Representatives Suzan DelBene (CD1), Rick Larsen (CD2), Pramila Jayapal (CD7), and Marilyn Strickland (CD10) matched or exceeded their 2022 vote margins in their districts, and will face Republican challengers in their safe-D districts this fall. Incumbent Democratic Representative Adam Smith (CD9) finished first in his race, but faces a challenge from progressive Melissa Chaudhry (D) in the fall.

In CD8, incumbent Dr. Kim Schrier (D) received more than 50% of the vote in Washington's perennial swing district, despite facing multiple Democratic challengers. In CD3, incumbent Marie Gluesenkamp-Perez (D), who flipped the district blue in 2022, finished first and increased her vote share by more than 12% – the largest swing of any congressional district. Gluesenkamp-Perez will face a rematch against Trump-endorsed Joe Kent (R) this fall, in a district that still favors Republicans.

Incumbents Derek Kilmer (D, CD6) and Cathy McMorris-Rodgers (R, CD5) announced their retirements earlier this year, setting up competitive primaries to fill their seats. In the solidly-Democratic CD6, State Sen. Emily Randall (D, LD26) finished ahead of Public Lands Commissioner Hilary Franz (D), and will face State Sen. Drew MacEwen (R, LD35) in the fall. In the solidly-Republican CD5, Michael Baumgartner (R) received more than 30% of the vote in a crowded field, and will face Carmela Conroy (D) in the fall.

Following McMorris-Rodgers retirement, Dan Newhouse (CD4) is now the sole incumbent Republican running for re-election to Congress from Washington in 2024. Newhouse is just one of two Republicans still serving in the U.S. House after voting to impeach former President Donald Trump in 2021. Newhouse received <50% of the vote, finishing more than 15,000 votes behind Trump-endorsed Jerrod Sessler (R).

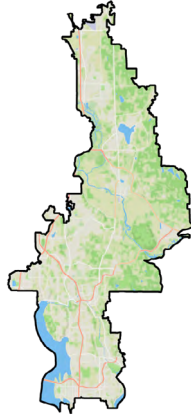


**Fig 2.1 | Congressional results in WA's 2024 Primary Election.** Votes were aggregated by party, and districts were categorized by vote margin ("lean" = 0-5%, "likely" = 5-10%, "solid" = >10%). Dot plots show the relative change in vote share for Democratic, Republican, and Independent candidates for Congress from 2022 to 2024.

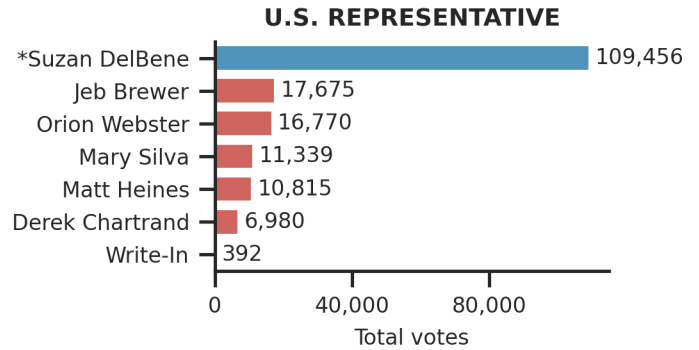
## Voter turnout

There are 435,491 registered voters in CD1, and 172,429 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (39.6%). Turnout was 6.0% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 3.8% higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 28.1% of the electorate in CD1 (122,485 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 23.1% lower than older voters (23.0% vs 46.1%). Voters of color comprise 20.6% of the electorate in CD1, and turnout of voters of color was 20.1% lower than White voters (23.6% vs 43.7%). 185,862 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 53,567 young voters and 41,126 voters of color.

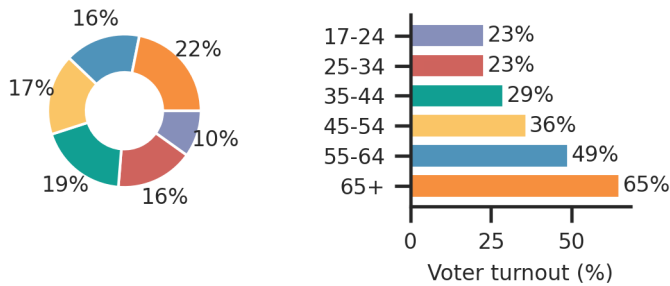

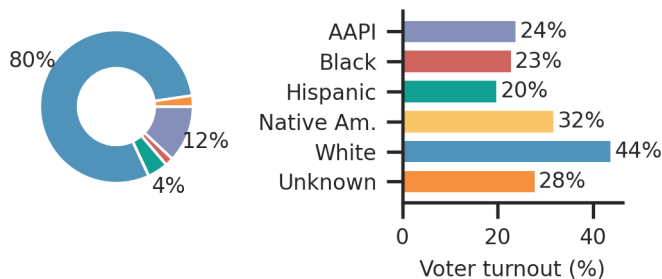
In CD1, incumbent Suzan DelBene (D) finished first in the race for U.S. Representative with 63.1% of the vote, followed by Jeb Brewer (R) with 10.2% of the vote, Orion Webster (R) with 9.7% of the vote, Mary Silva (R) with 6.5% of the vote, Matt Heines (R) with 6.2% of the vote, and Derek Chartrand (R) with 4.0% of the vote.

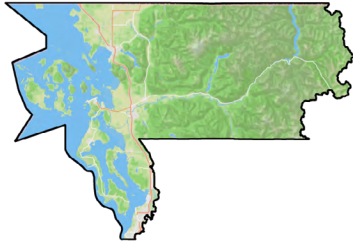
**Fig 2.3 | Election results in CD1 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

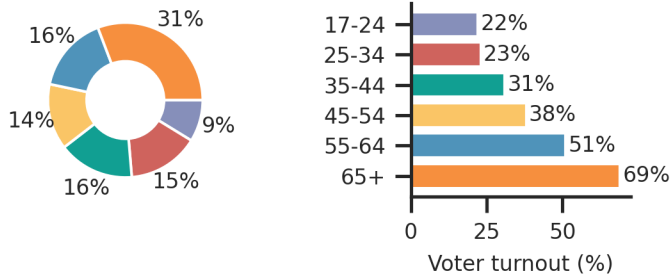
## Voter turnout

There are 487,367 registered voters in CD2, and 219,936 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (45.1%). Turnout was 5.7% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 2.5%

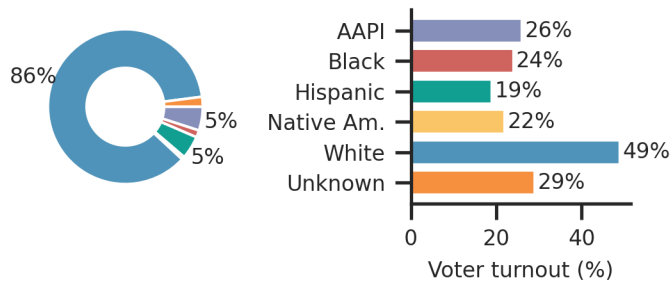


higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 25.3% of the electorate in CD2 (123,129 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 29.2% lower than older voters (23.3% vs 52.5%). Voters of color comprise 14.1% of the electorate in CD2, and turnout of voters of color was 25.0% lower than White voters (23.7% vs 48.7%). 188,524 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 52,988 young voters and 29,429 voters of color.

### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY AGE



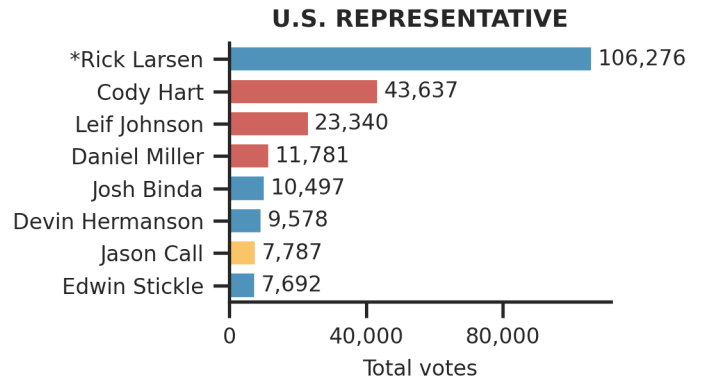

In CD2, incumbent Rick Larsen (D) finished first in the race for U.S. Representative with 48.1% of the vote, followed by Cody Hart (R) with 19.8% of the vote, Leif Johnson (R) with 10.6% of the vote, Daniel Miller (R) with 5.3% of the vote, Josh Binda (D) with 4.8% of the vote, Devin Hermanson (D) with 4.3% of the vote, Jason Call (I) with 3.5% of the vote, and Edwin Stickle (D) with 3.5% of the vote.

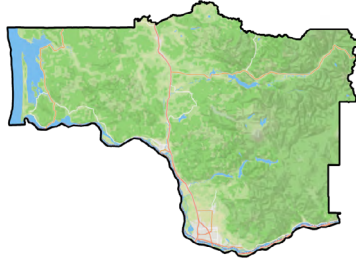


**Fig 2.5 | Election results in CD2 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, asterisk indicates incumbent.

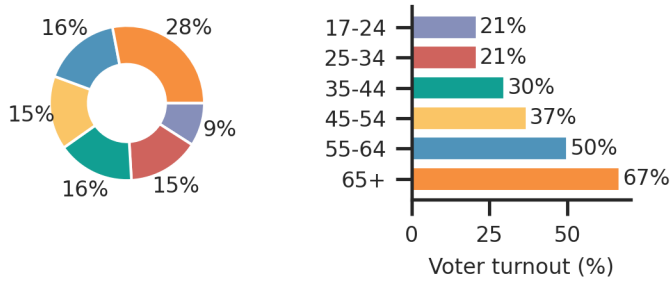
## Voter turnout

There are 493,322 registered voters in CD3, and 209,778 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (42.5%). Turnout was 1.1% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 0.5%

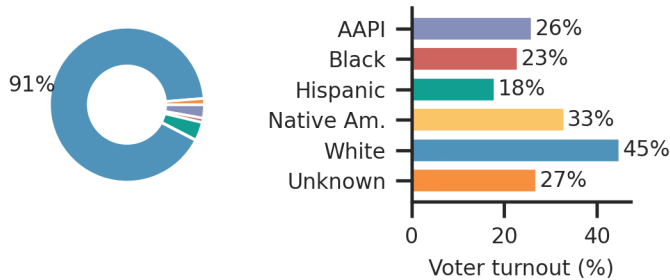


higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 25.7% of the electorate in CD3 (126,776 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 28.4% lower than older voters (21.4% vs 49.8%). Voters of color comprise 9.2% of the electorate in CD3, and turnout of voters of color was 22.1% lower than White voters (22.5% vs 44.6%). 188,168 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 50,390 young voters and 17,478 voters of color.

### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY AGE



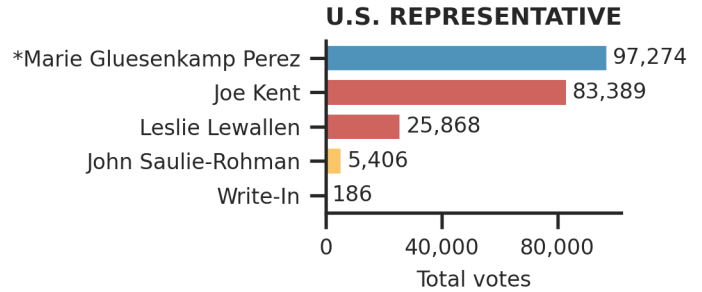
### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY RACE

In CD3, incumbent Marie Gluesenkamp Perez (D) finished first in the race for U.S. Representative with 45.9% of the vote, followed by Joe Kent (R) with 39.3% of the vote, Leslie Lewallen (R) with 12.2% of the vote, and John Saulie-Rohman (I) with 2.5% of the vote.

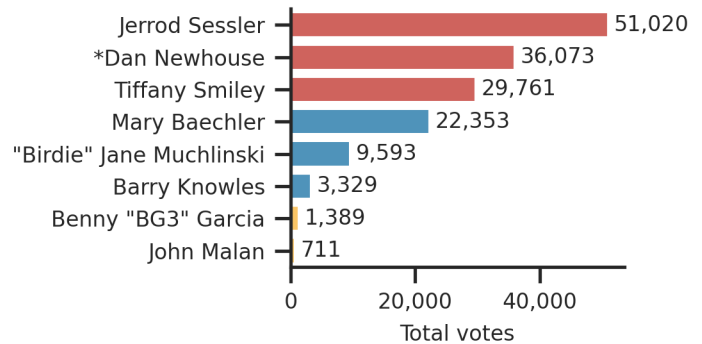
There are 400,013 registered voters in CD4, and 152,410 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (38.1%). Turnout was 4.8% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 2.5% higher than the 2022 Primary Election. 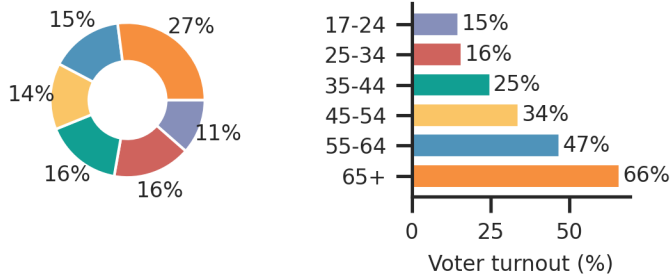

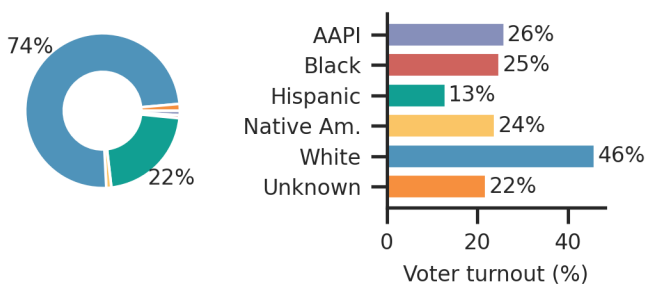

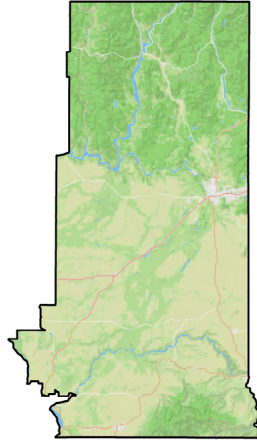
**Fig 2.8 | Voter turnout in CD4 in the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

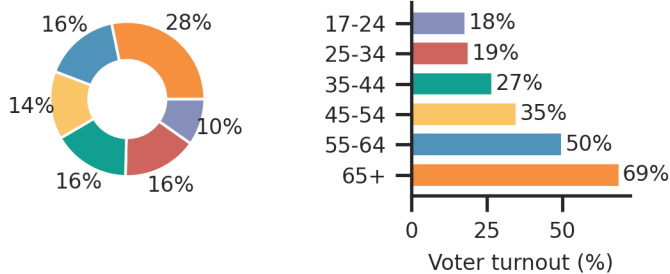

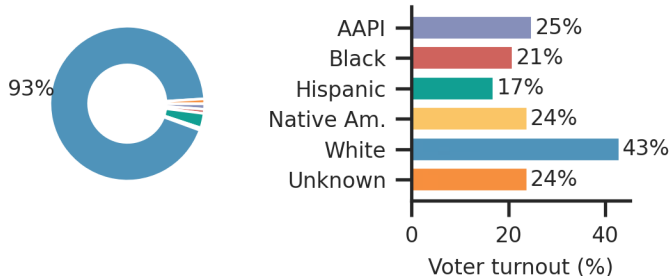

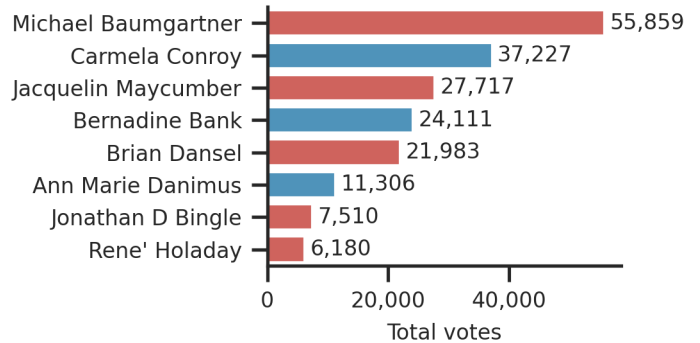


**Fig 2.10 | Voter turnout in CD5 in the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

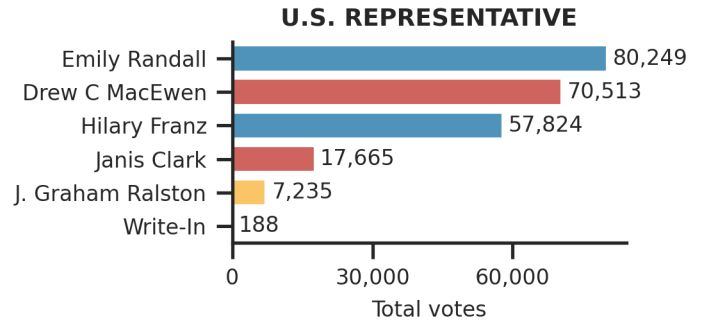

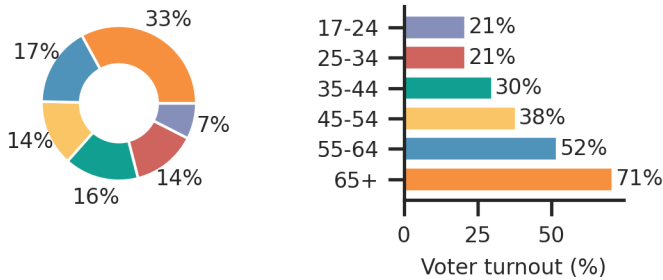

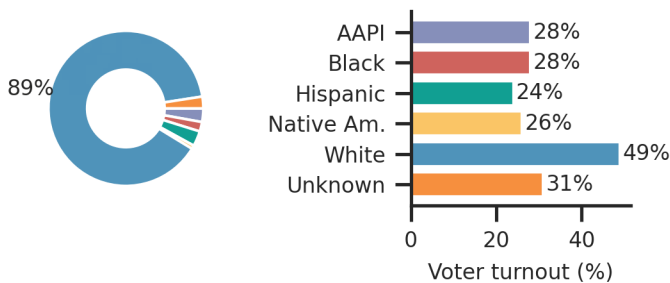


**Fig 2.13 | Election results in CD6 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

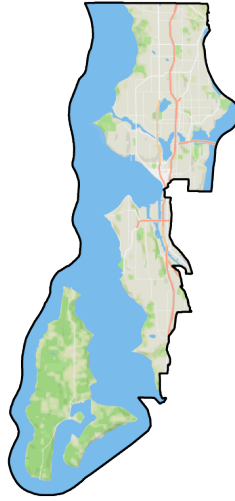


**Fig 2.12 | Voter turnout in CD6 in the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

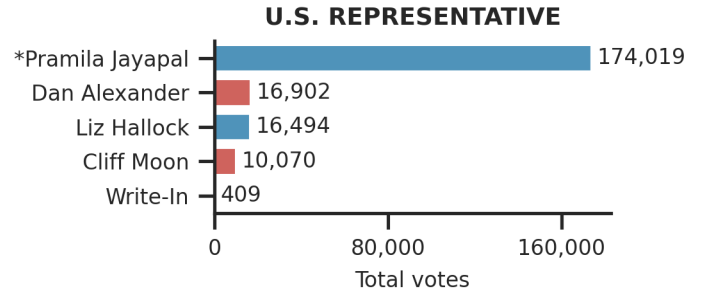

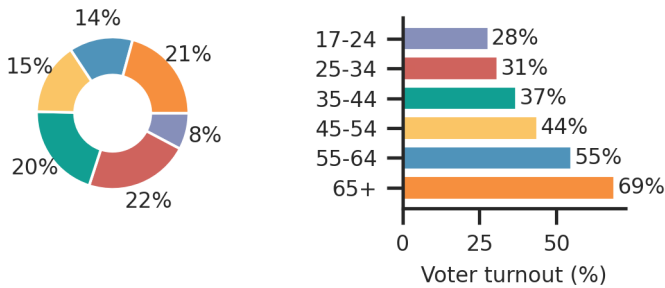

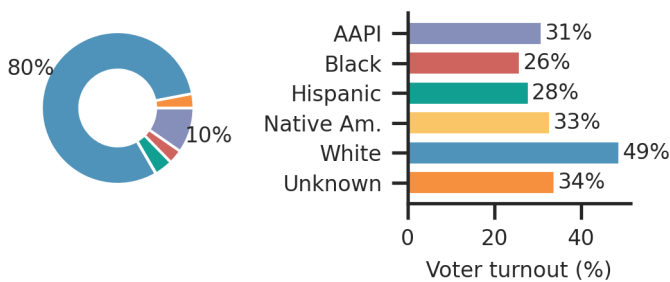


**Fig 2.15 | Election results in CD7 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, asterisk indicates incumbent.

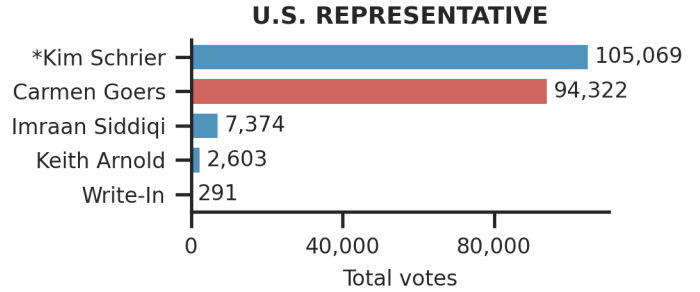

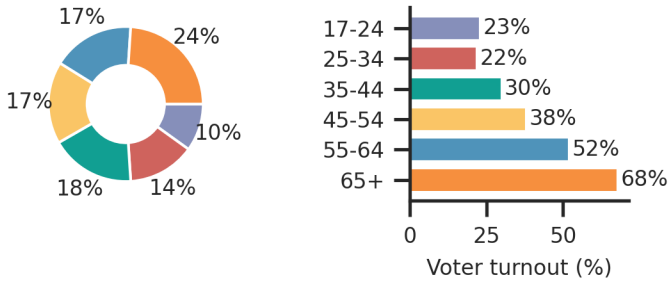

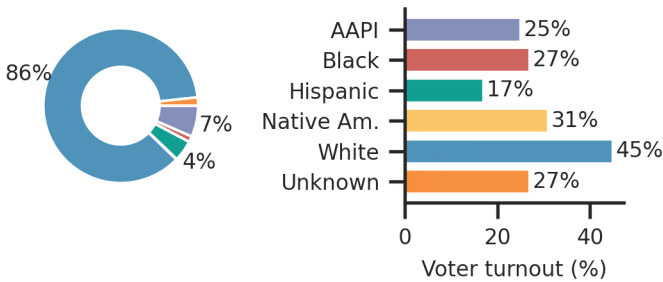


**Fig 2.17 | Election results in CD8 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, asterisk indicates incumbent..

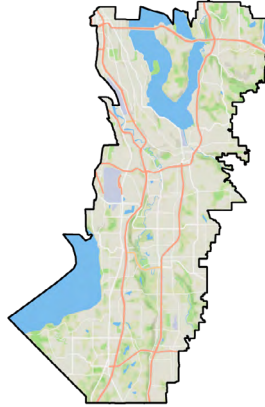


**Fig 2.16 | Voter turnout in CD8 in the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

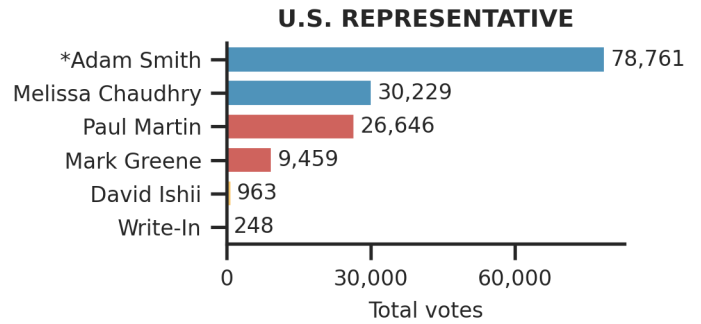

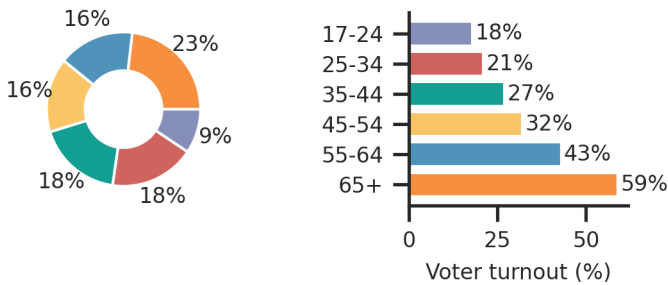

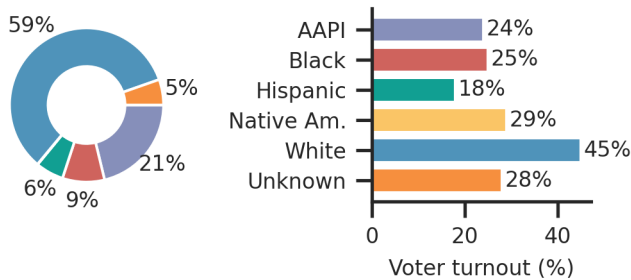


**Fig 2.19 | Election results in CD9 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, asterisk indicates incumbent.

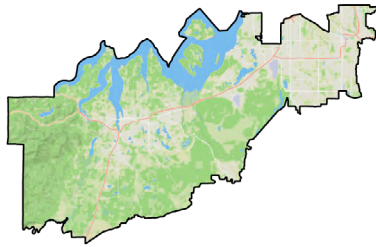


**Fig 2.18 | Voter turnout in CD9 in the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

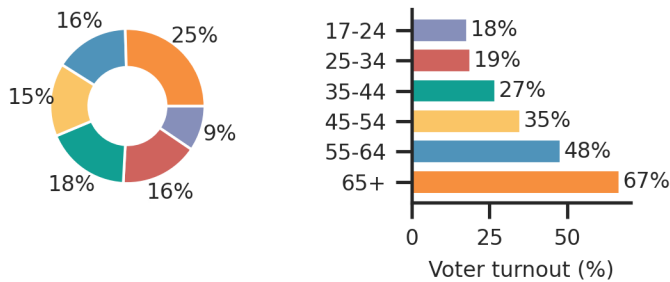

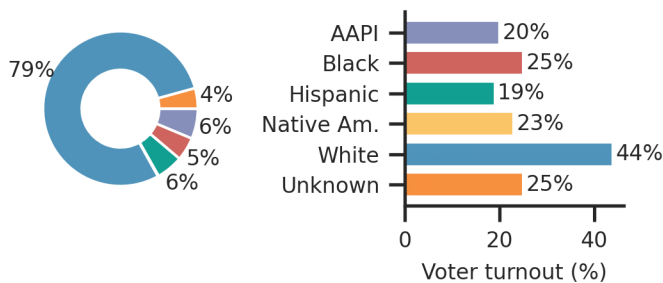

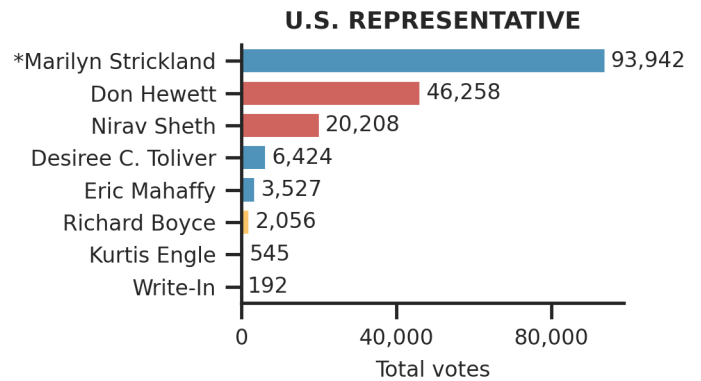

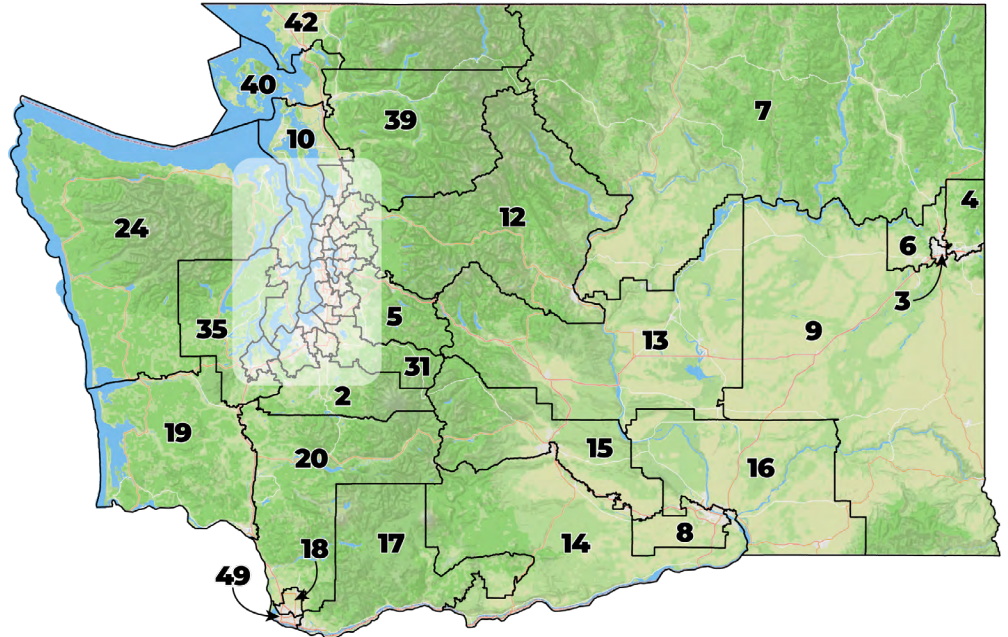
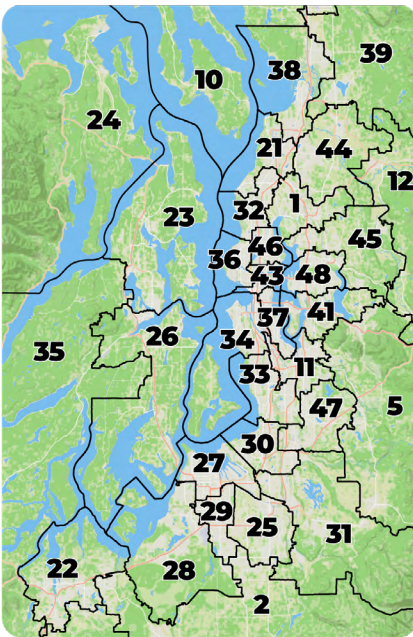

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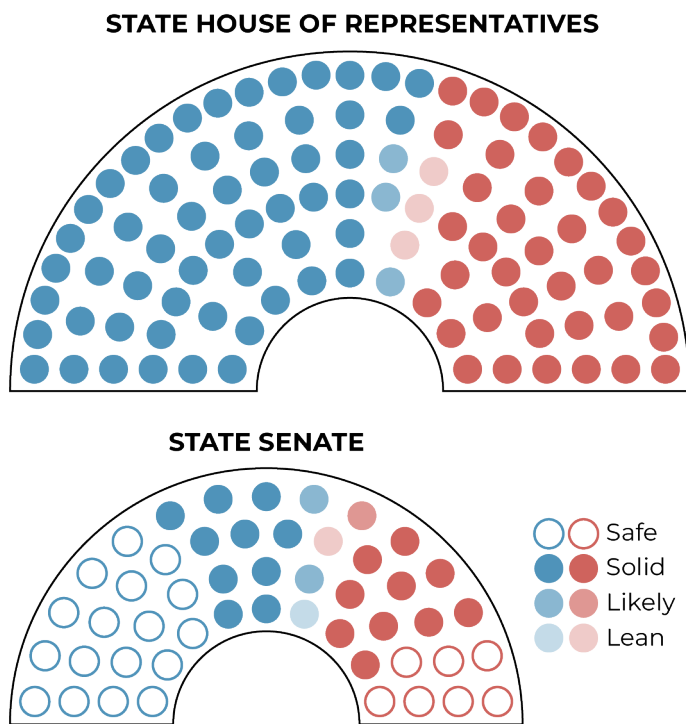
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# Overview

## Background & election results

Washington State Democrats have controlled both chambers of the state legislature since 2018, and are on-track to maintain or expand their majority in both this fall. Of the 98 seats in the State House of Representatives, Democratic candidates won solid vote shares (margin >10%) in 55 races, while Republican candidates won solid vote shares in 37 races. Of the 25 seats up for election in the State Senate, Democratic and Republican candidates each won solid vote shares in 10 districts.

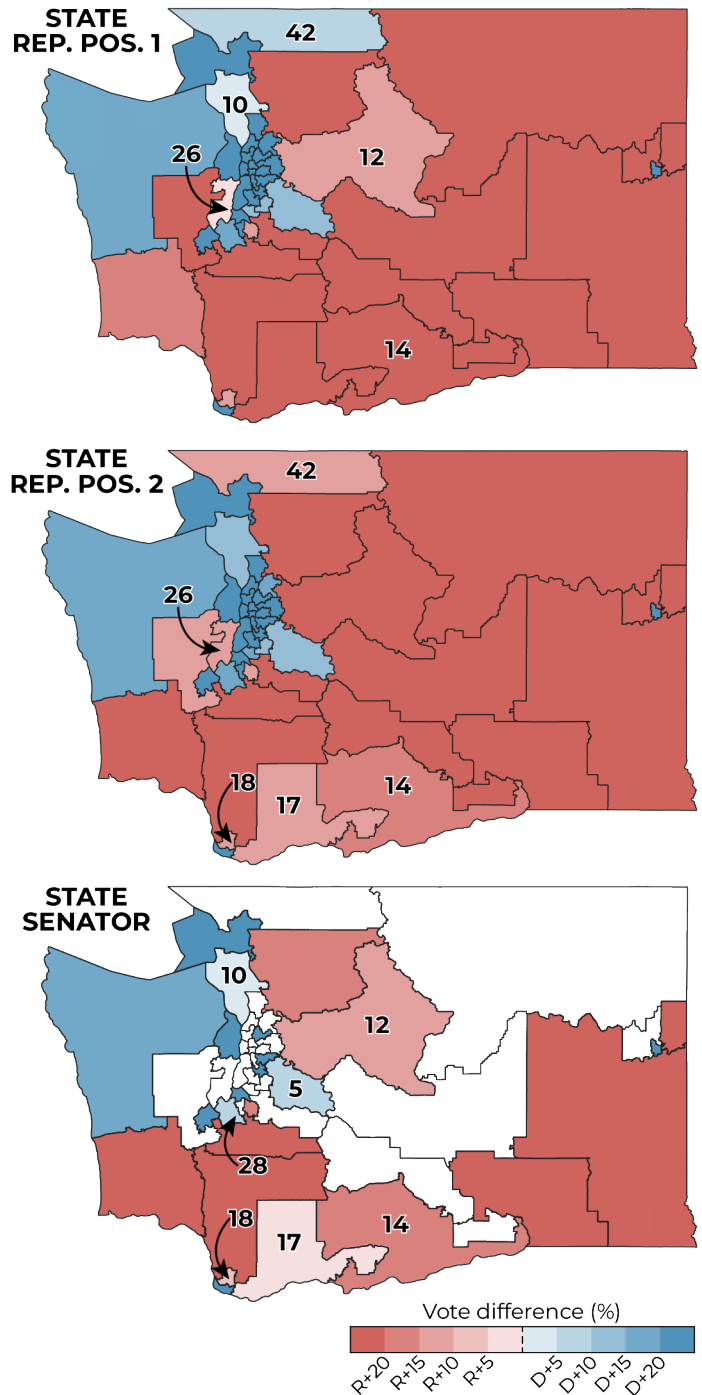
has been redistricted to a majority-Hispanic district. Historically, the margins in South Central WA swing heavily towards Democratic candidates from the Primary to the General (+10-14% more D in 2020), so all three seats could be competitive in the 2024 General Election.

Nine districts had races with margins <10% and are likely to be competitive in the General Election: **LD5, LD10, LD12, LD14, LD17, LD18, LD26, LD28, LD42**. If Democrats win all races in these competitive districts, they could expand their majorities to 66-33 in the House and 34-15 in the Senate. If Republicans win all all races in these districts, they could narrow Democratic majorities to 50-48 in the House and 27-22 in the Senate.

Notably, the 2024 Primary Election was the first time new legislative maps were used, with major changes to districts in South Central WA – particularly **LD14**, which

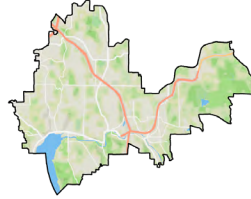


**Fig 3.2 | Legislative results in WA's 2024 Primary Election.** Votes were aggregated by party, and districts were colored by vote margin. Districts with margins ≤10% are labeled.

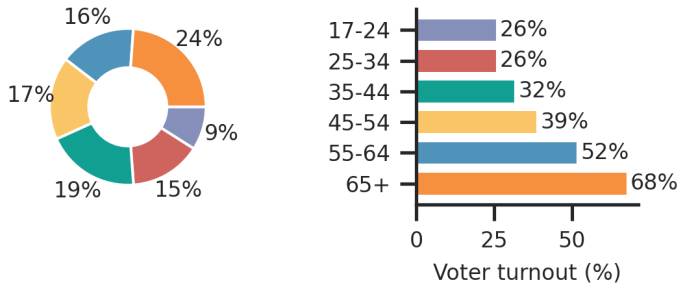

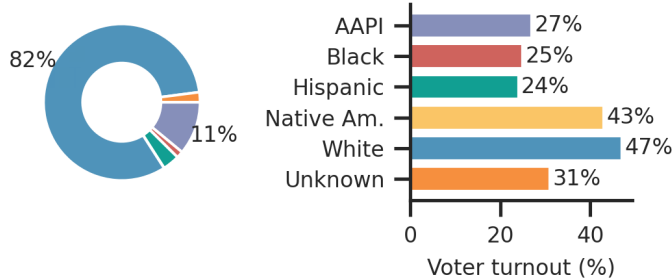

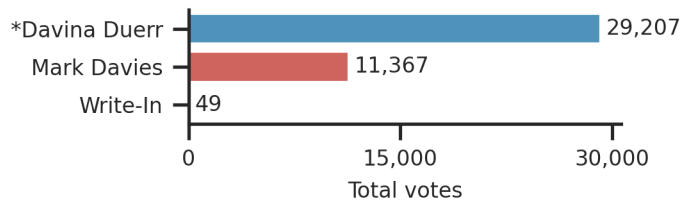
**Fig 3.3 | Voter turnout in LD1 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

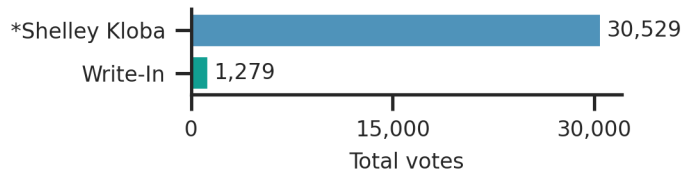

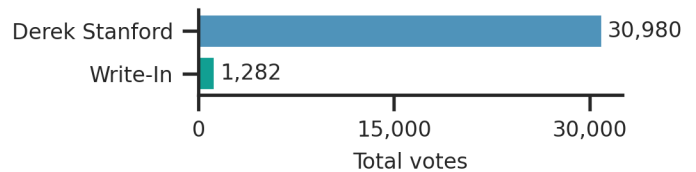

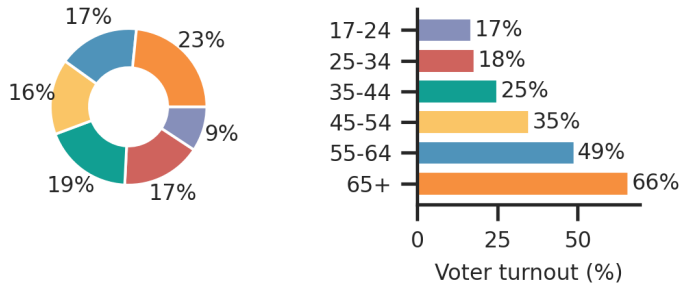

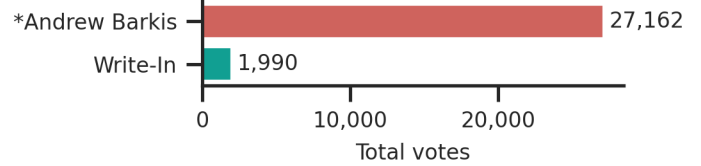
**Fig 3.5 | Voter turnout in LD2 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

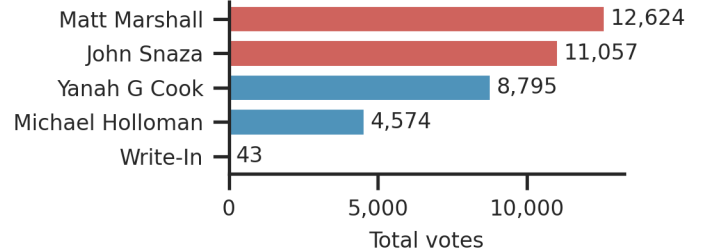

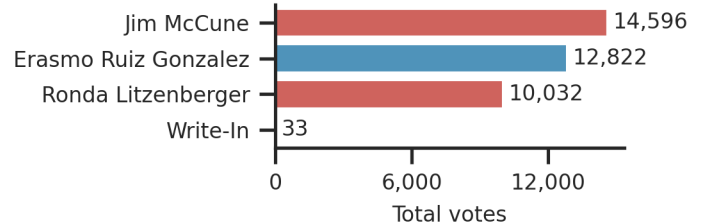

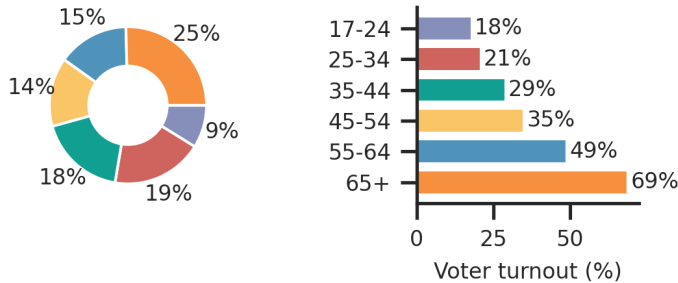

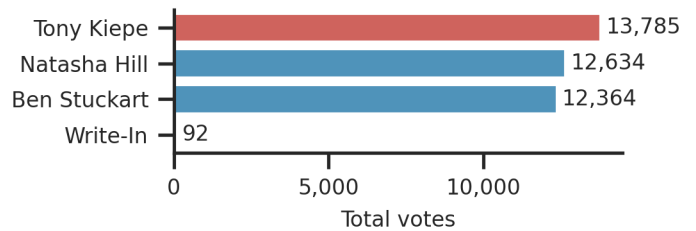
**Fig 3.7 | Voter turnout in LD3 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

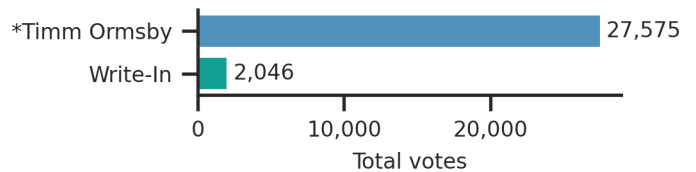

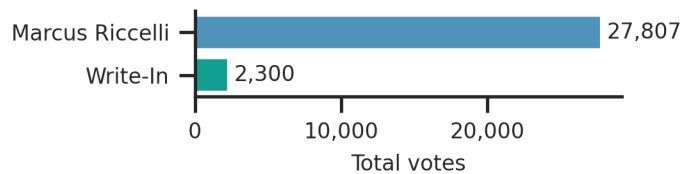

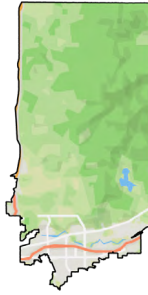
**Fig 3.8 | Election results in LD3 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

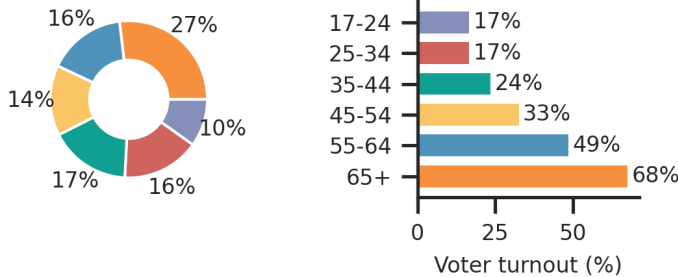

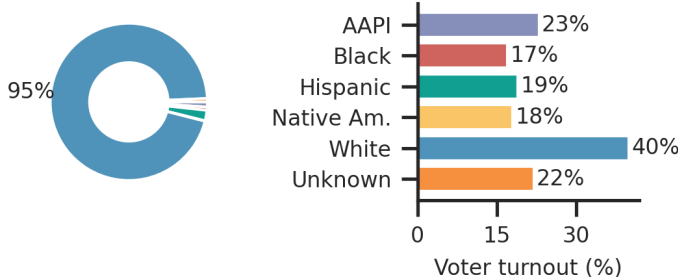

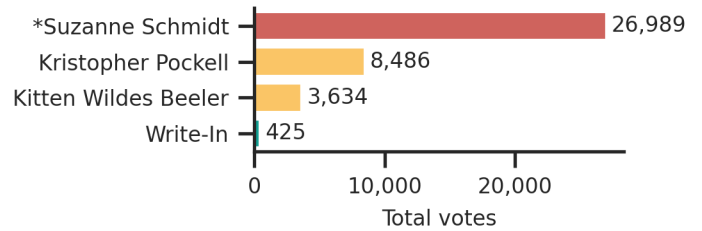
**Fig 3.9 | Voter turnout in LD4 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

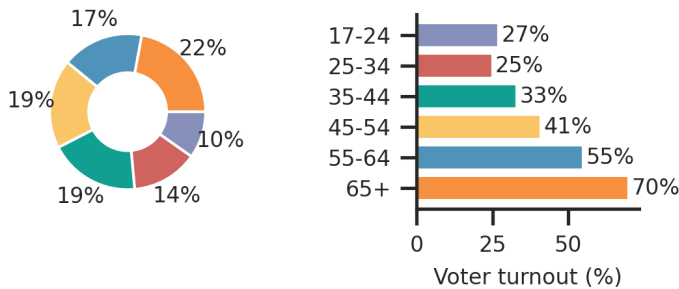

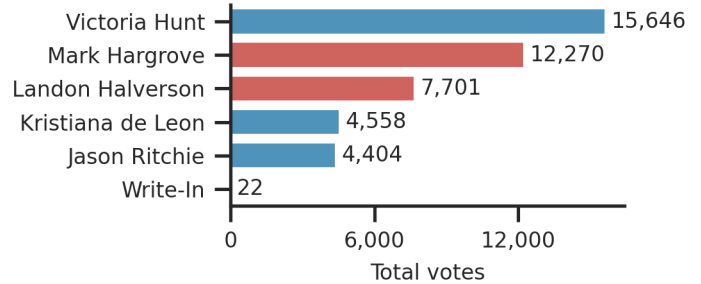
**Fig 3.11 | Voter turnout in LD5 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

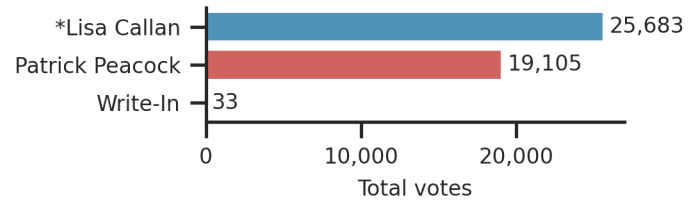

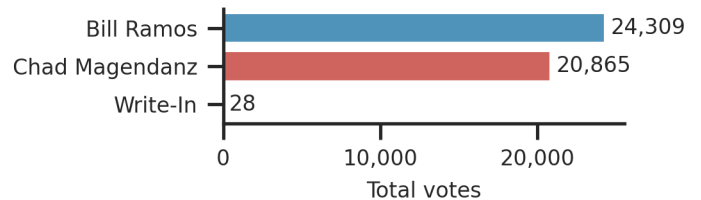

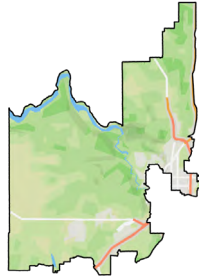
**Fig 3.12 | Election results in LD5 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

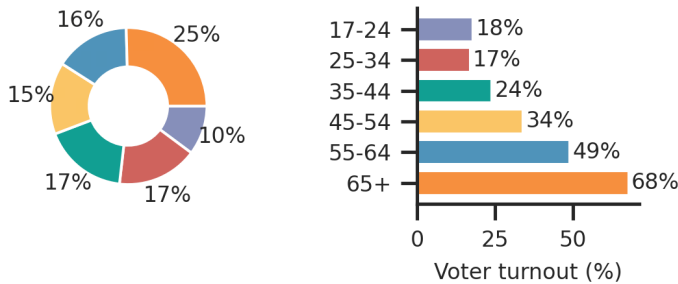

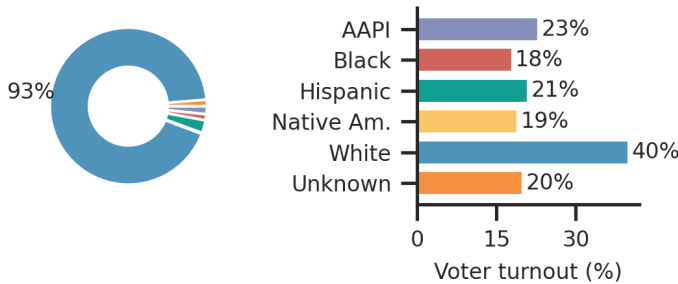

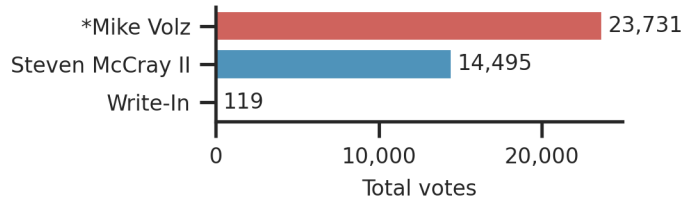
**Fig 3.13 | Voter turnout in LD6 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

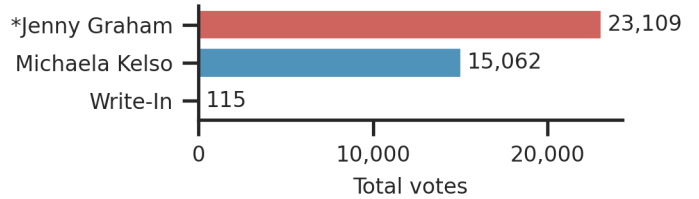

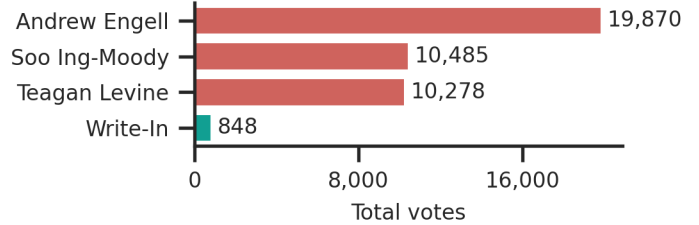
**Fig 3.15 | Voter turnout in LD7 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

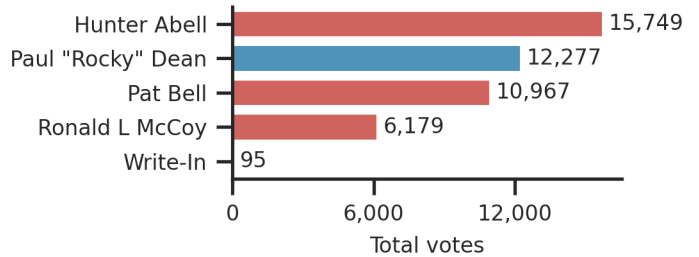

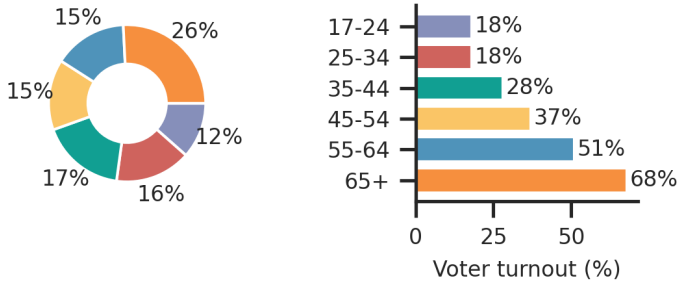

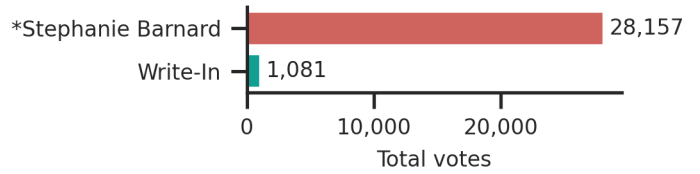
**Fig 3.17 | Voter turnout in LD8 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

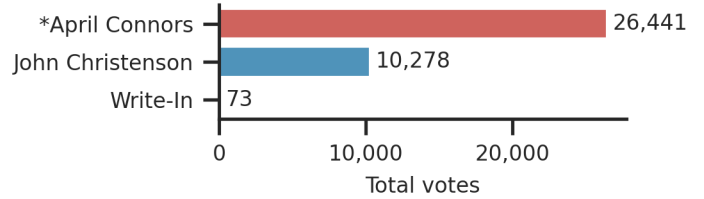

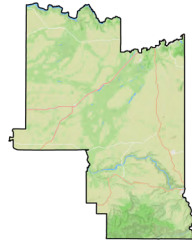
**Fig 3.18 | Election results in LD8 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

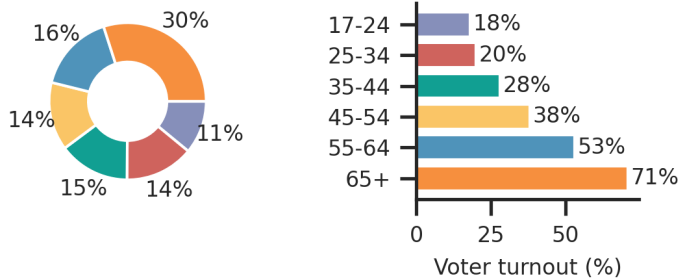

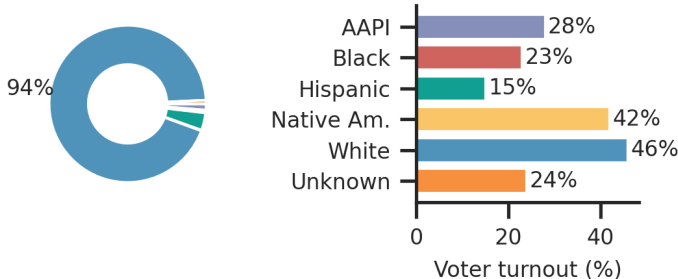

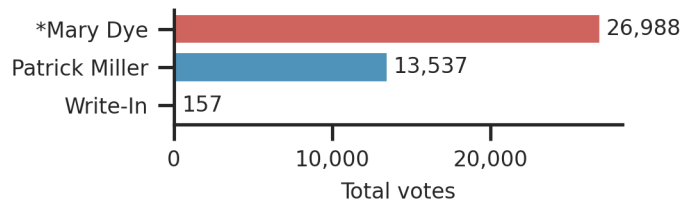


**Fig 3.19 | Voter turnout in LD9 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

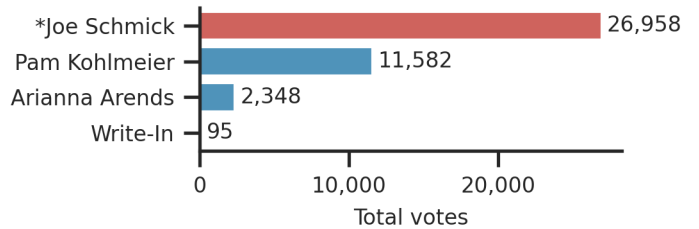

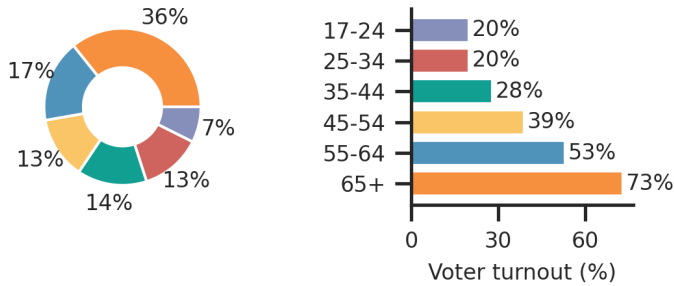

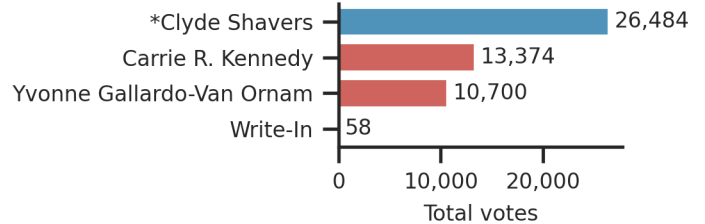
**Fig 3.21 | Voter turnout in LD10 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

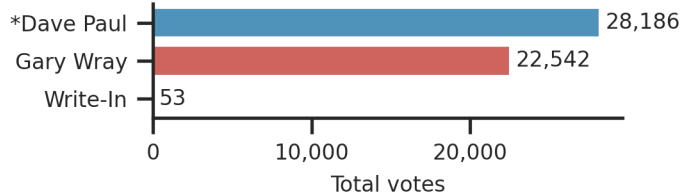

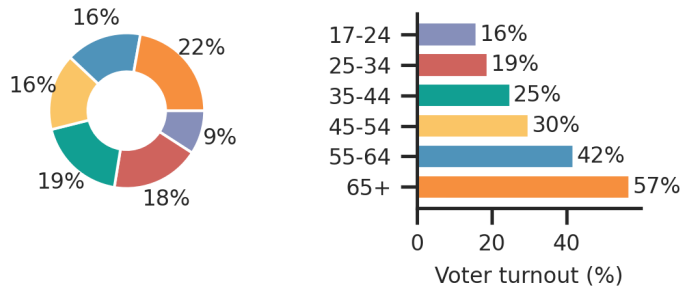

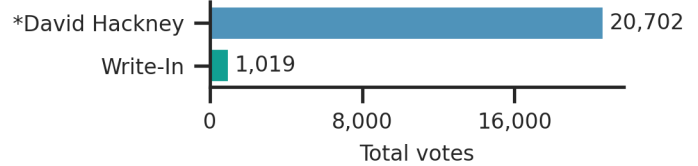
**Fig 3.23 | Voter turnout in LD11 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

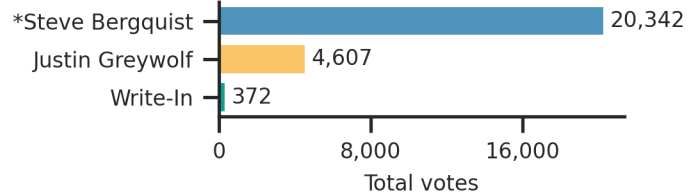

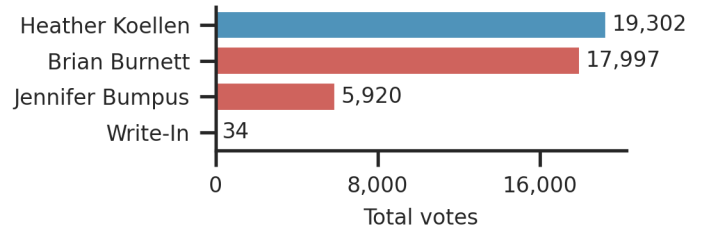
**Fig 3.25 | Voter turnout in LD12 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

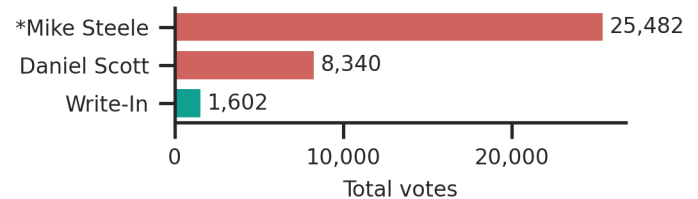

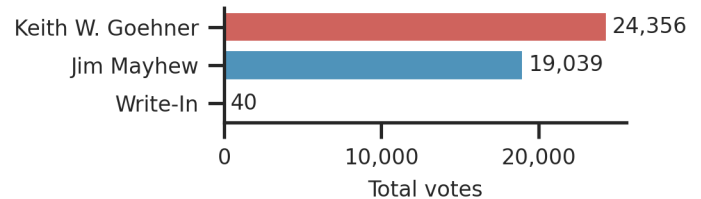

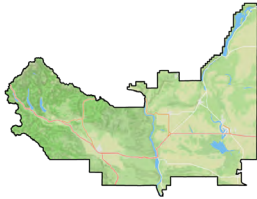
**Fig 3.26 | Election results in LD12 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

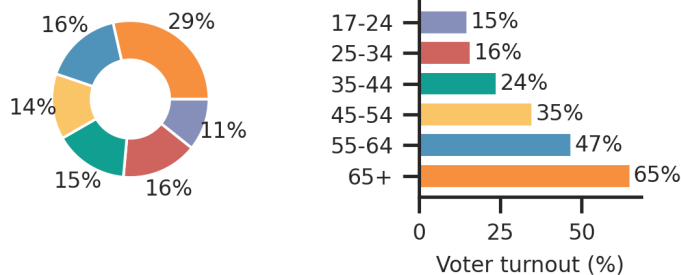

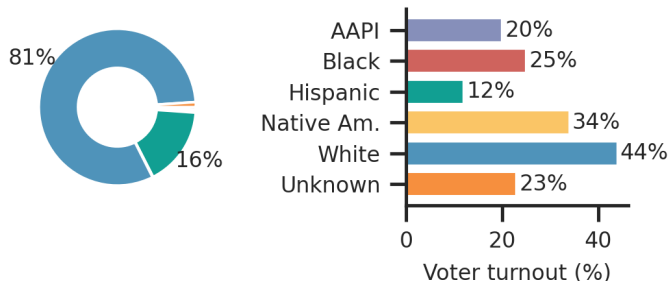

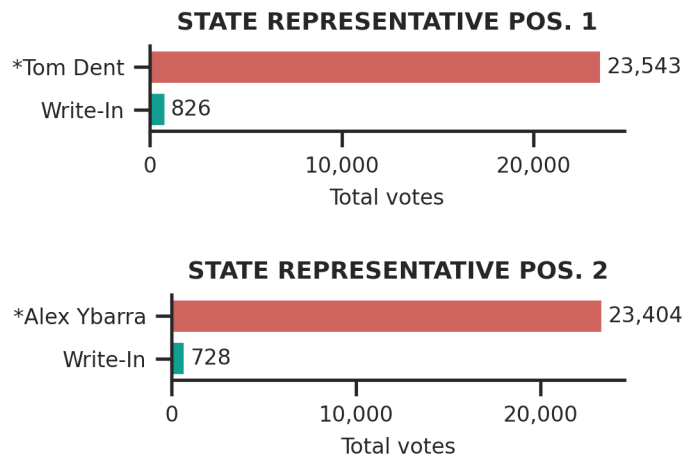


**Fig 3.27 | Voter turnout in LD13 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

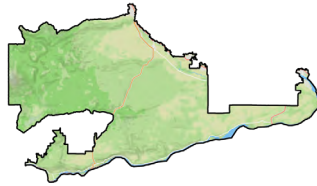
**Fig 3.28 | Election results in LD13 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

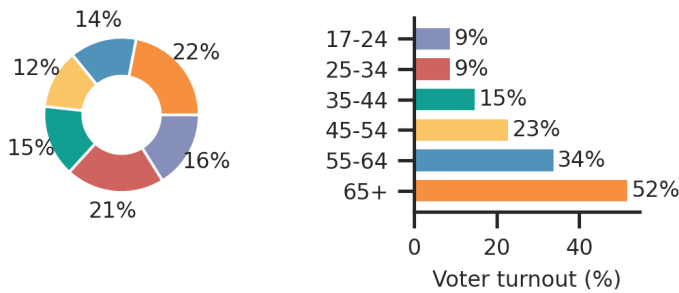

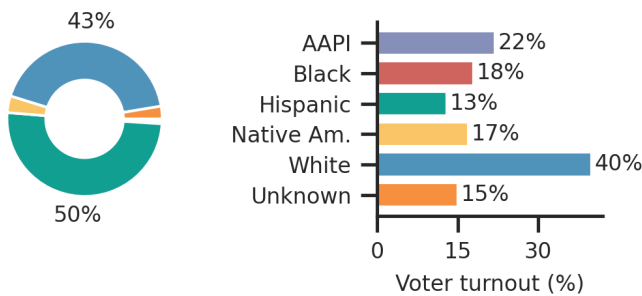

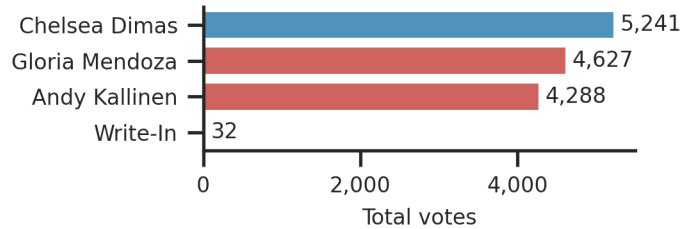
**Fig 3.29 | Voter turnout in LD14 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

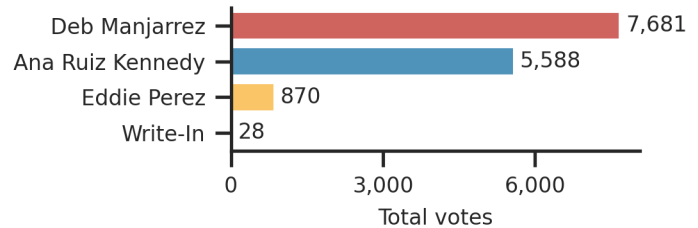

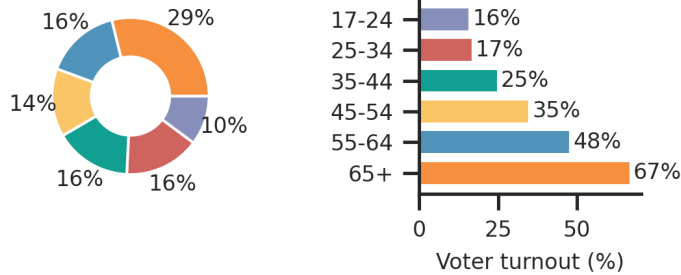

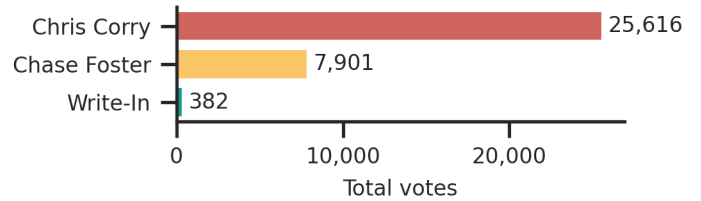
**Fig 3.31 | Voter turnout in LD15 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

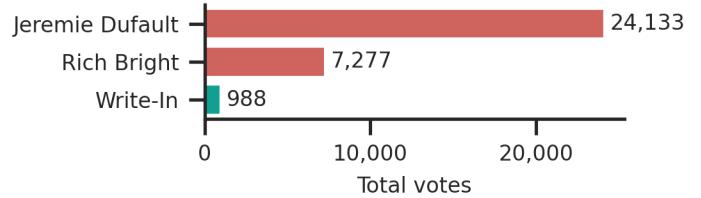

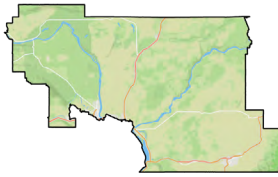
**Fig 3.32 | Election results in LD15 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

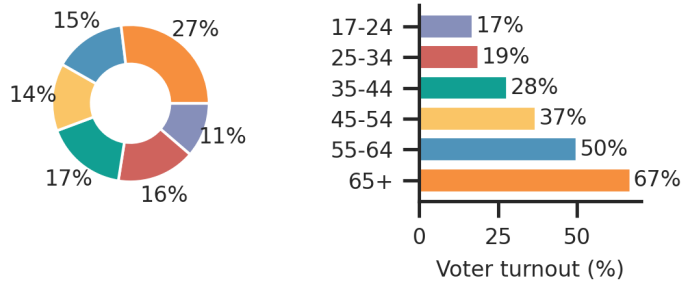

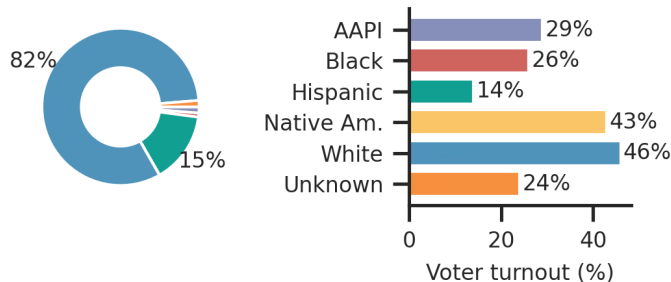

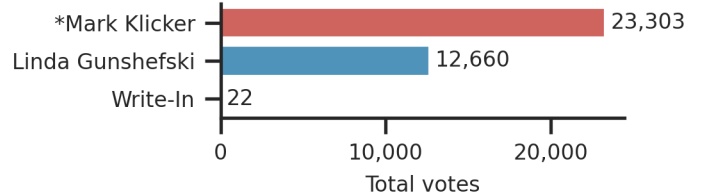


**Fig 3.33 | Voter turnout in LD16 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

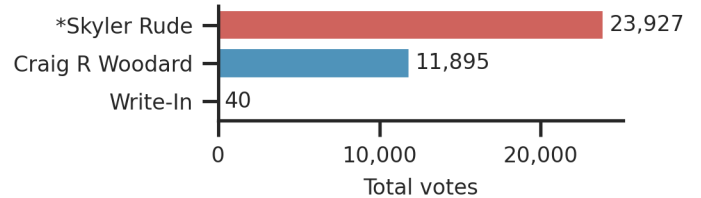

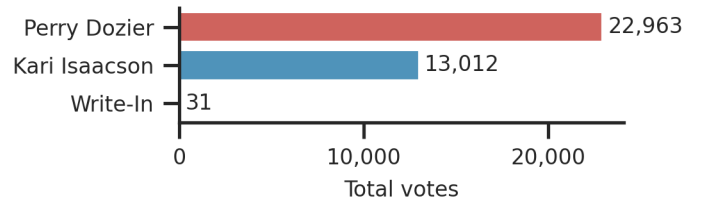

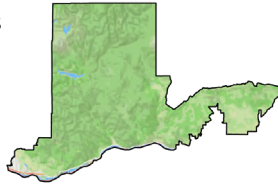


**Fig 3.34 | Election results in LD16 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

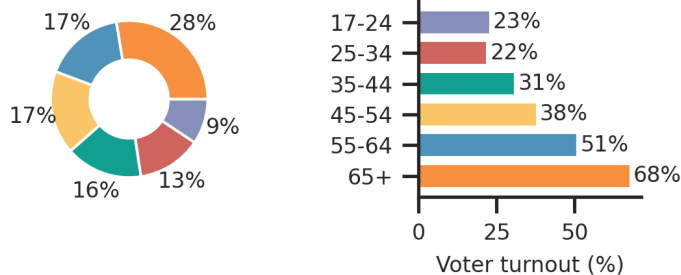

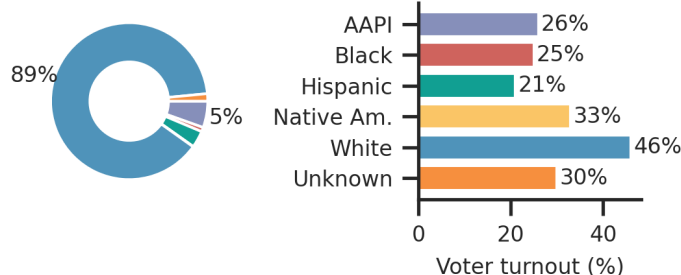

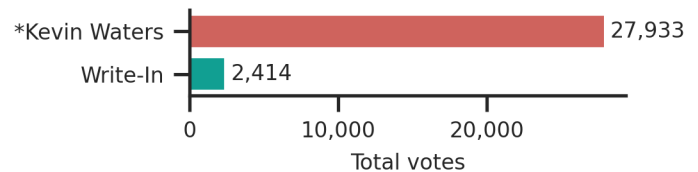


**Fig 3.35 | Voter turnout in LD17 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

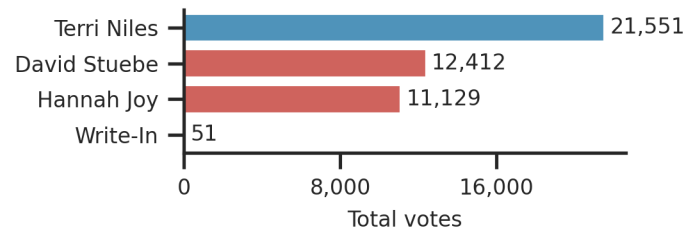

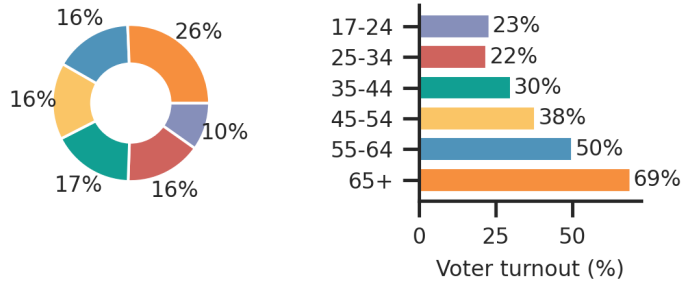

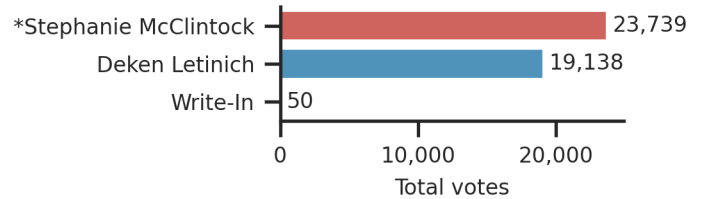
**Fig 3.37 | Voter turnout in LD18 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

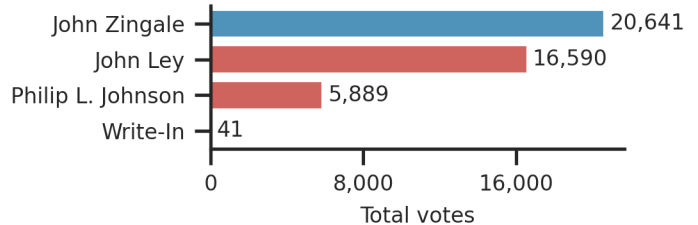

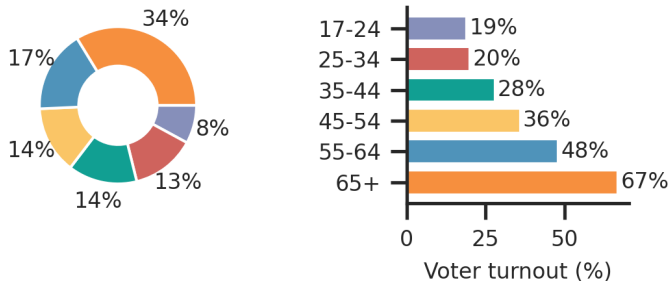

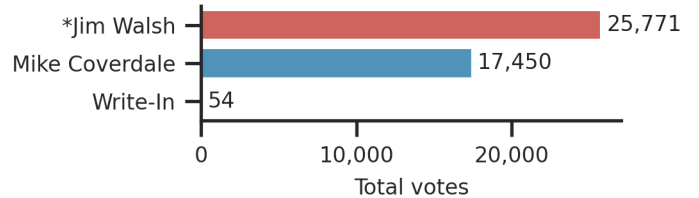


**Fig 3.39 | Voter turnout in LD19 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

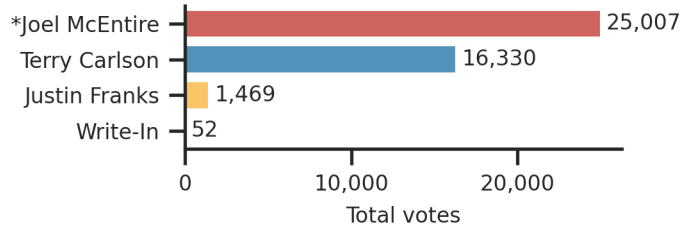

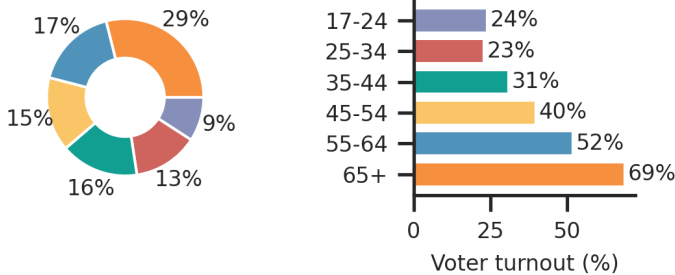

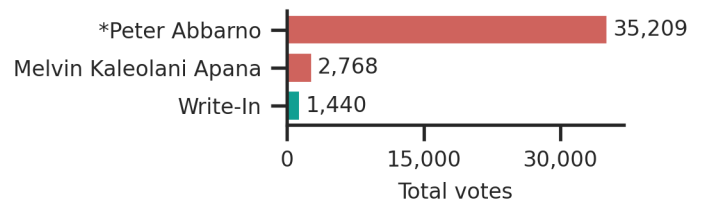
**Fig 3.41 | Voter turnout in LD20 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

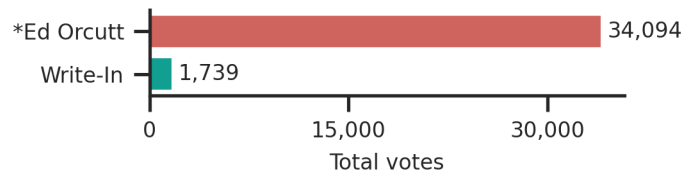

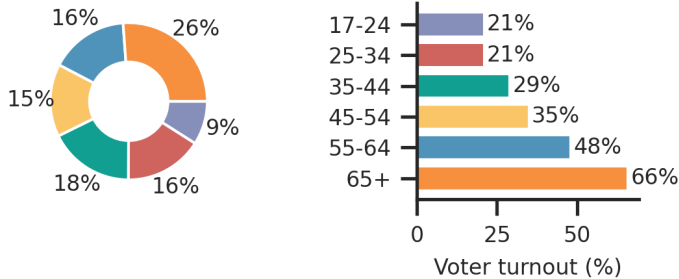

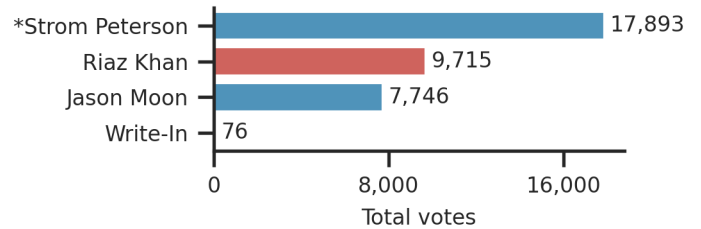
**Fig 3.43 | Voter turnout in LD21 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

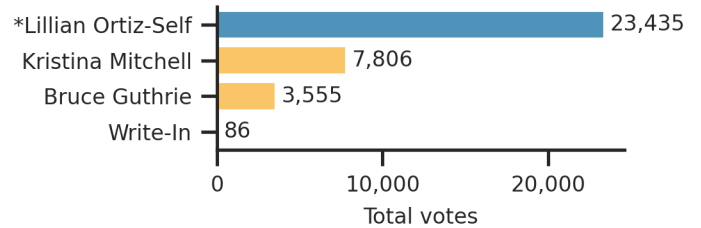

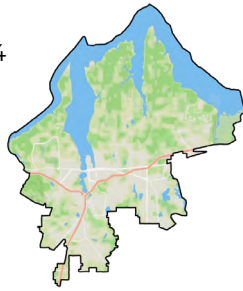
**Fig 3.44 | Election results in LD21 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

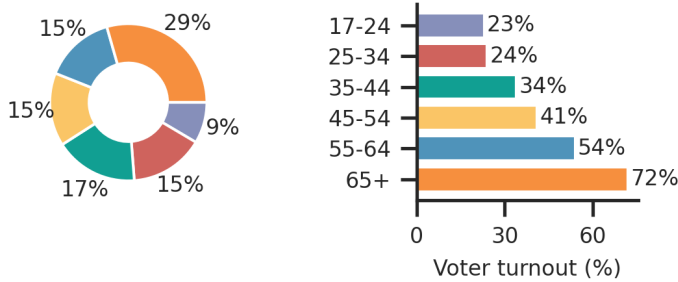

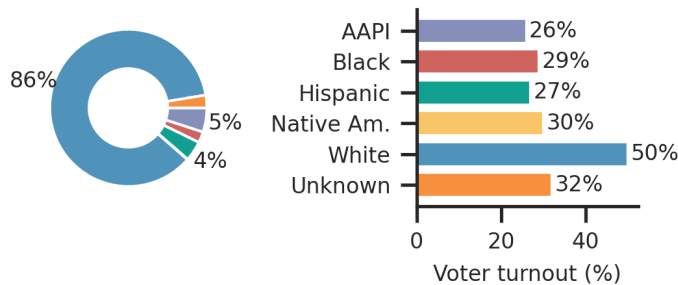

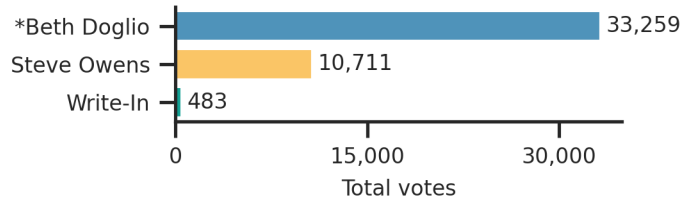


**Fig 3.45 | Voter turnout in LD22 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

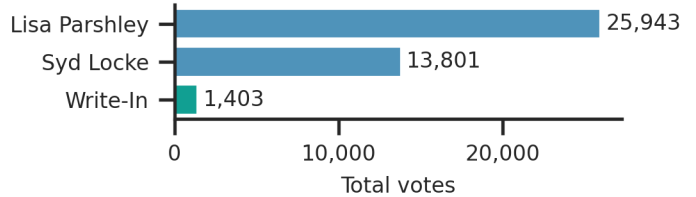

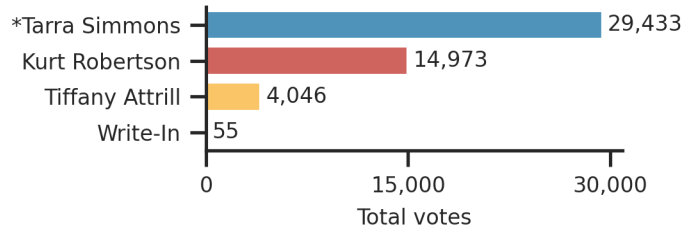


**Fig 3.47 | Voter turnout in LD23 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

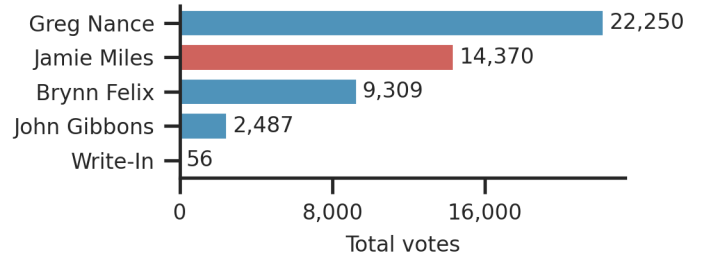

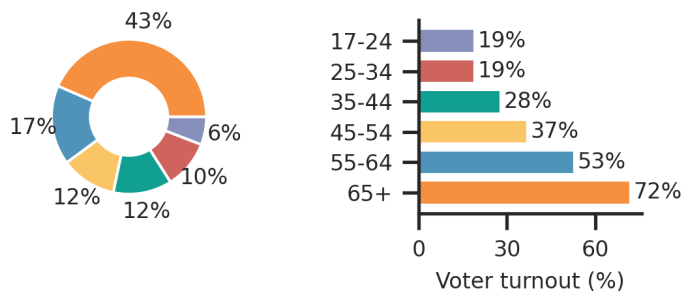

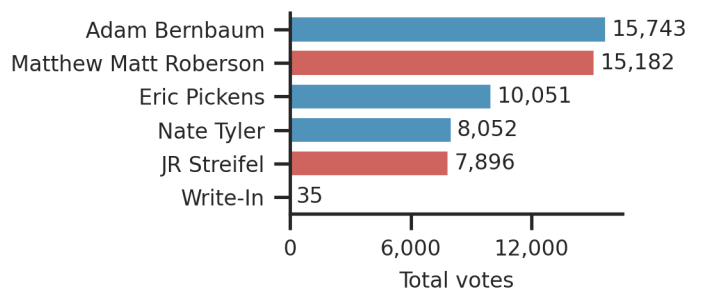


**Fig 3.49 | Voter turnout in LD24 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

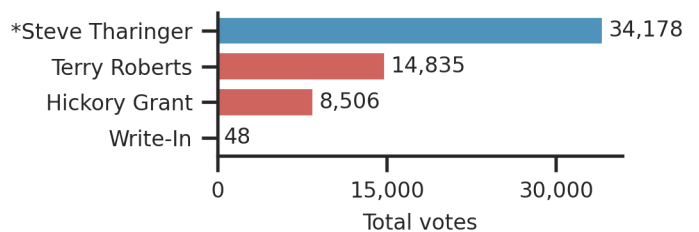

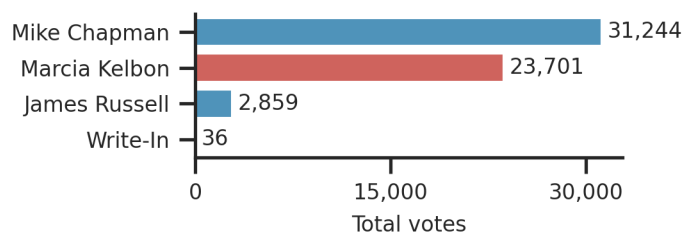

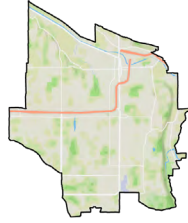


**Fig 3.50 | Election results in LD24 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

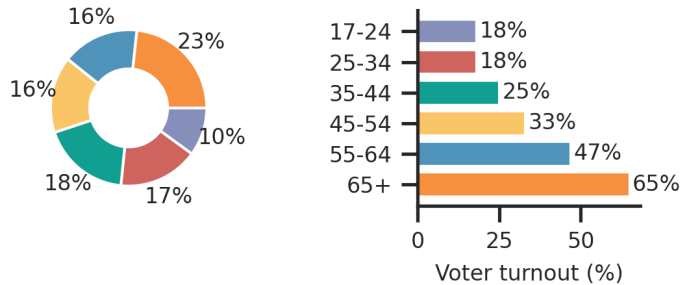

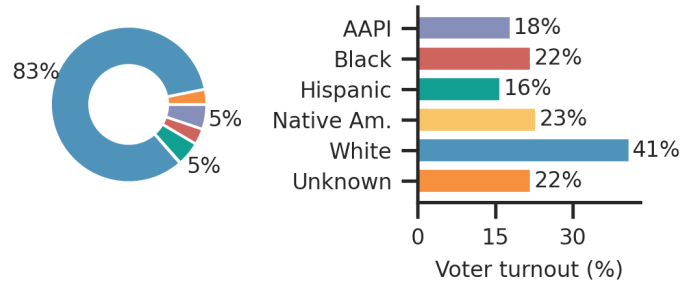

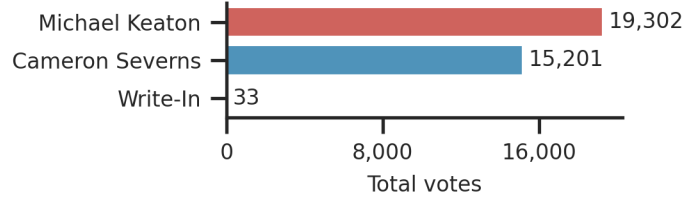


**Fig 3.51 | Voter turnout in LD25 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

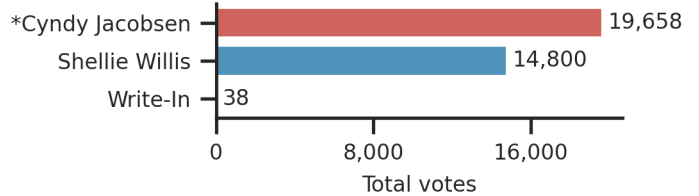

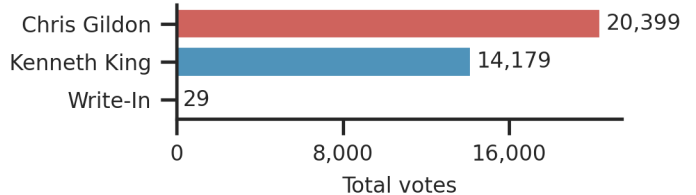

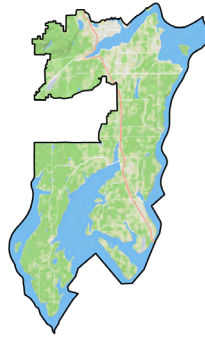


**Fig 3.52 | Election results in LD25 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

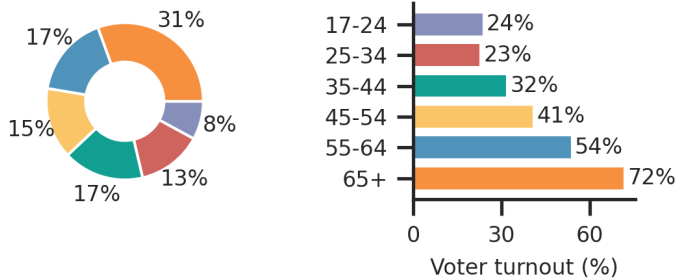

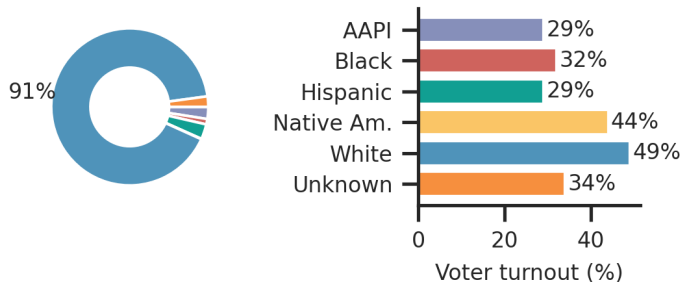

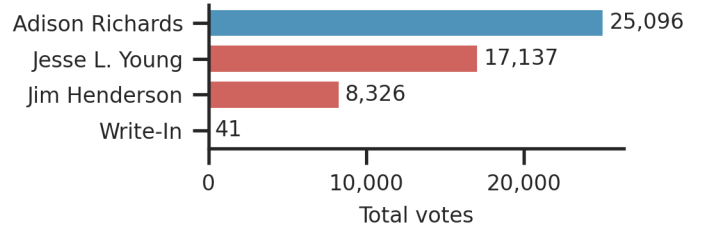
**Fig 3.53 | Voter turnout in LD26 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

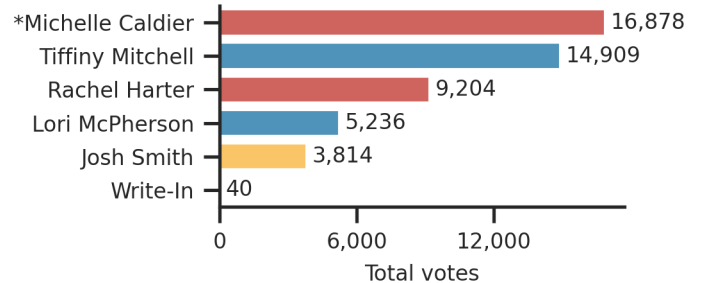

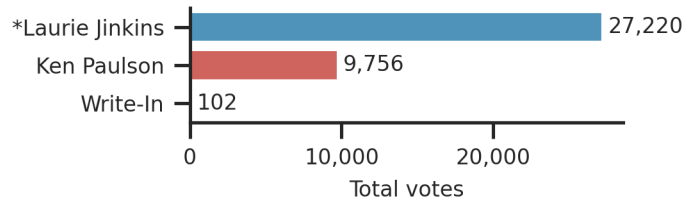


**Fig 3.55 | Voter turnout in LD27 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

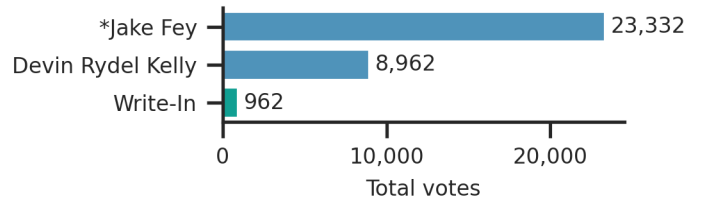

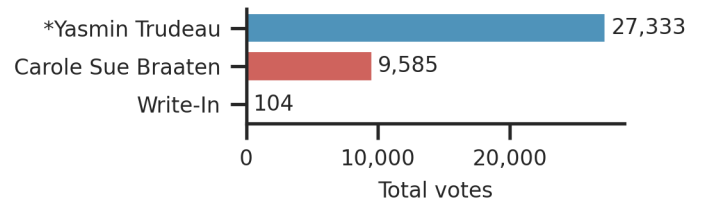

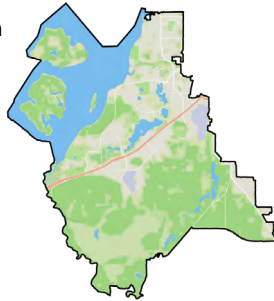


**Fig 3.56 | Election results in LD27 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

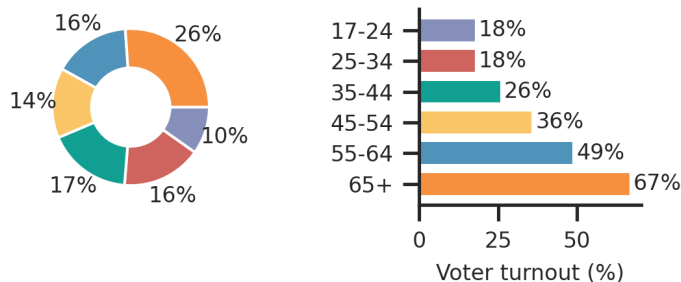

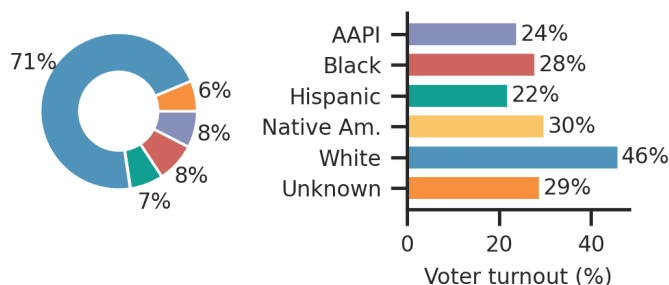

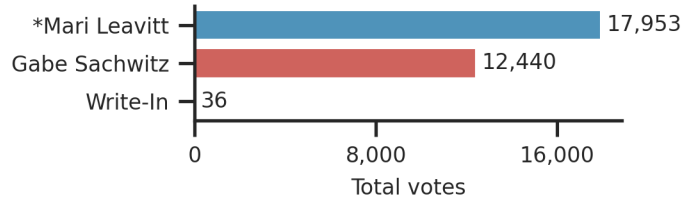


**Fig 3.57 | Voter turnout in LD28 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

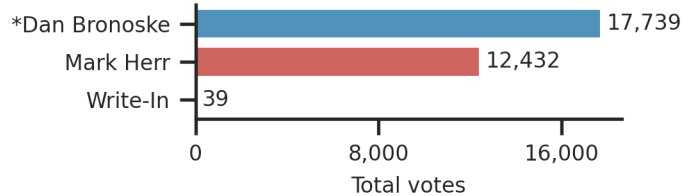

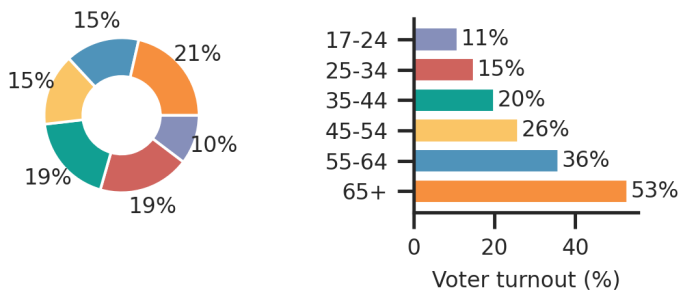

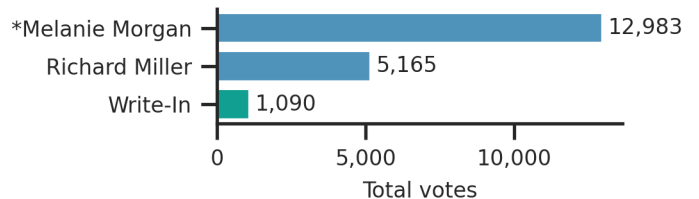
**Fig 3.59 | Voter turnout in LD29 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

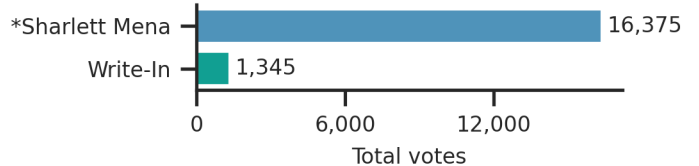

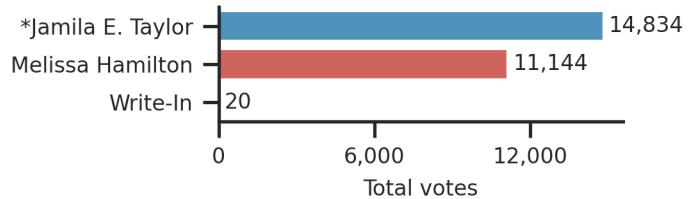
**Fig 3.61 | Voter turnout in LD30 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

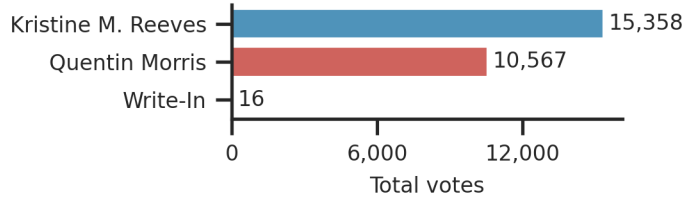

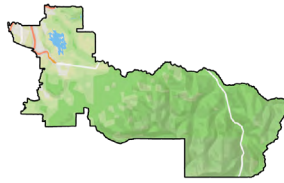


**Fig 3.62 | Election results in LD30 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

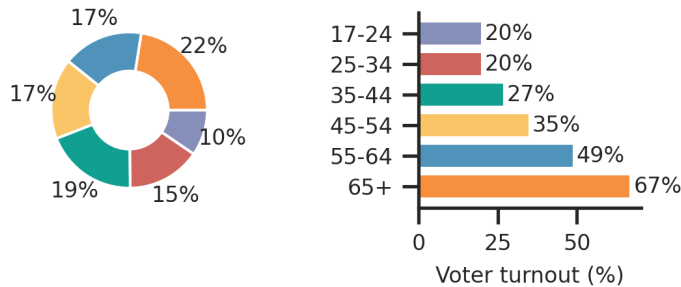

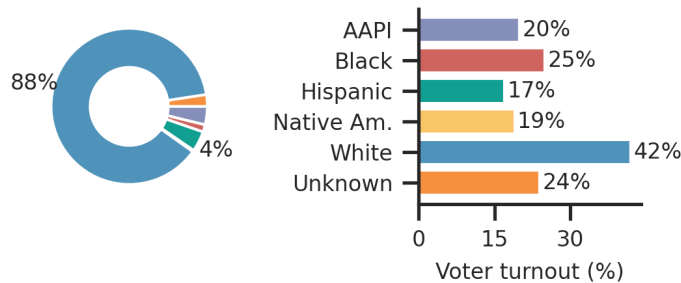

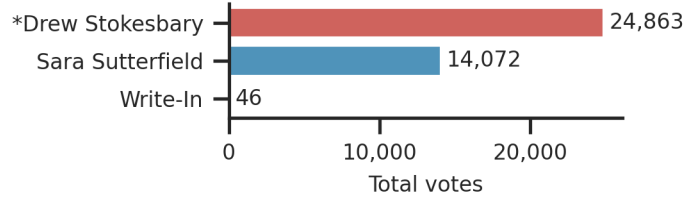
**Fig 3.63 | Voter turnout in LD31 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

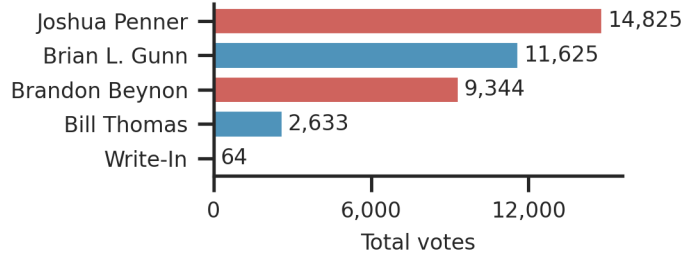

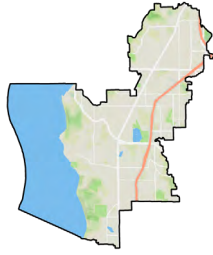
**Fig 3.64 | Election results in LD31 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

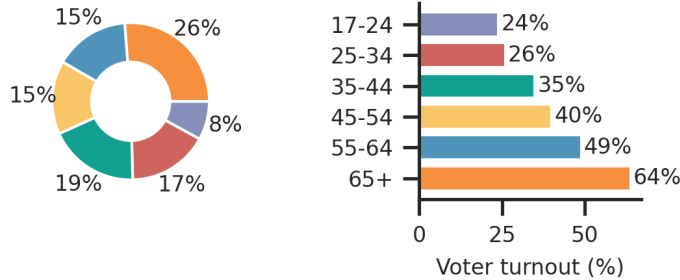

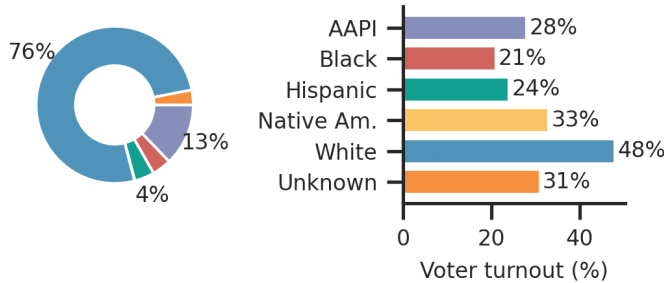

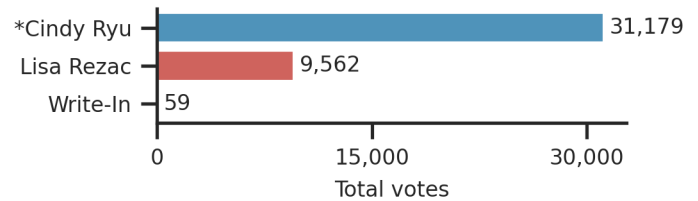
**Fig 3.65 | Voter turnout in LD32 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

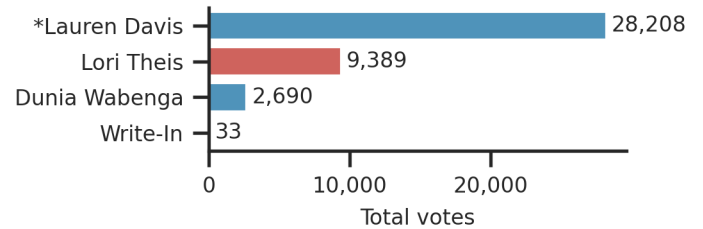

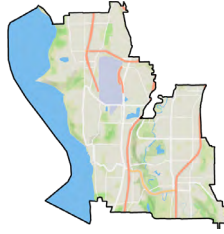


**Fig 3.66 | Election results in LD32 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

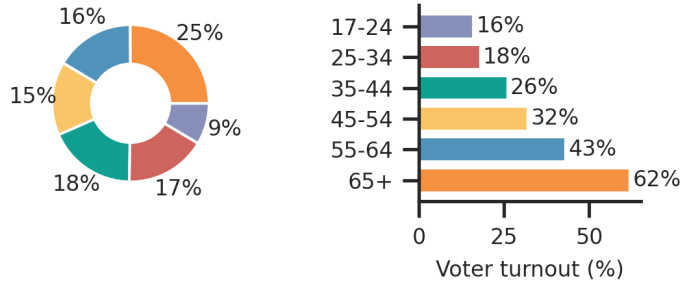

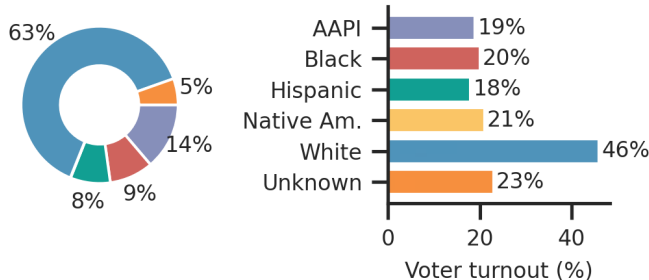

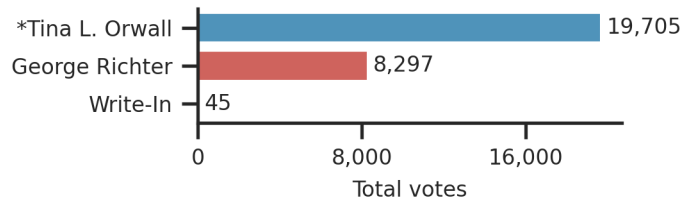
**Fig 3.67 | Voter turnout in LD33 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

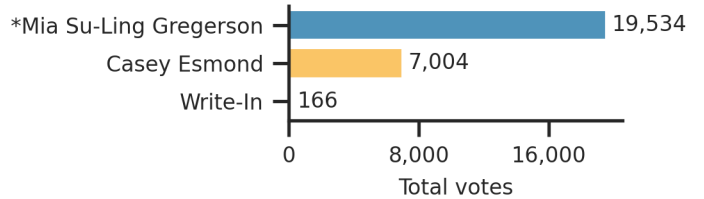

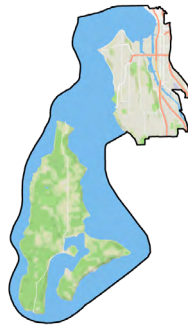


**Fig 3.68 | Election results in LD33 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

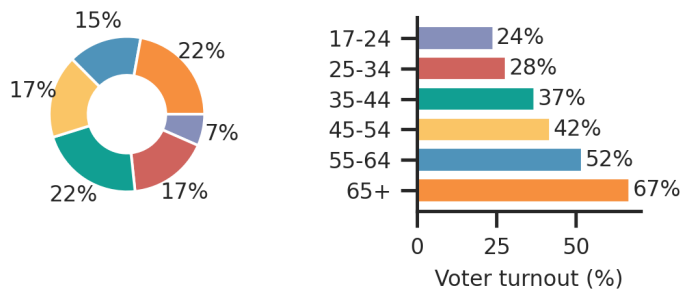

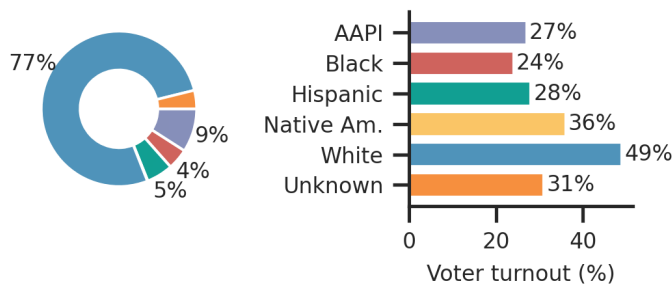

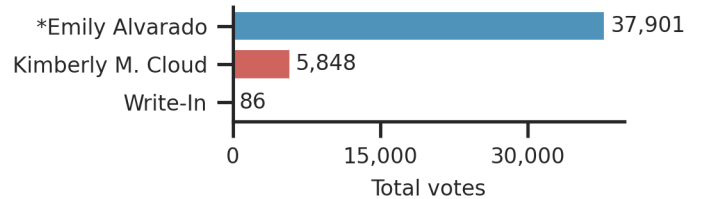
**Fig 3.69 | Voter turnout in LD34 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

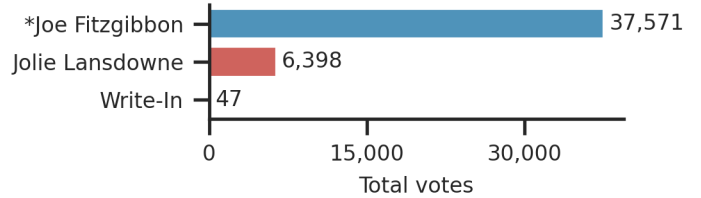

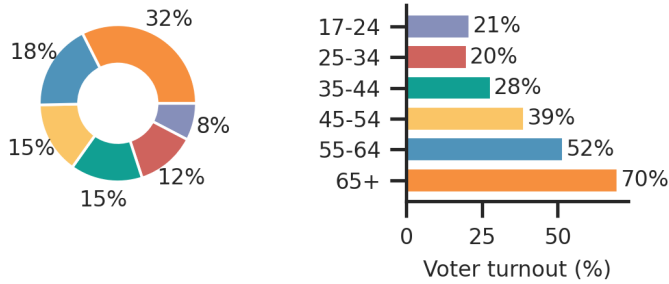

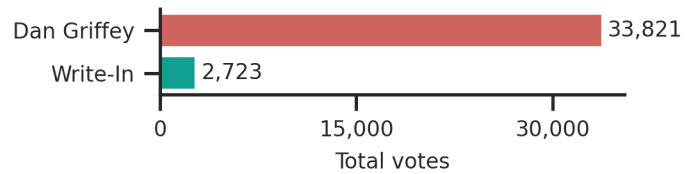
**Fig 3.71 | Voter turnout in LD35 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

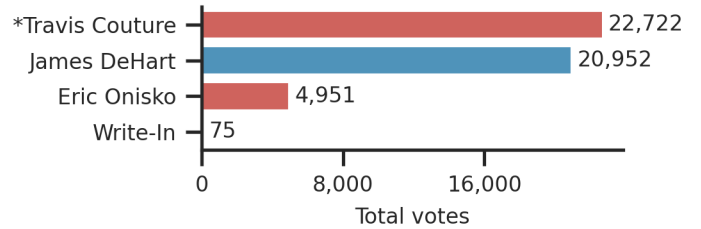

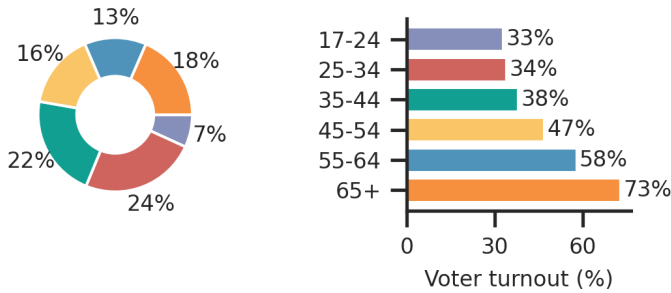

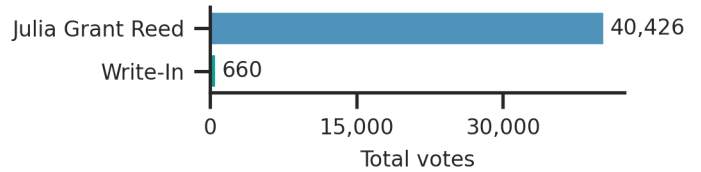
**Fig 3.73 | Voter turnout in LD36 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

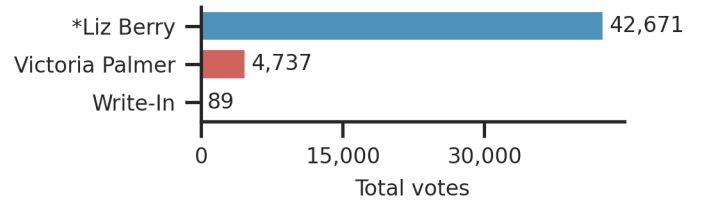

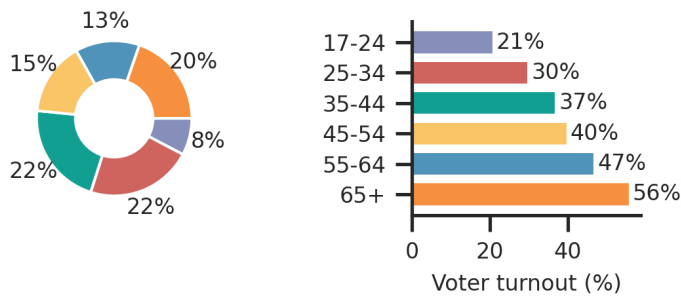

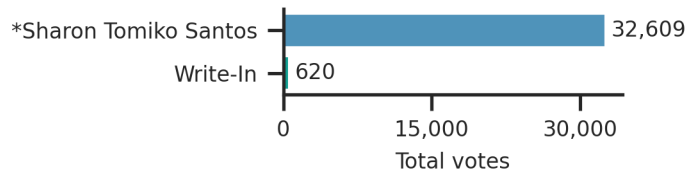
**Fig 3.75 | Voter turnout in LD37 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

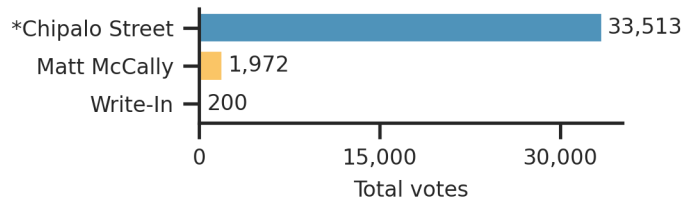

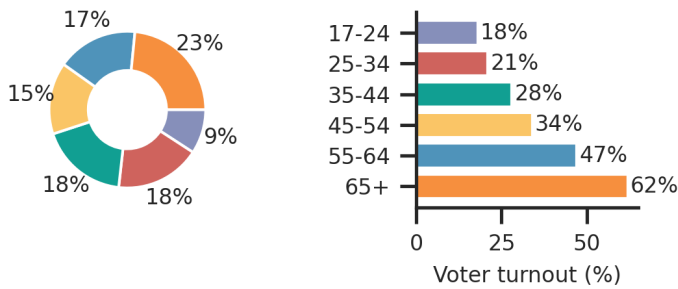

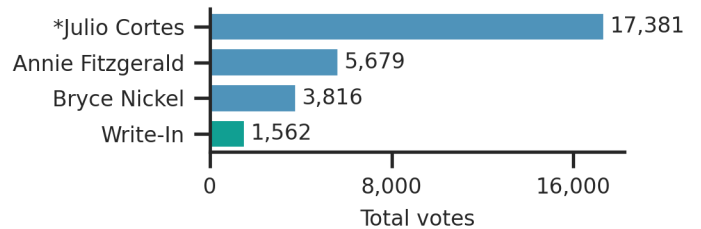
**Fig 3.77 | Voter turnout in LD38 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

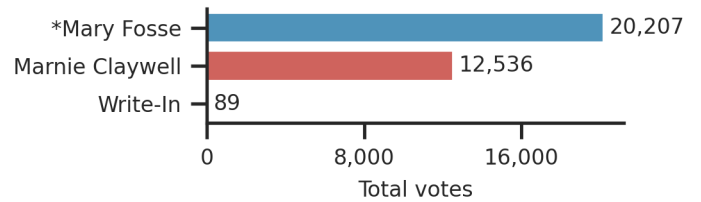

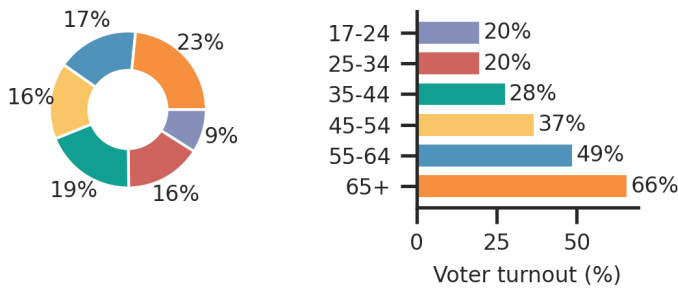

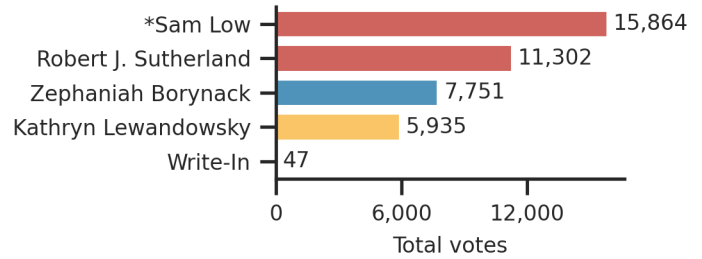


**Fig 3.79 | Voter turnout in LD39 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

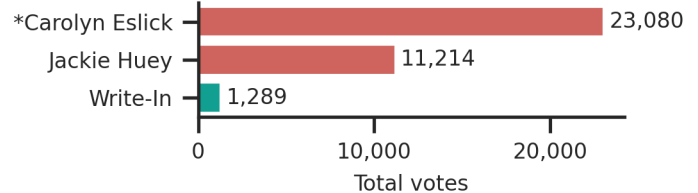

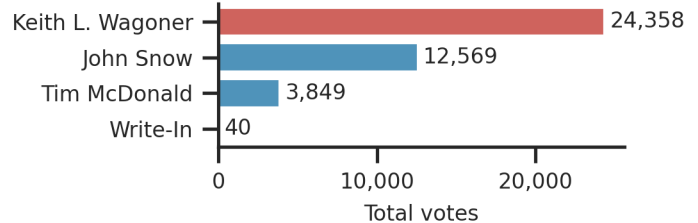

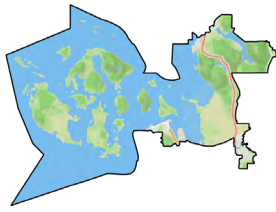


**Fig 3.80 | Election results in LD39 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

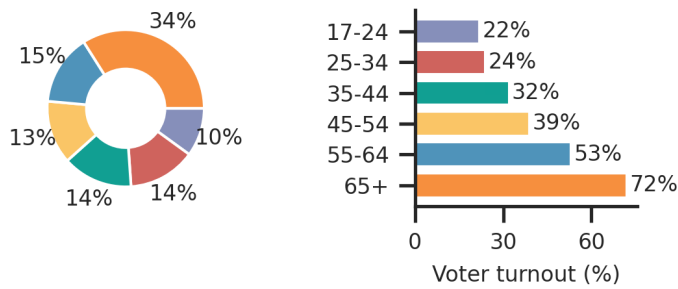

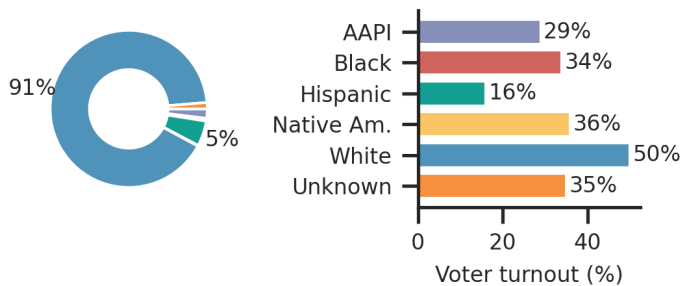

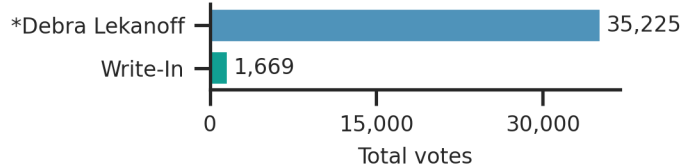


**Fig 3.81 | Voter turnout in LD40 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

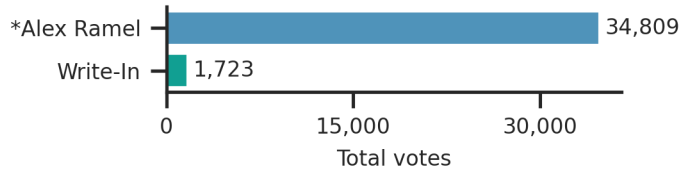

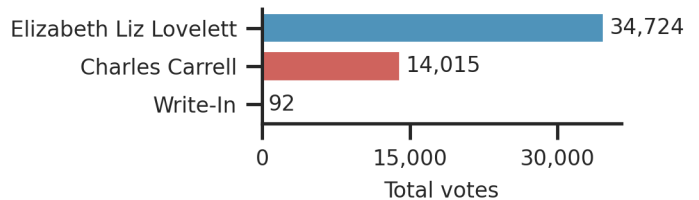

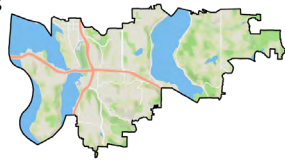


**Fig 3.82 | Election results in LD40 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

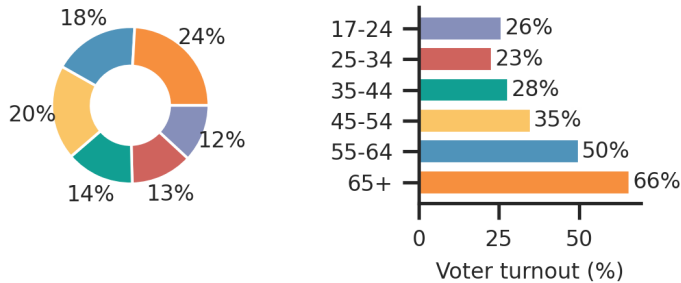

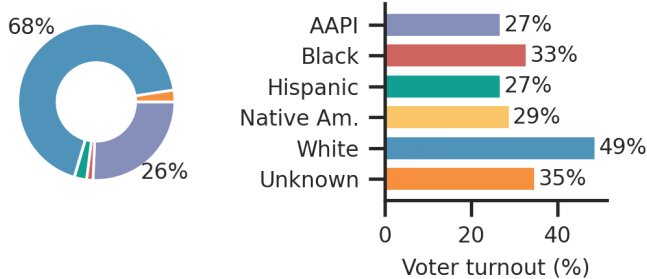

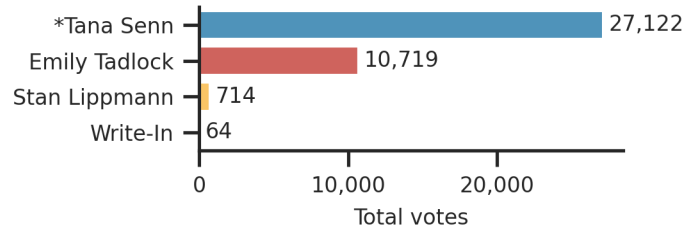
**Fig 3.83 | Voter turnout in LD41 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

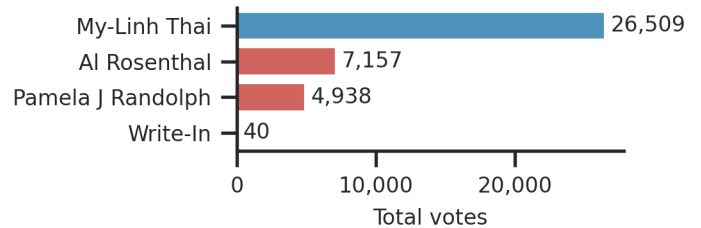

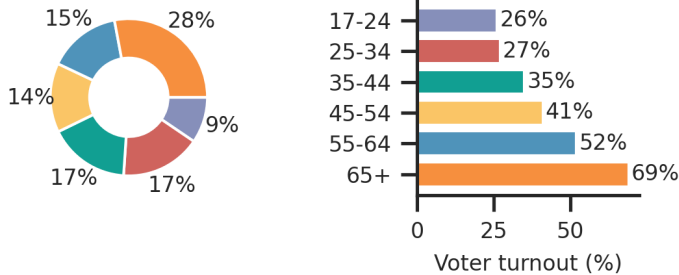

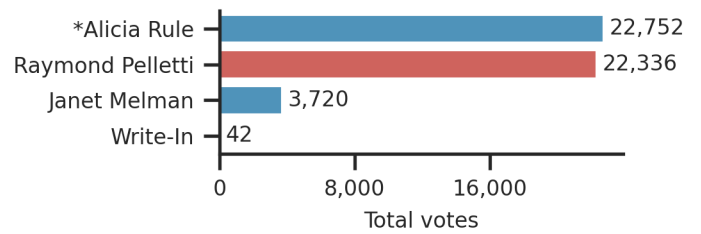
**Fig 3.85 | Voter turnout in LD42 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

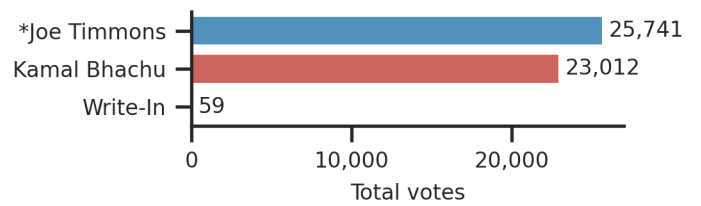

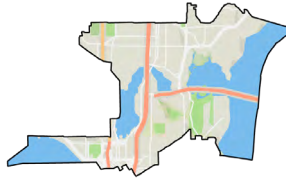


**Fig 3.86 | Election results in LD42 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

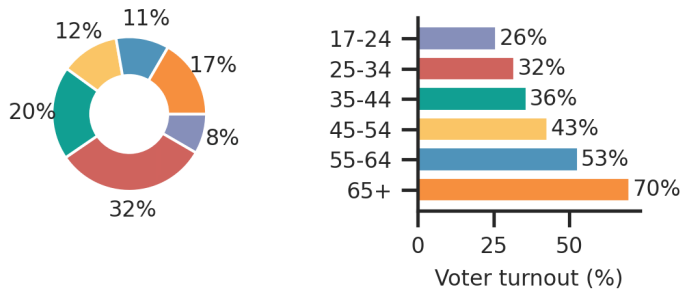

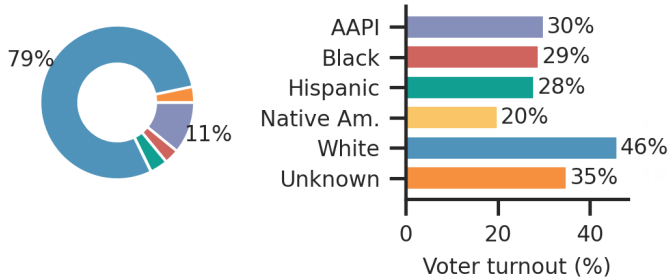

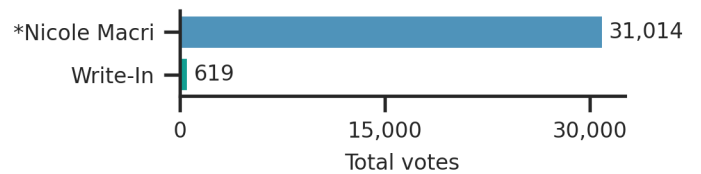
**Fig 3.87 | Voter turnout in LD43 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

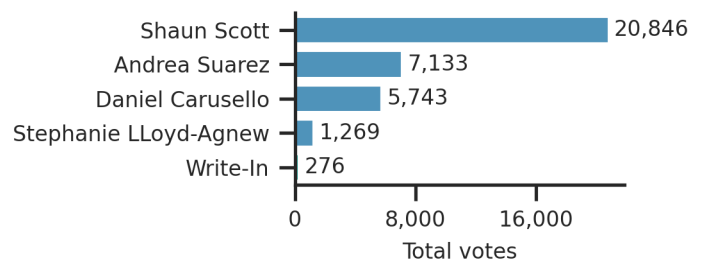

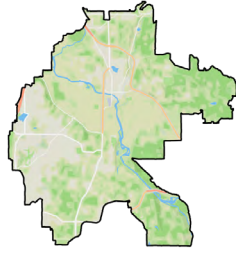


**Fig 3.88 | Election results in LD43 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

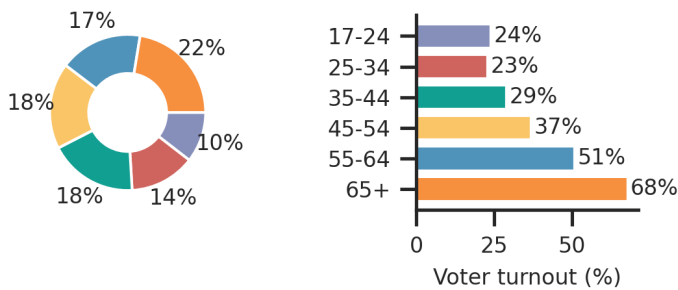

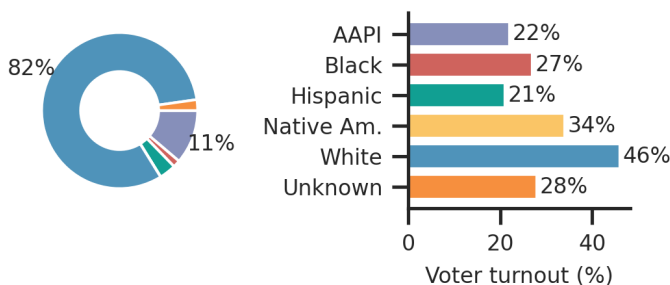

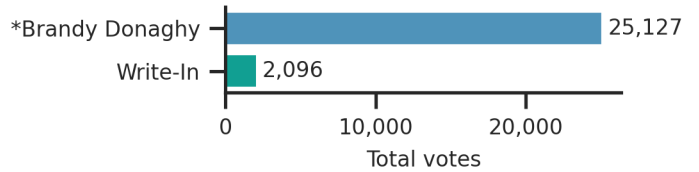
**Fig 3.89 | Voter turnout in LD44 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

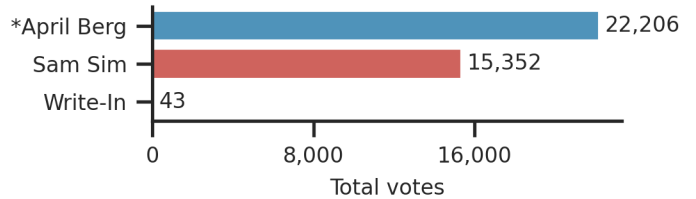

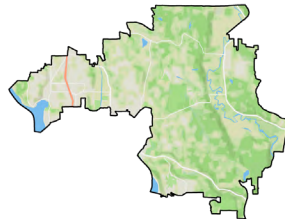


**Fig 3.90 | Election results in LD44 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

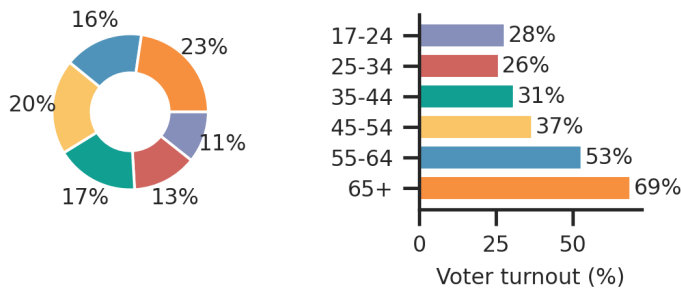

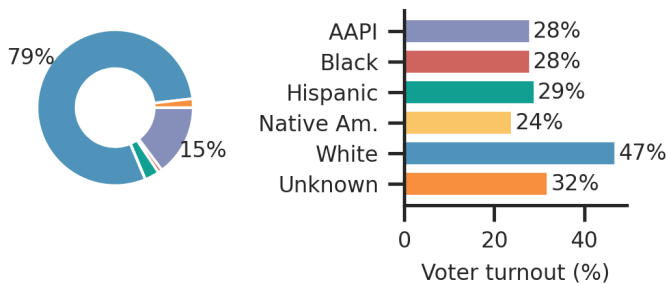

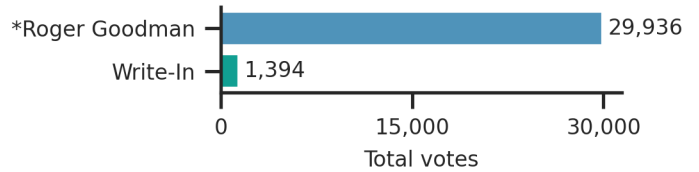
**Fig 3.91 | Voter turnout in LD45 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

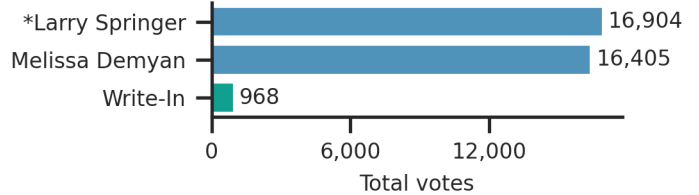

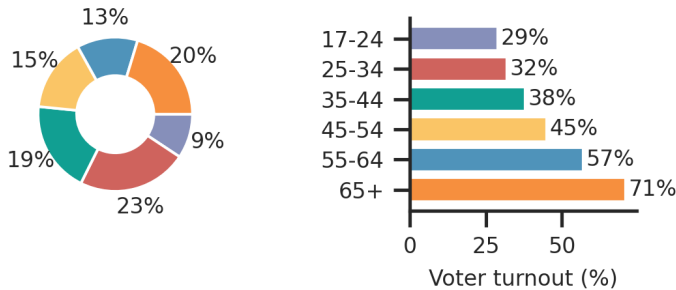

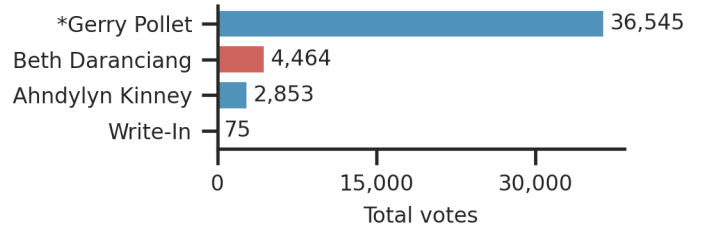


**Fig 3.93 | Voter turnout in LD46 for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

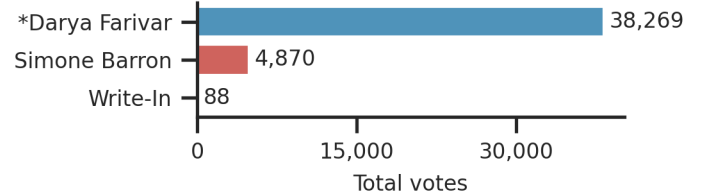

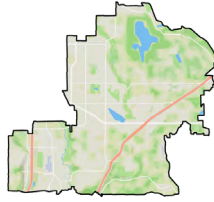


**Fig 3.94 | Election results in LD46 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

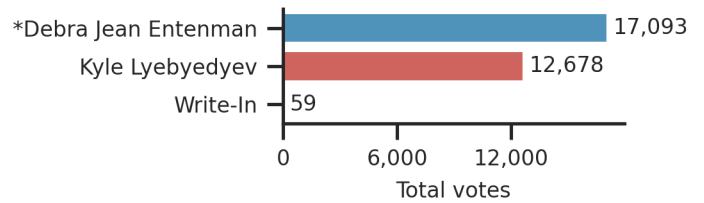

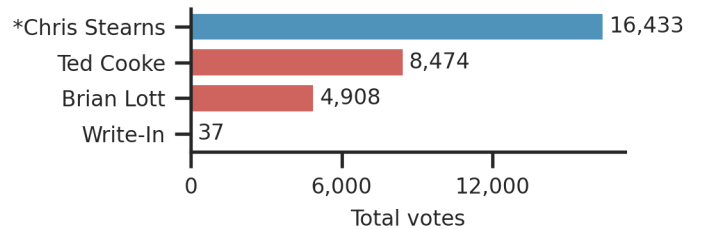
**Fig 3.95 | Voter turnout in LD47 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

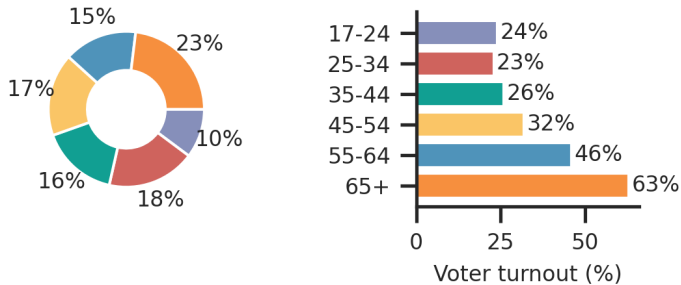

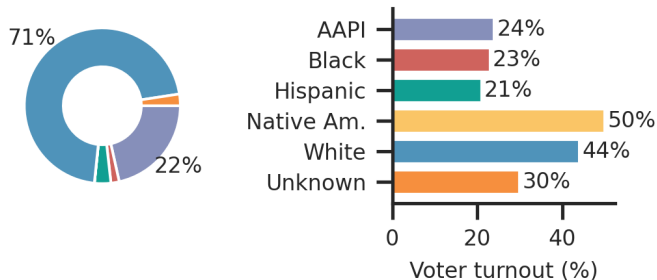

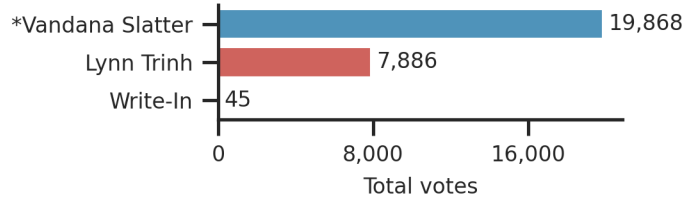
**Fig 3.97 | Voter turnout in LD48 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

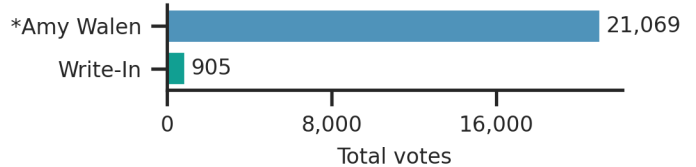

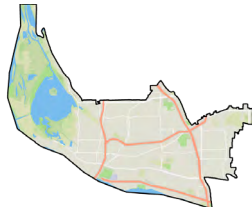


**Fig 3.98 | Election results in LD48 for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference, and asterisks indicate incumbents.

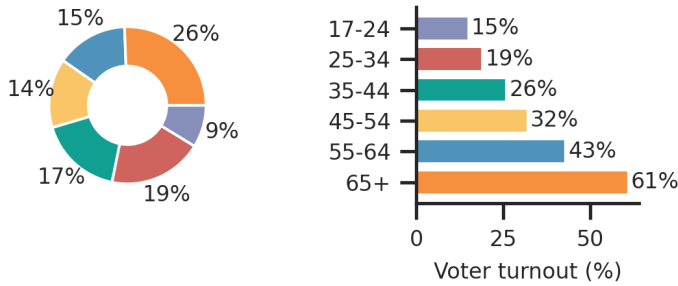

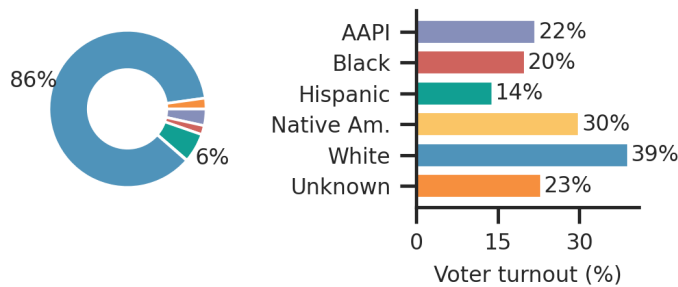

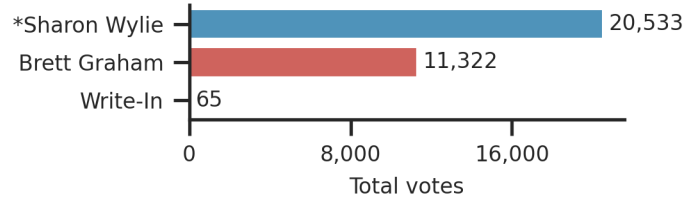
**Fig 3.99 | Voter turnout in LD49 for the 2024 Primary Election.**

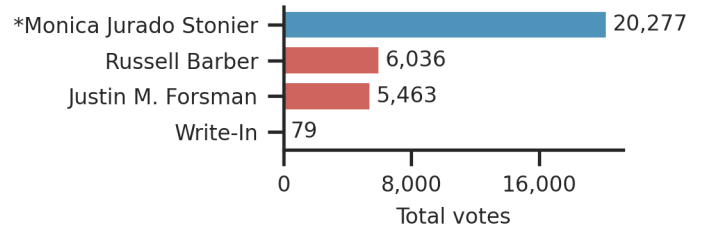

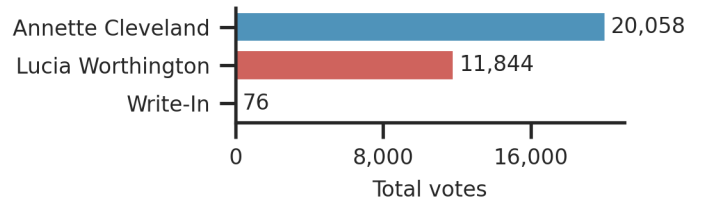

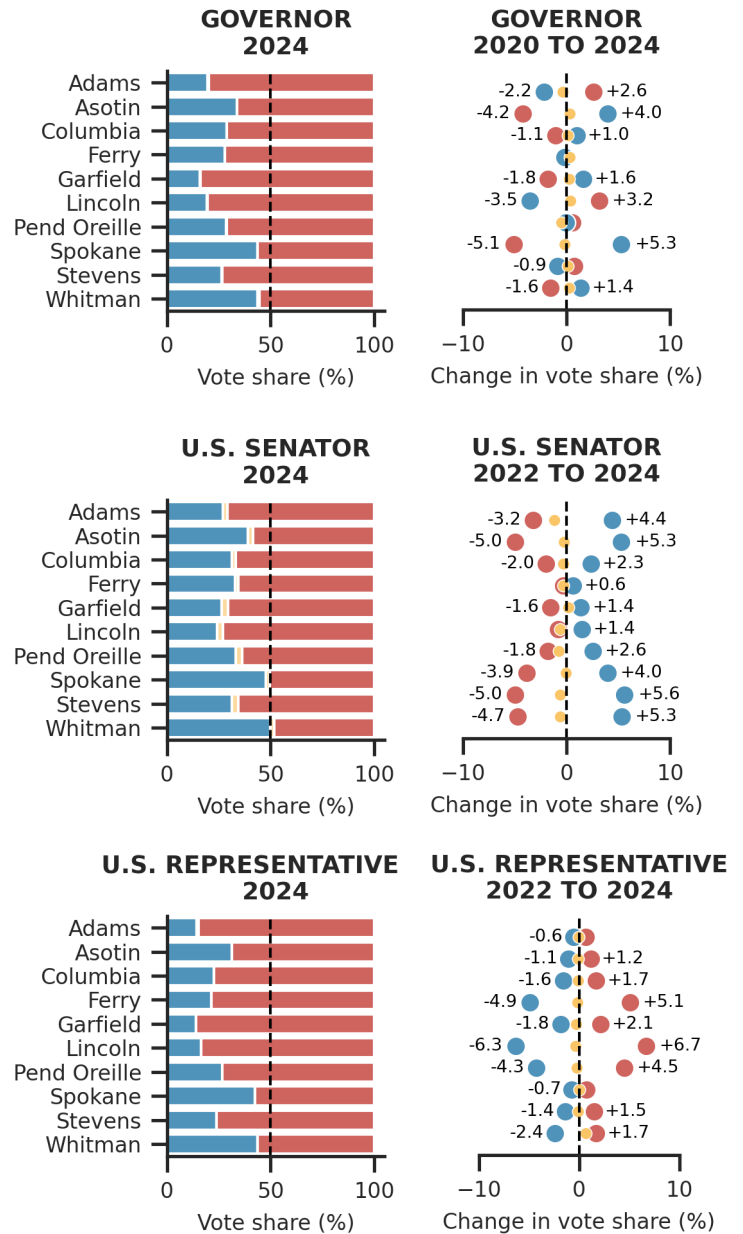


**Fig 4.1 | Voter turnout in Eastern WA for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

## Election results

In the 2024 Primary Election, Maria Cantwell (D) received the largest vote share in three counties in Eastern WA: Spokane, Whitman, and Asotin. However, Republican candidates in all statewide races (statewide executives, U.S. Senate, U.S. House) cumulatively received  $\geq 50\%$  of the vote in all counties in Eastern WA. Relative to 2022,

Democratic candidates for U.S. Senate increased their vote share in every county, while Democratic candidates for U.S. House decreased their vote share. Although Democratic candidates for statewide offices increased their vote share in a handful of counties – particularly Spokane and Asotin – Republican candidates still received a majority of the vote throughout Eastern WA.

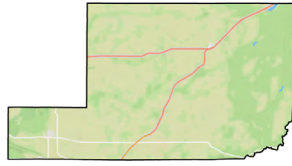


**Fig 4.2 | Election results in Eastern WA for the 2024 Primary Election.** (left) Results were aggregated by party for statewide and federal races for the 2024 Primary Election, and (right) the relative change in vote share was calculate (vs 2020 or 2022).

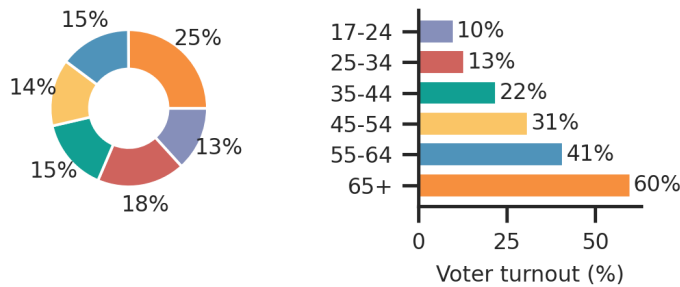

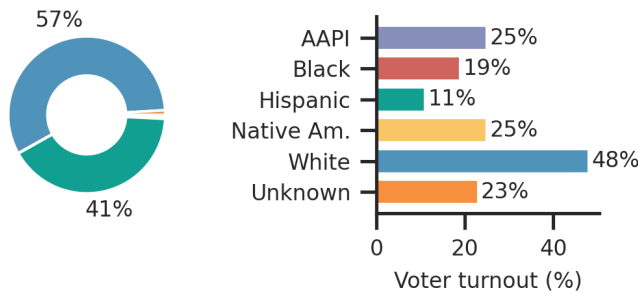

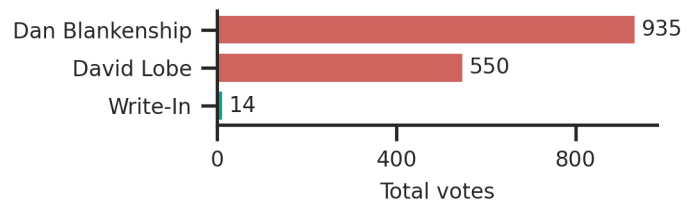


**Fig 4.3 | Voter turnout in Adams County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

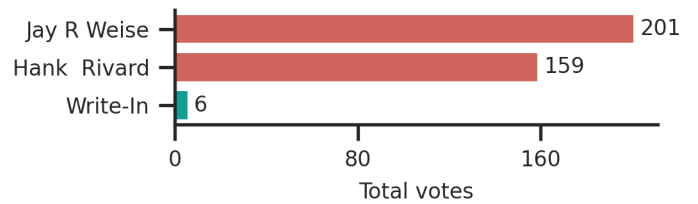

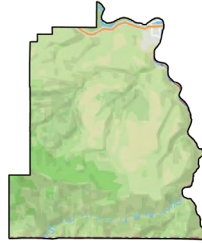


**Fig 4.4 | Election results in Adams County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

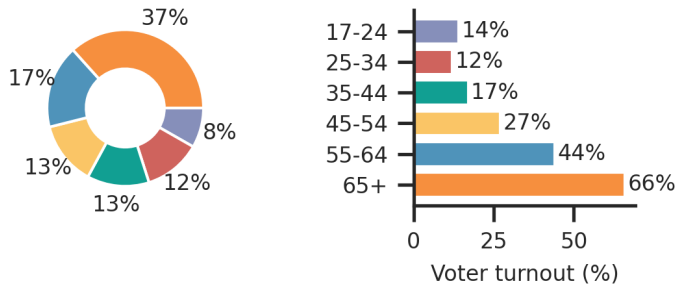

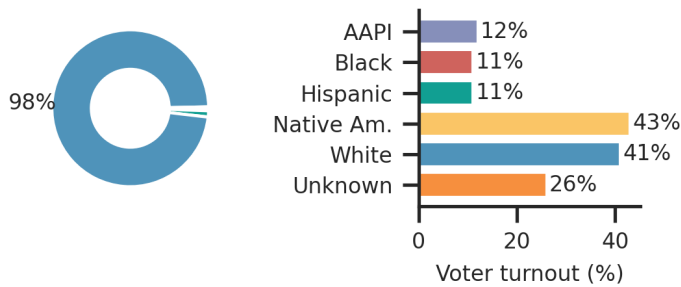

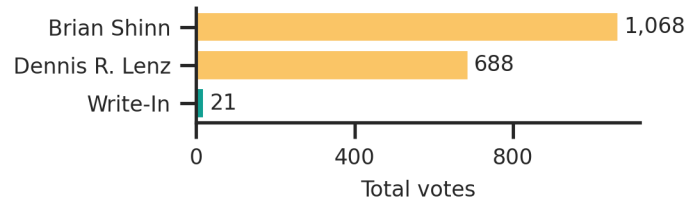


**Fig 4.5 | Voter turnout in Asotin County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

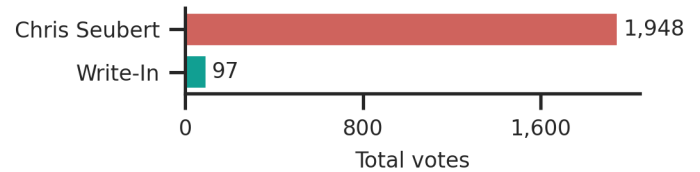

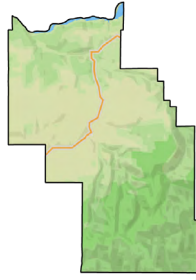


**Fig 4.6 | Election results in Asotin County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

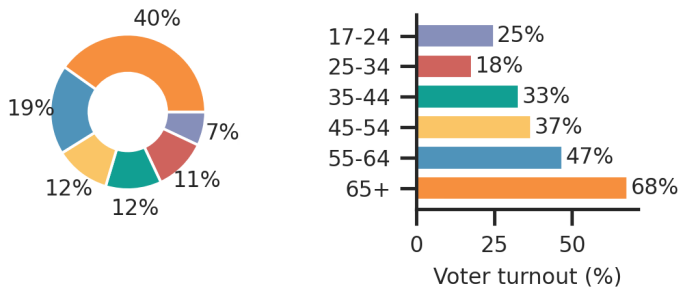

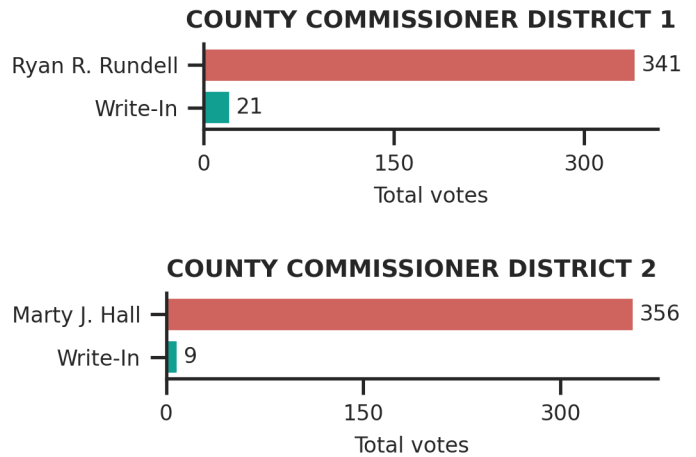

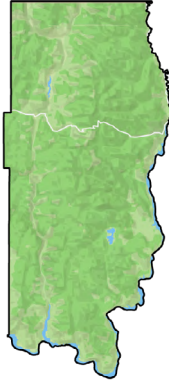


**Fig 4.8 | Election results in Columbia County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Both races were uncontested; bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

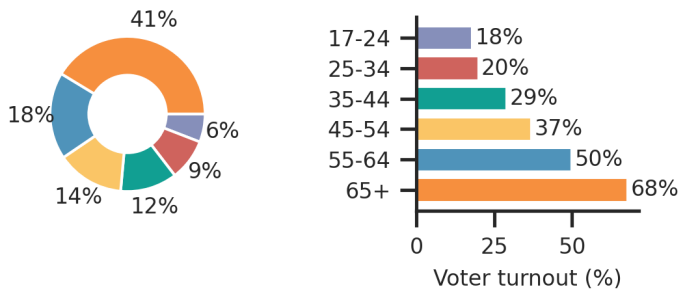

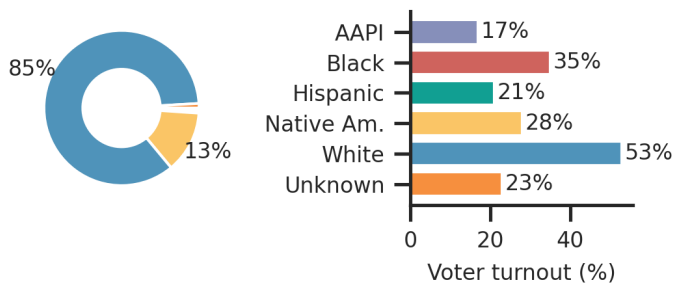

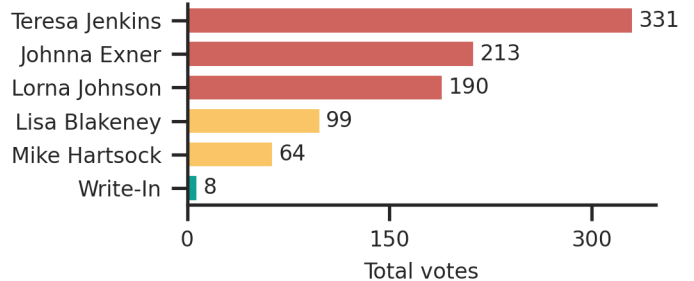


**Fig 4.9 | Voter turnout in Ferry County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

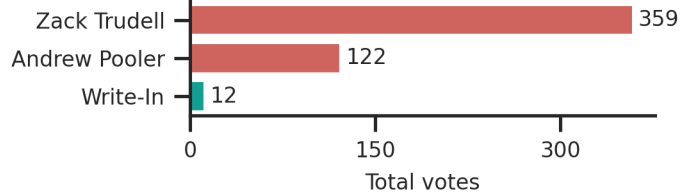

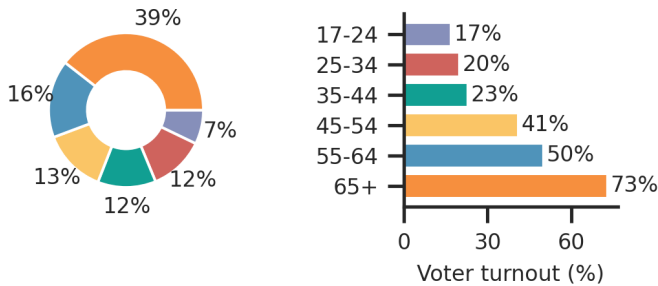

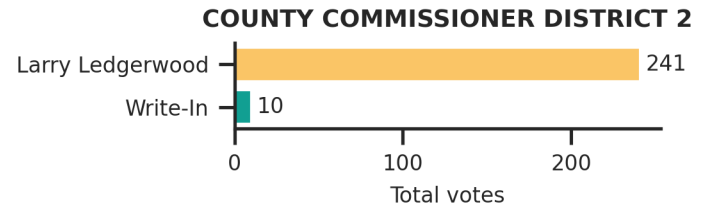
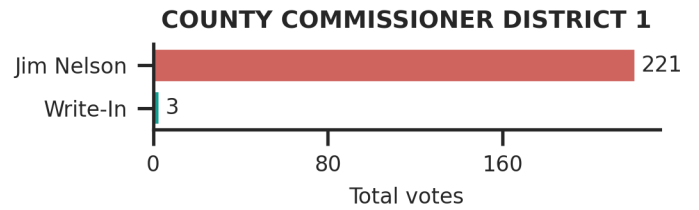

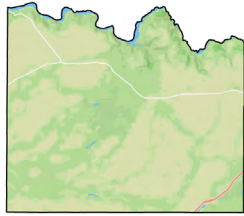


**Fig 4.12 | Election results in Garfield County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Both races were uncontested; bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

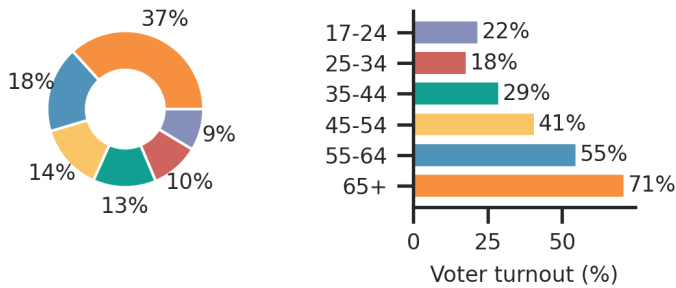

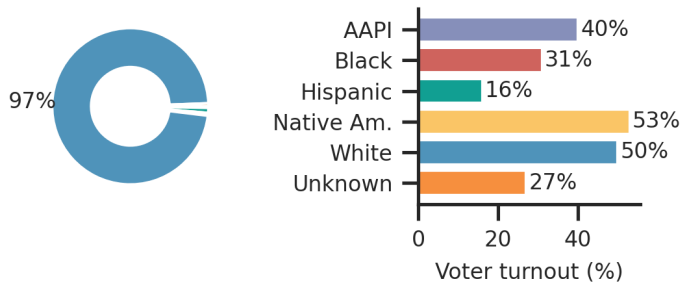

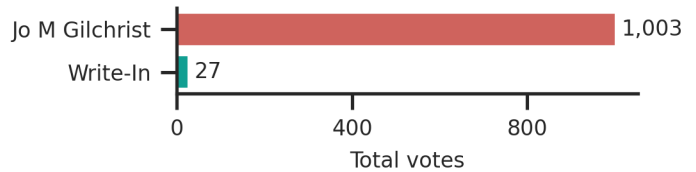


**Fig 4.13 | Voter turnout in Lincoln County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

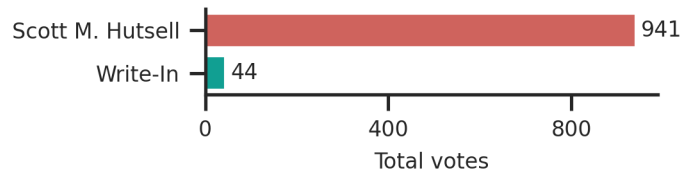

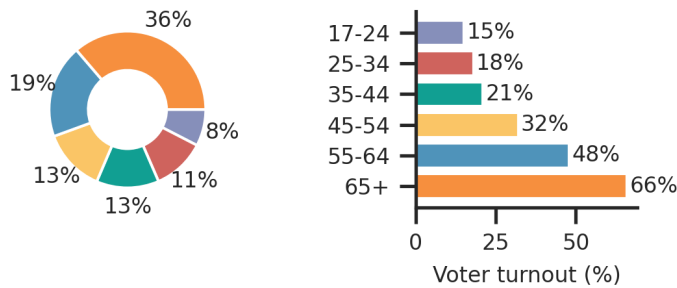

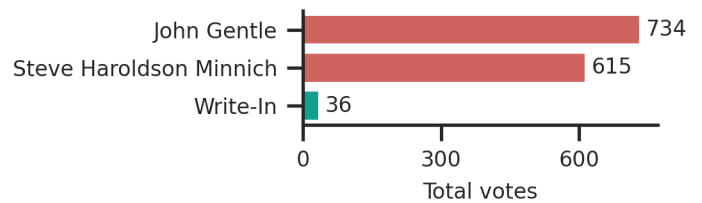


**Fig 4.15 | Voter turnout in Pend Oreille County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

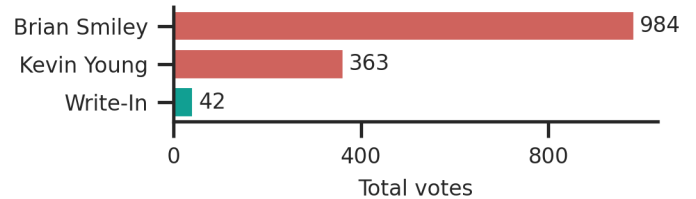

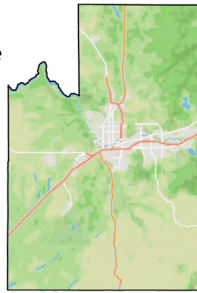


**Fig 4.16 | Election results in Pend Oreille County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

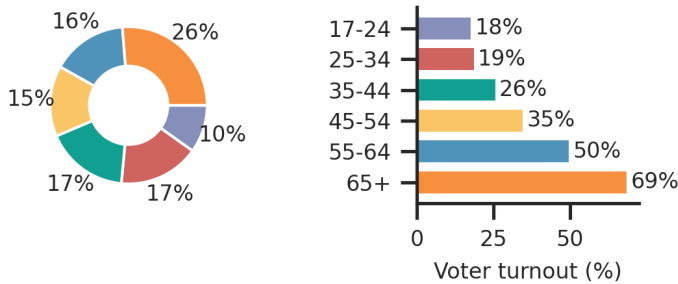

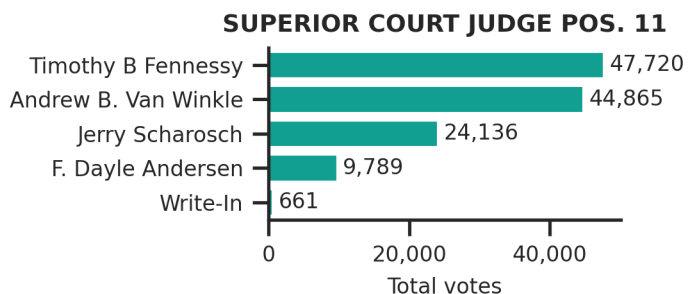
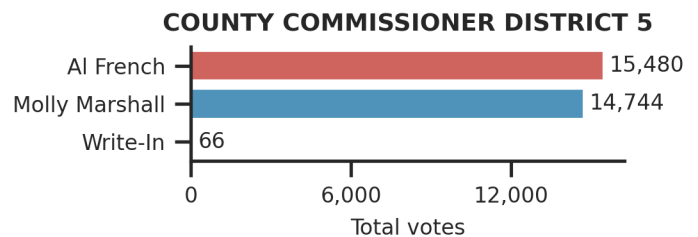
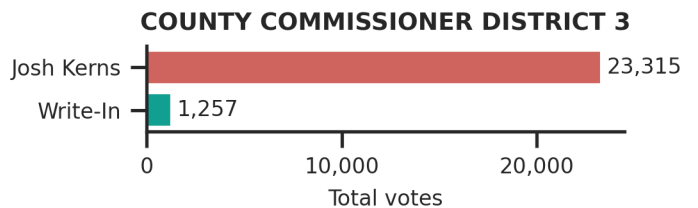
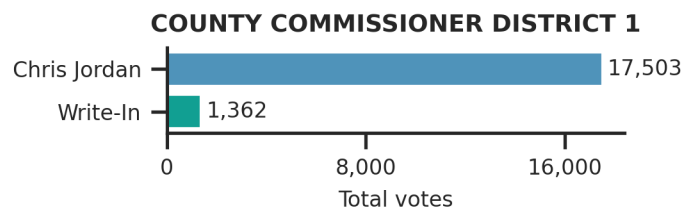


**Fig 4.17 | Voter turnout in Spokane County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

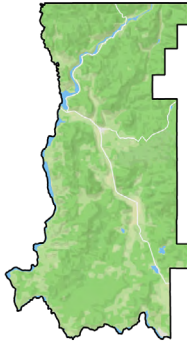


**Fig 4.18 | Election results in Spokane County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

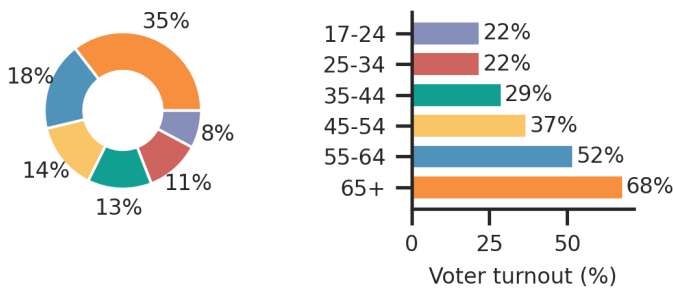

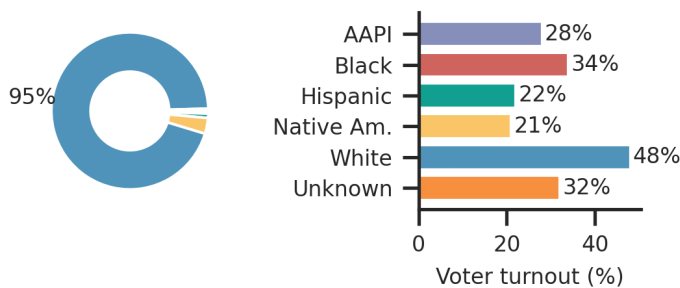

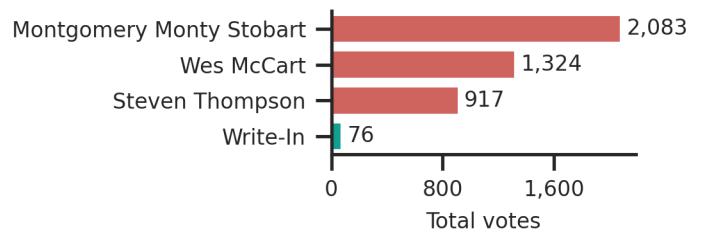


**Fig 4.19 | Voter turnout in Stevens County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

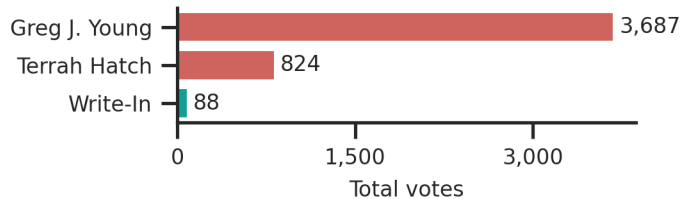

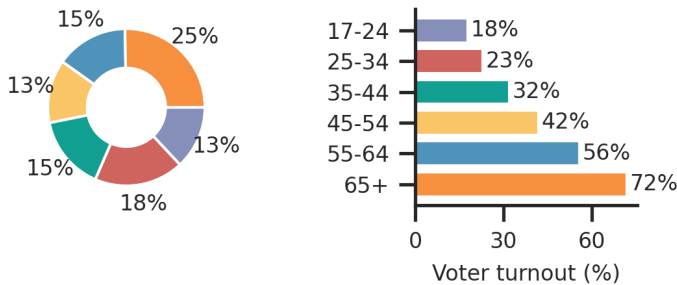

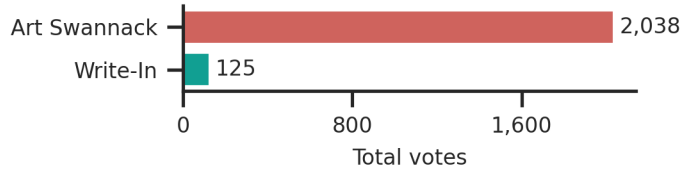


**Fig 4.21 | Voter turnout in Whitman County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

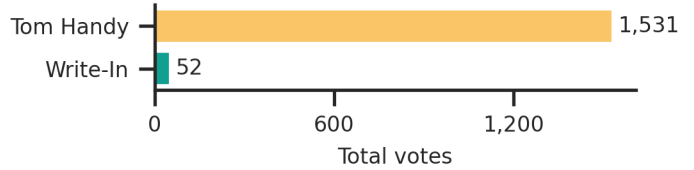

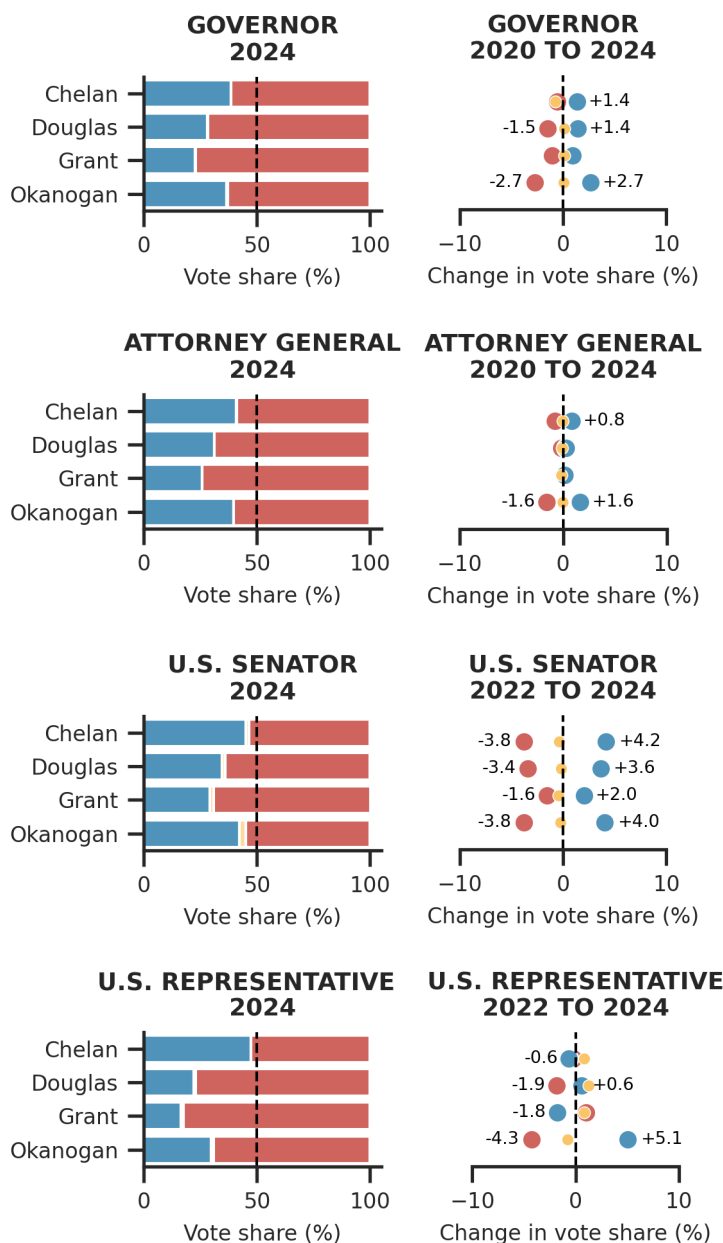


**Fig 5.1 | Voter turnout in North Central WA for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

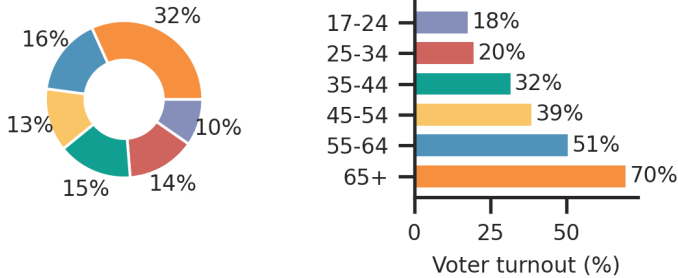

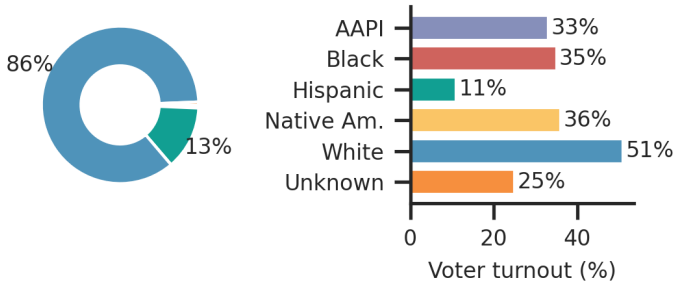

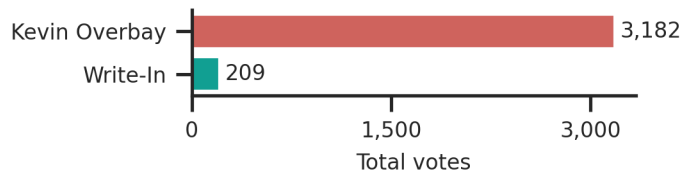


**Fig 5.3 | Voter turnout in Chelan County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

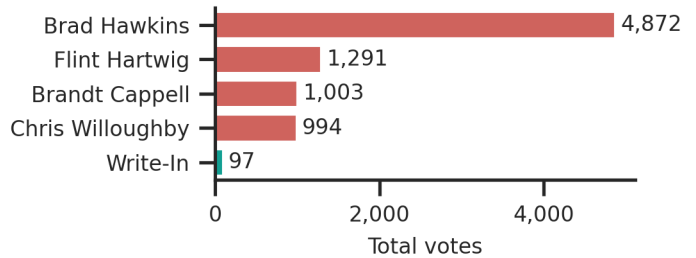

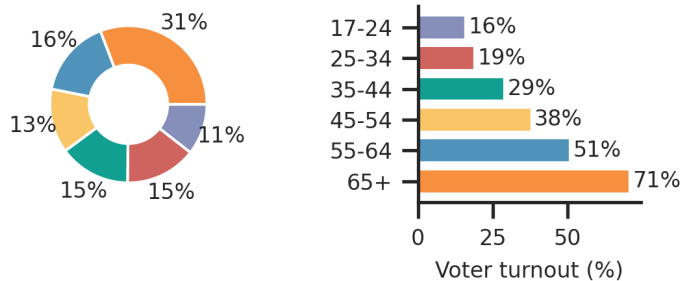

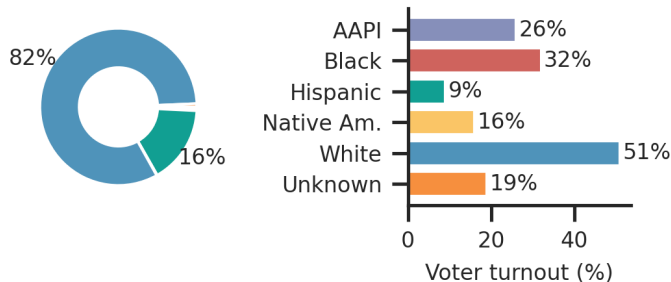

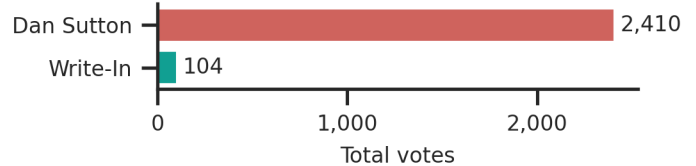


**Fig 5.5 | Voter turnout in Douglas County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

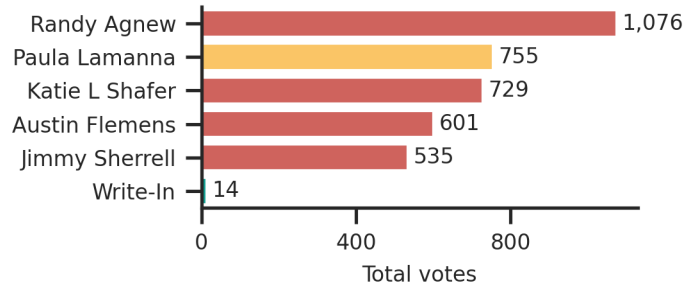

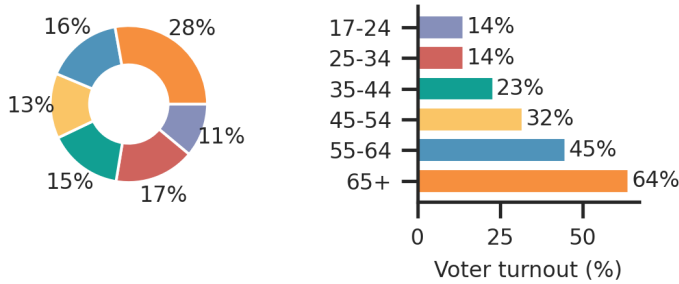

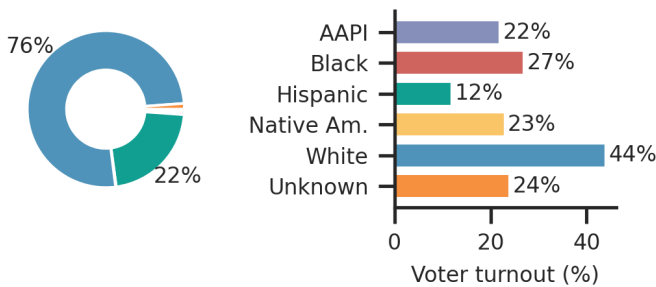

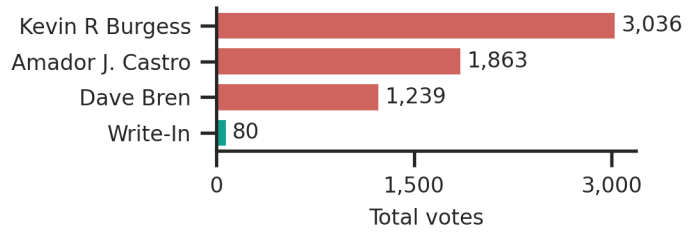


**Fig 5.7 | Voter turnout in Grant County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

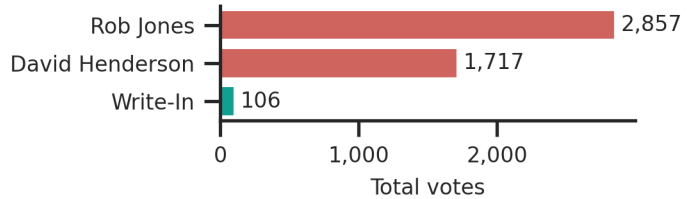

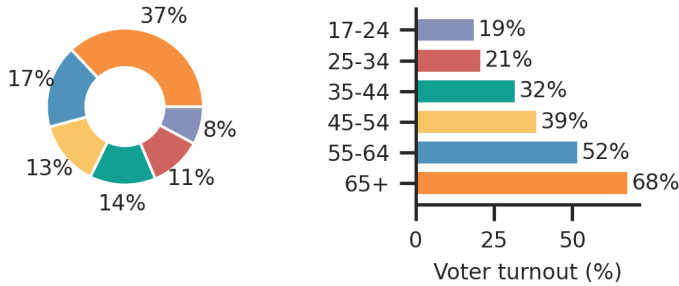

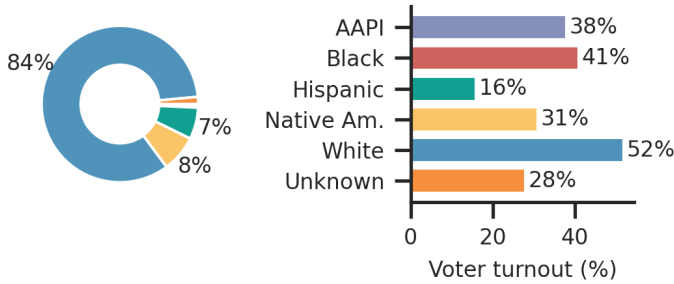

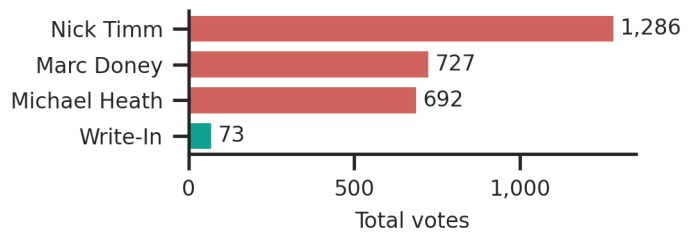


**Fig 5.9 | Voter turnout in Okanogan County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

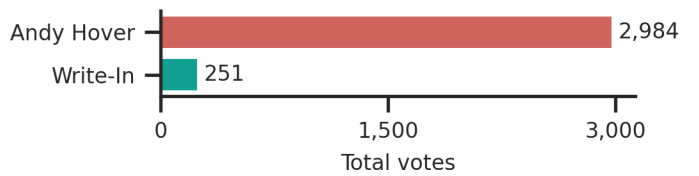

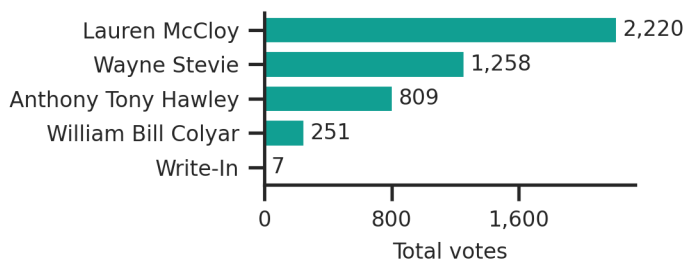

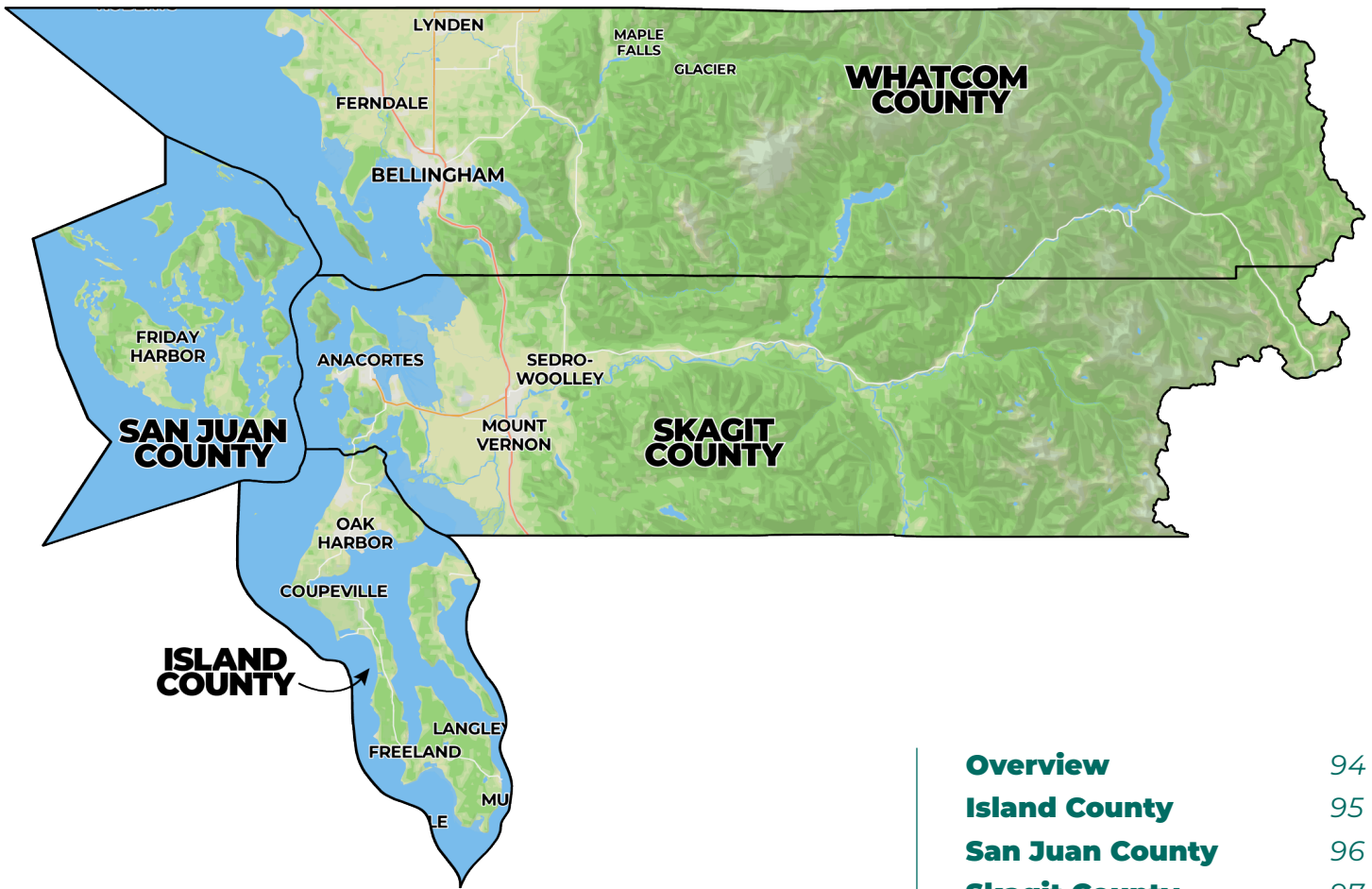

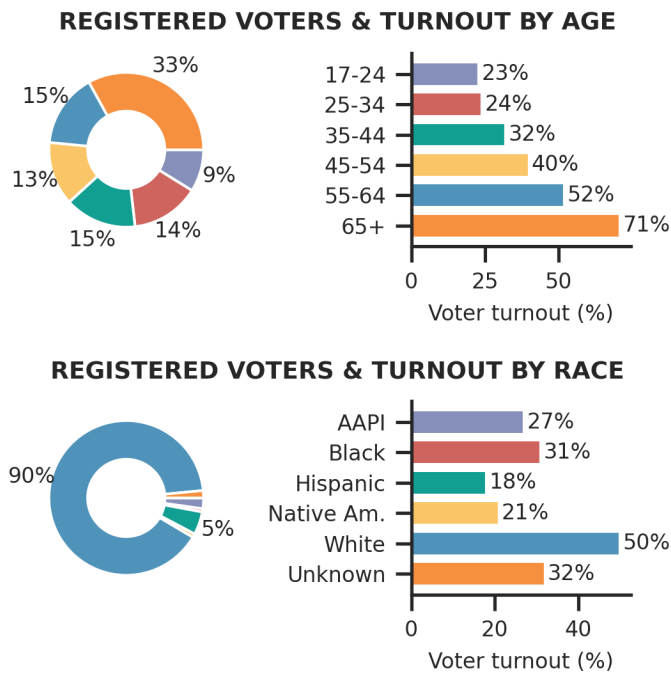

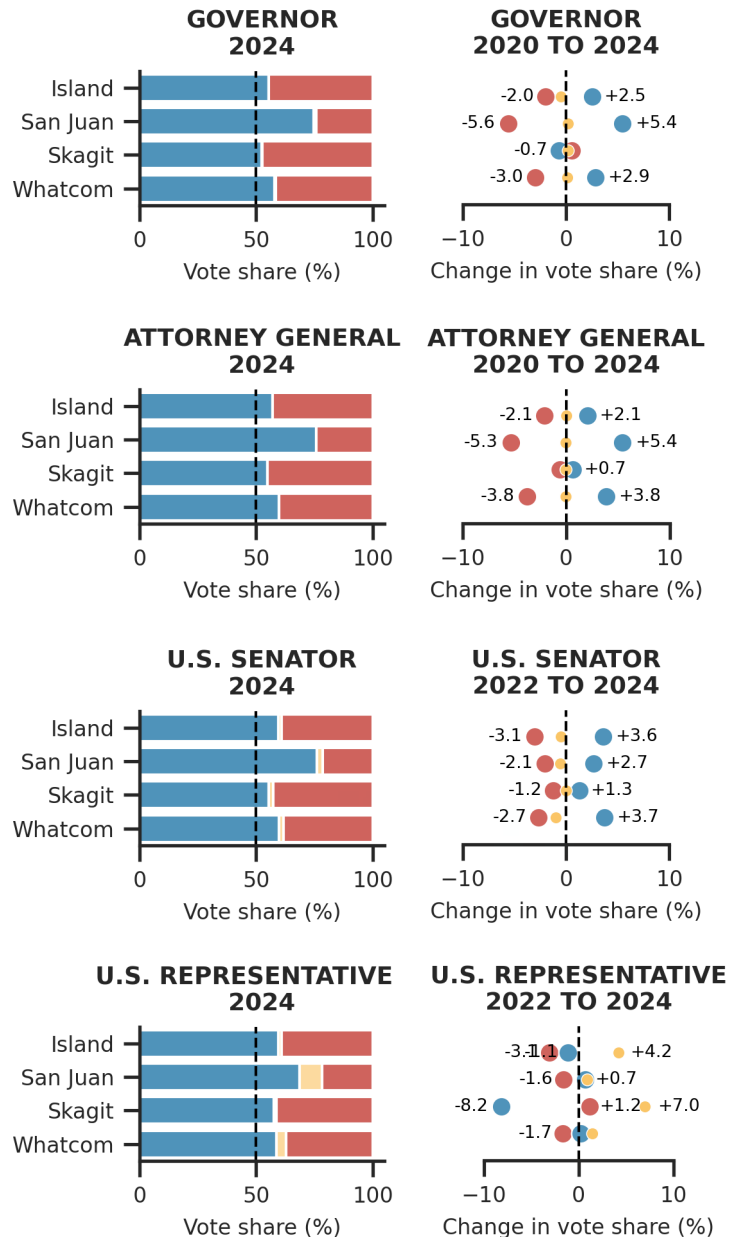


**Fig 6.1 | Voter turnout in Northwestern WA for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

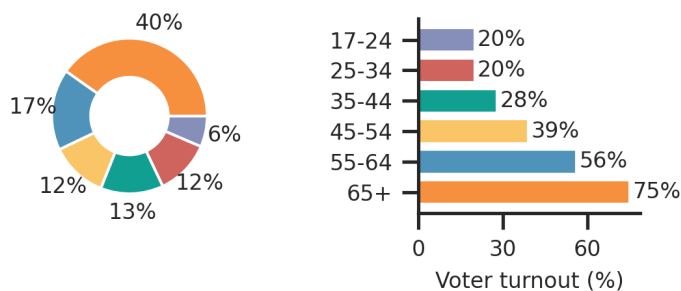

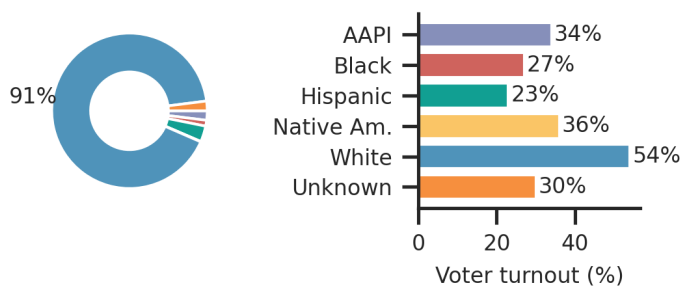

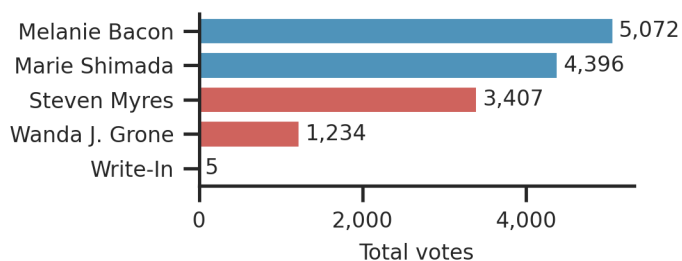


**Fig 6.3 | Voter turnout in Island County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

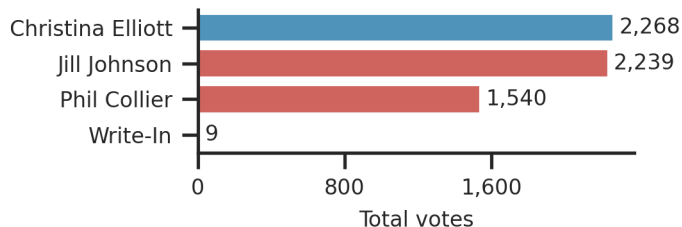

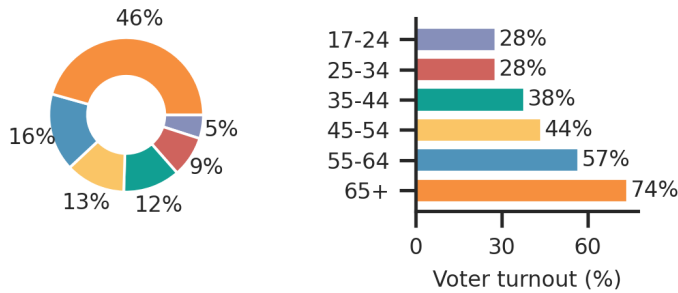

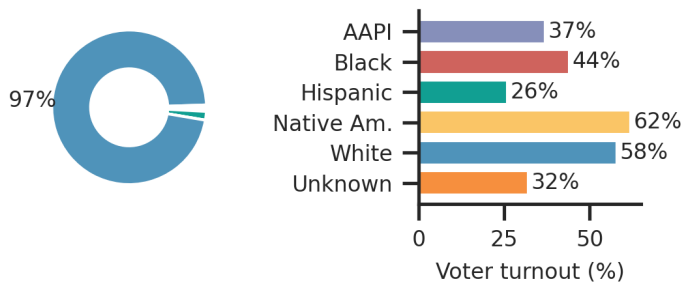

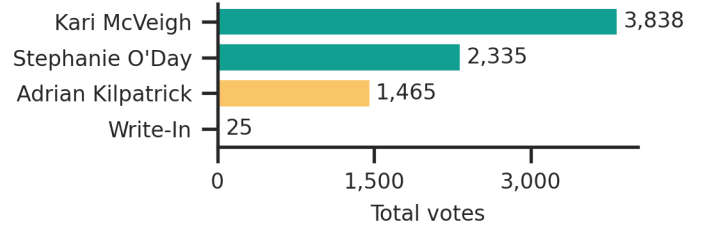


**Fig 6.5 | Voter turnout in San Juan County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

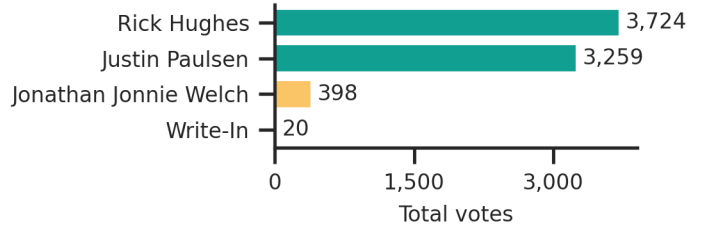

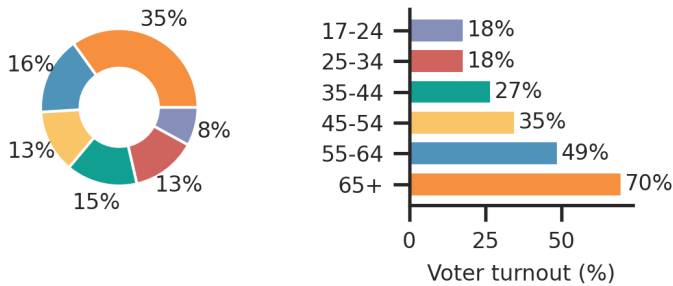

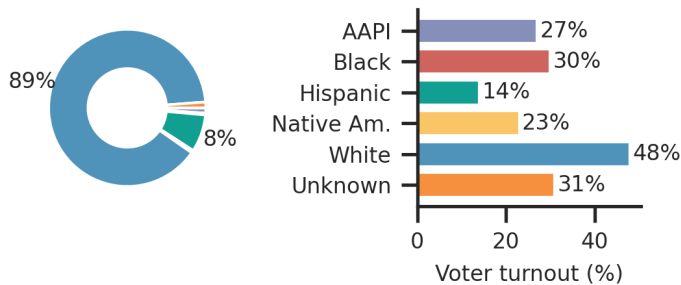

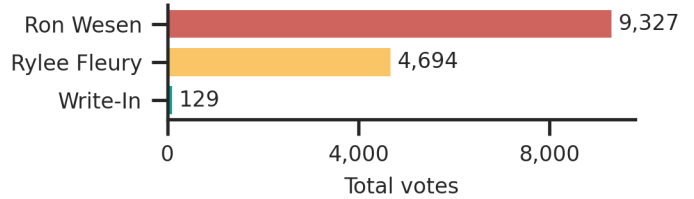


**Fig 6.7 | Voter turnout in Skagit County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

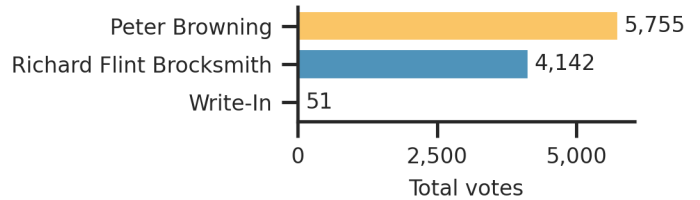

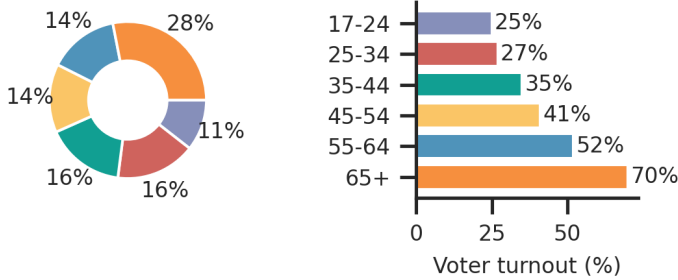

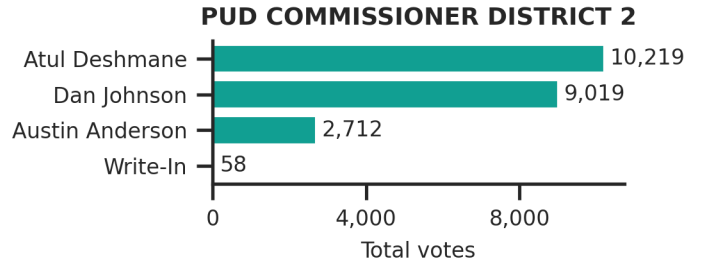

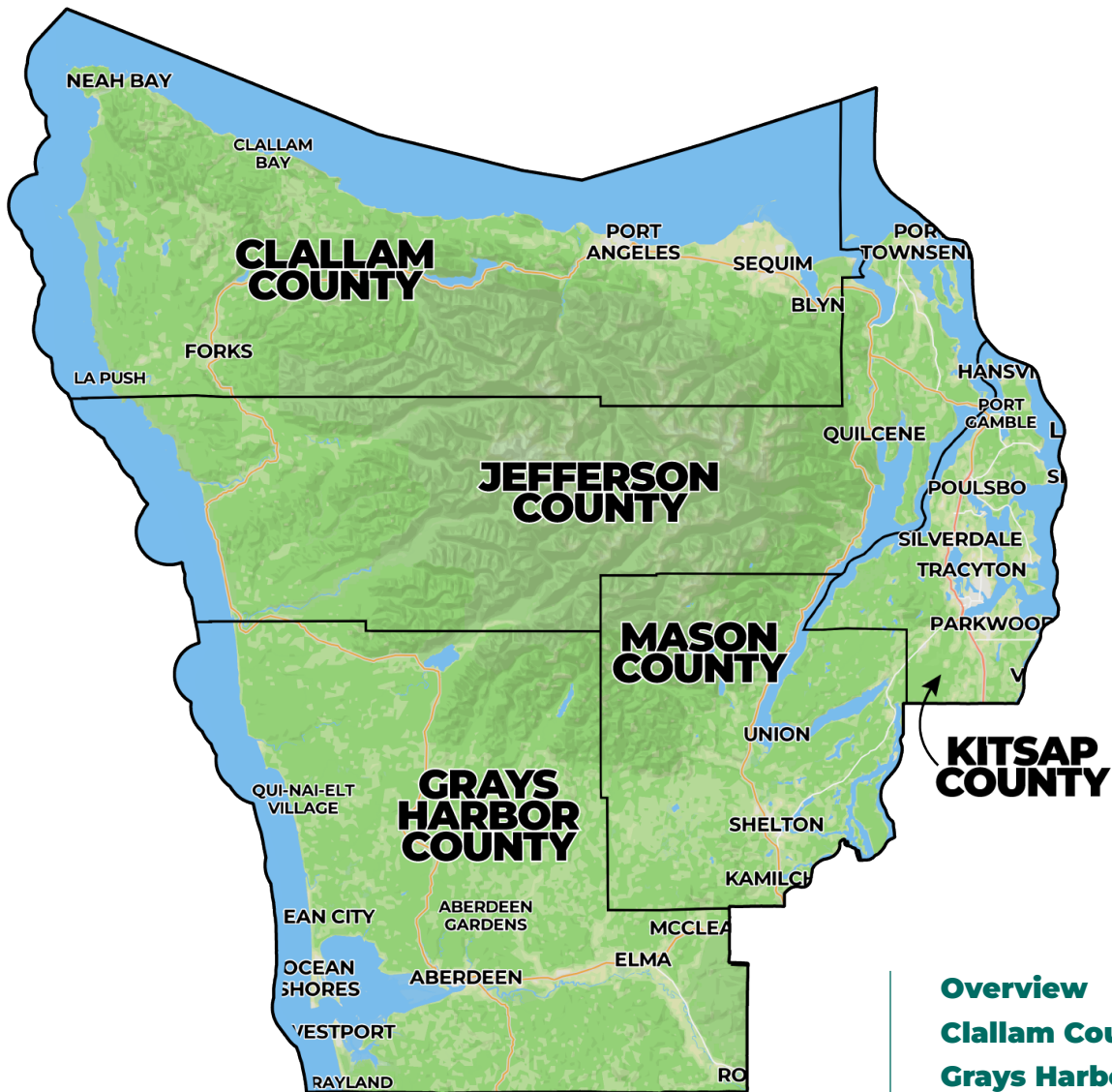

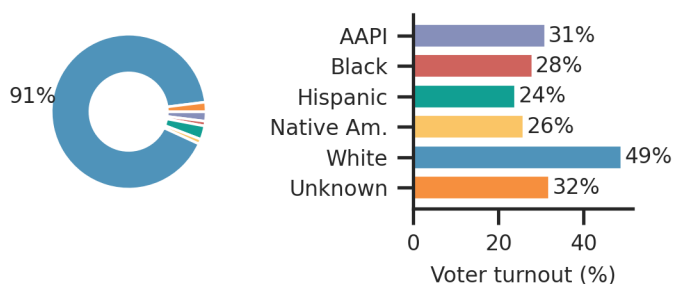

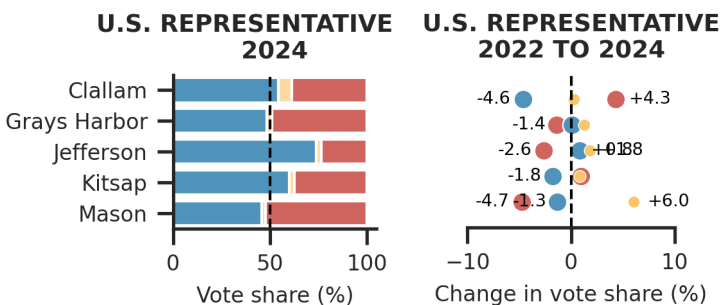
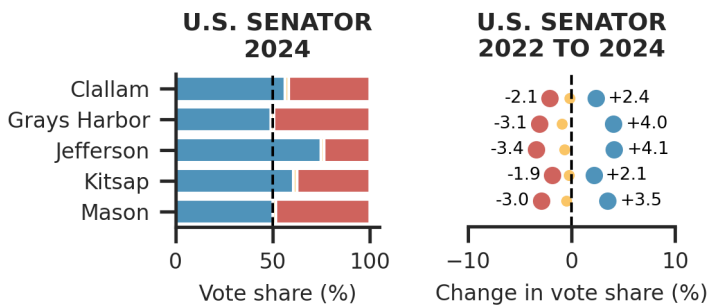
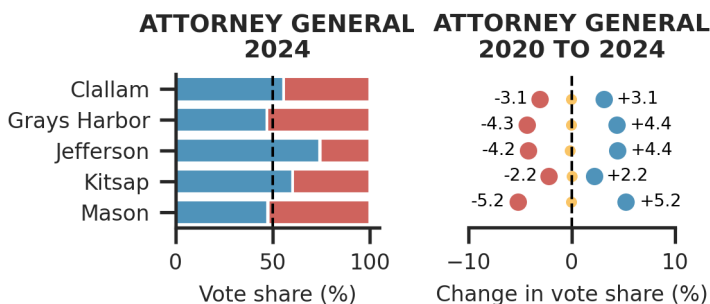
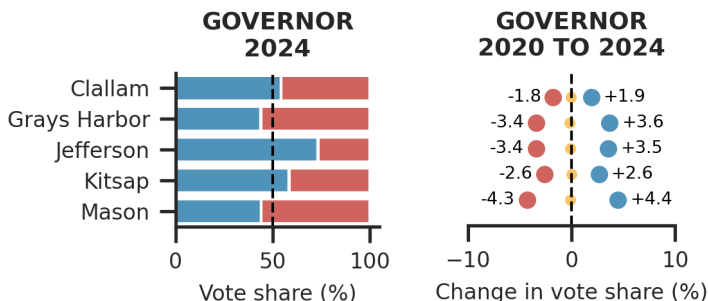

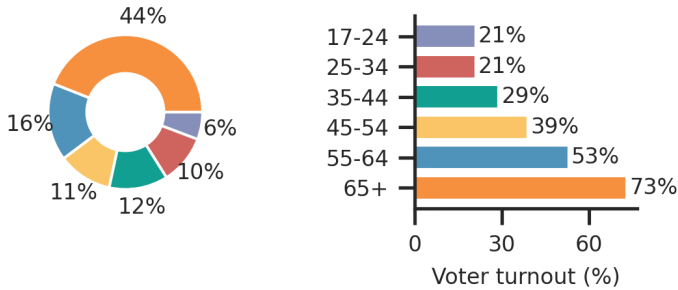

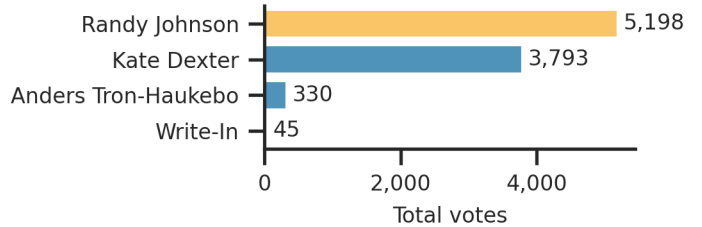


**Fig 7.3 | Voter turnout in Clallam County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

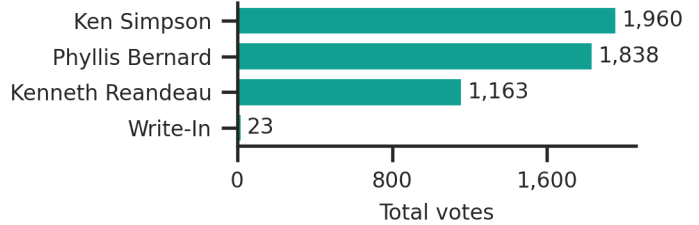

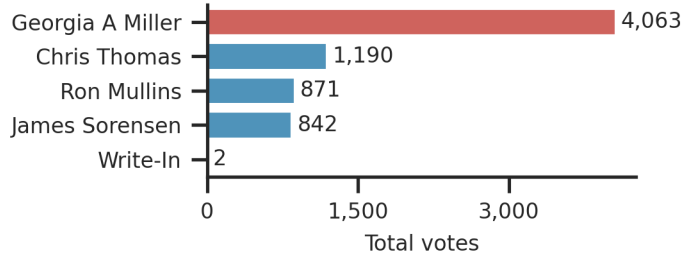


**Fig 7.5 | Voter turnout in Grays Harbor County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

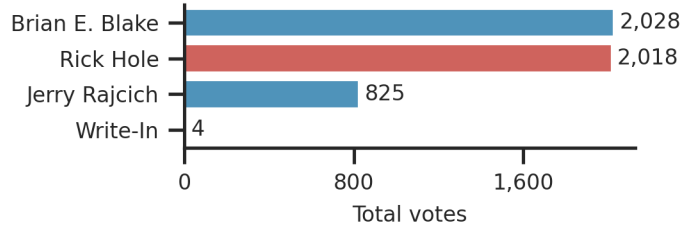

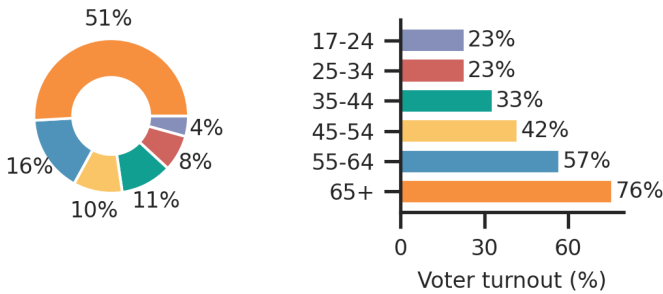

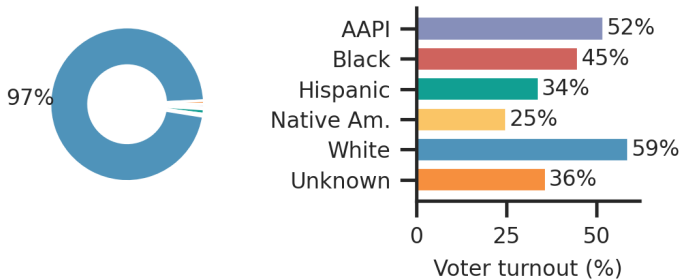

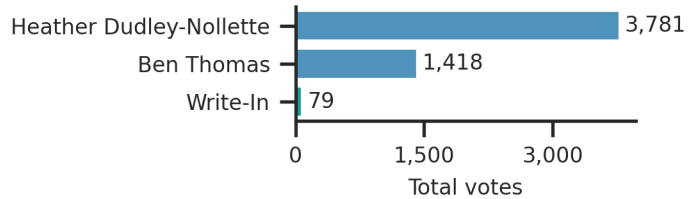


**Fig 7.7 | Voter turnout in Jefferson County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

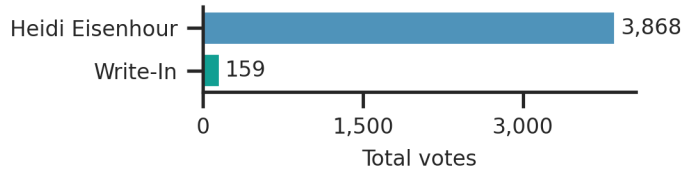

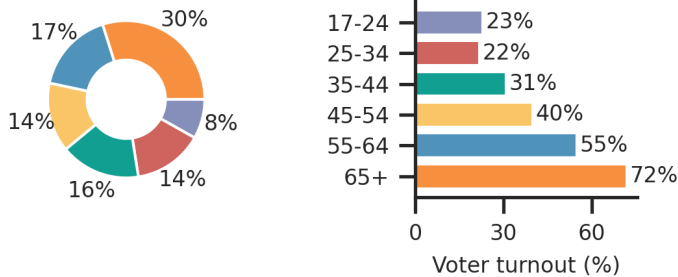

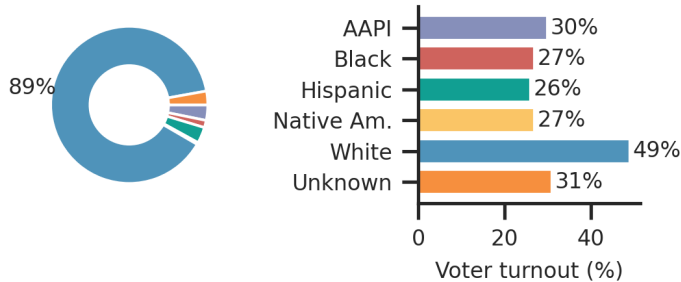

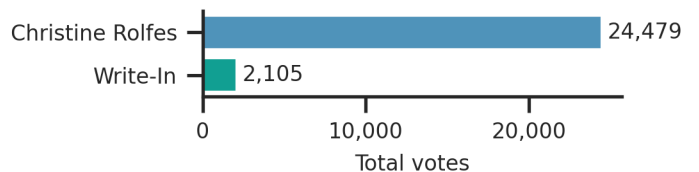


**Fig 7.9 | Voter turnout in Kitsap County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

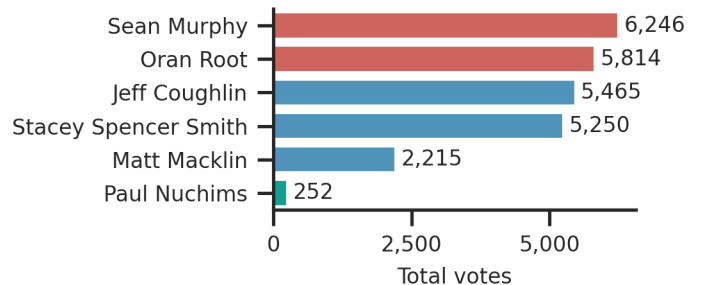

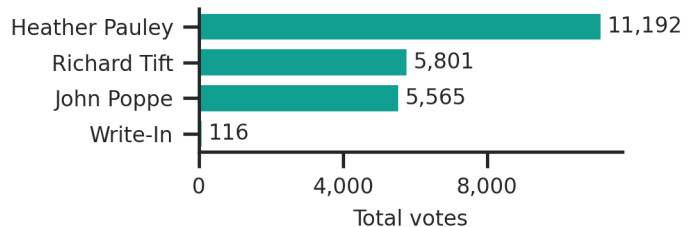

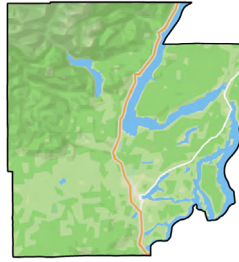
**Fig 7.10 | Election results in Kitsap County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

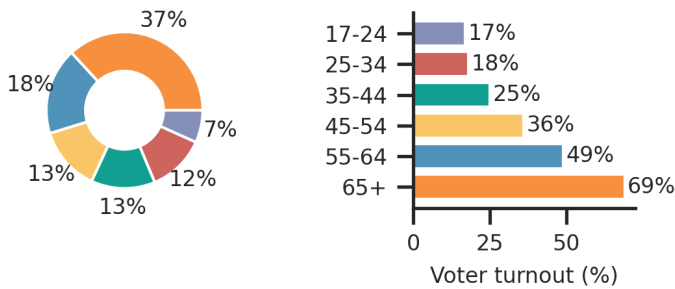

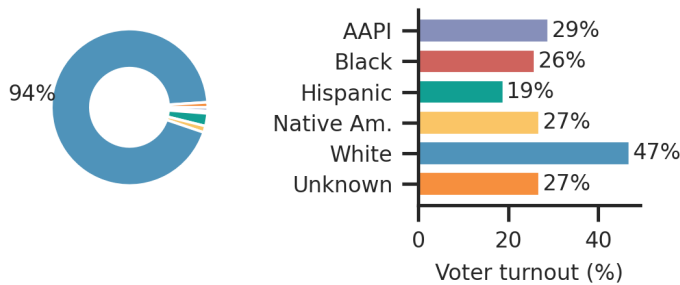

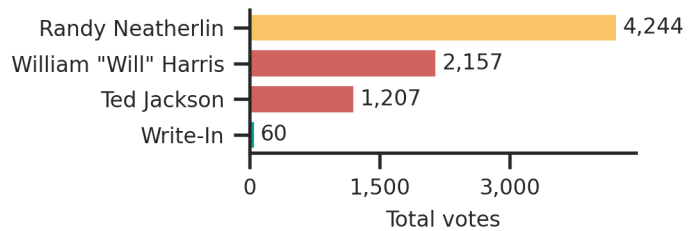


**Fig 7.11 | Voter turnout in Mason County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

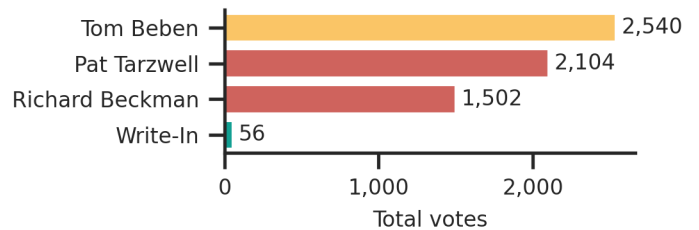

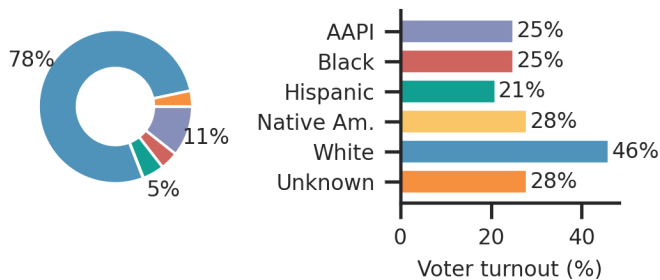

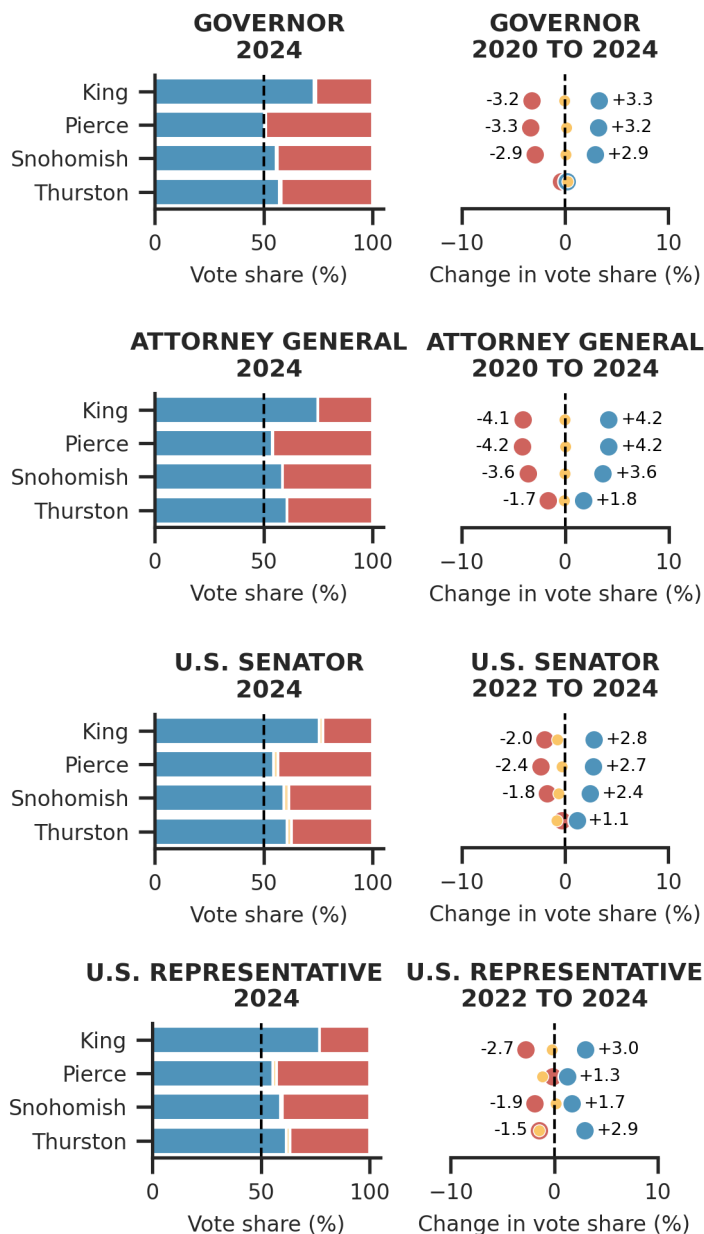


**Fig 8.1 | Voter turnout in the Puget Sound for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

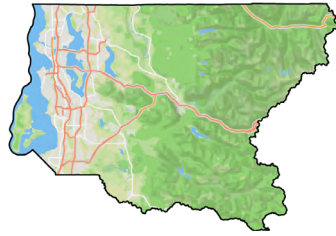


**Fig 8.2 | Election results in the Puget Sound for the 2024 Primary Election.** (left) Results were aggregated by party for statewide and federal races, and (right) the relative change in vote share was calculated (versus 2020 or 2022).

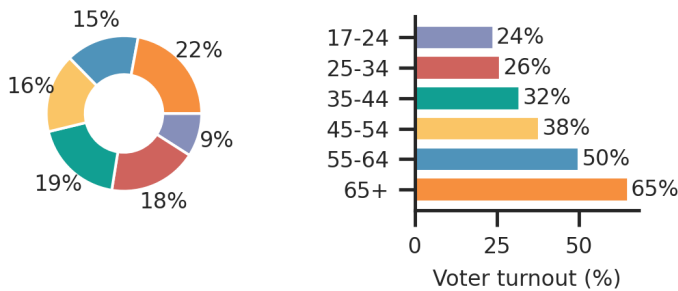

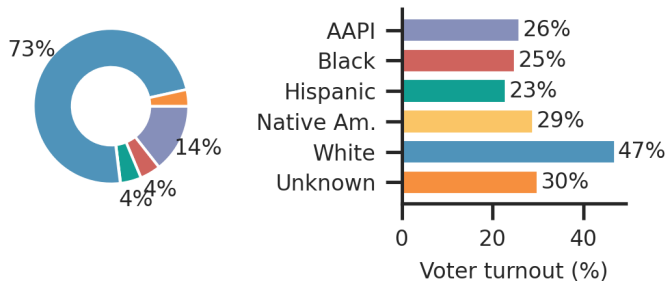

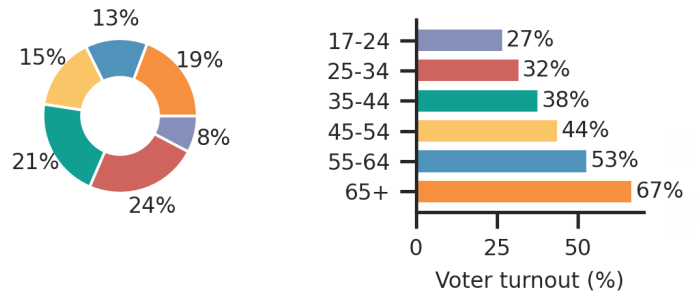
**Fig 8.3 | Voter turnout in King County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.



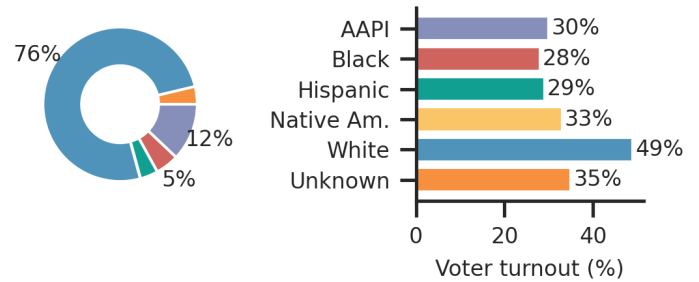

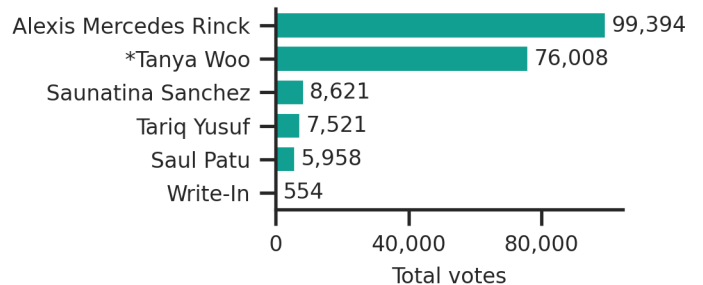


**Fig 8.4 | Voter turnout in Seattle for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

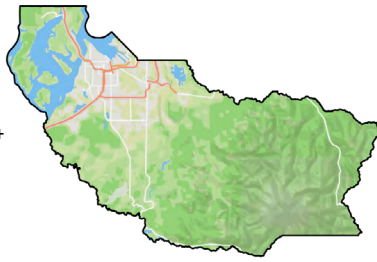


**Fig 8.5 | Election results in Seattle for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election for Seattle's non-partisan citywide council seat.

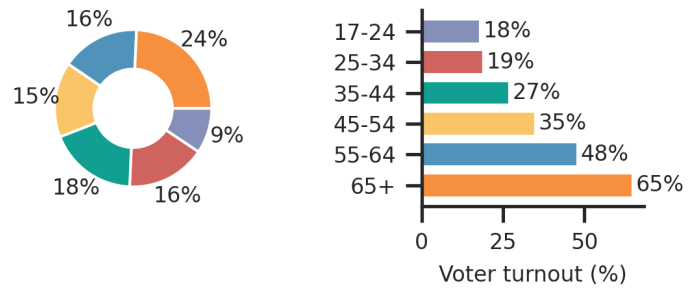

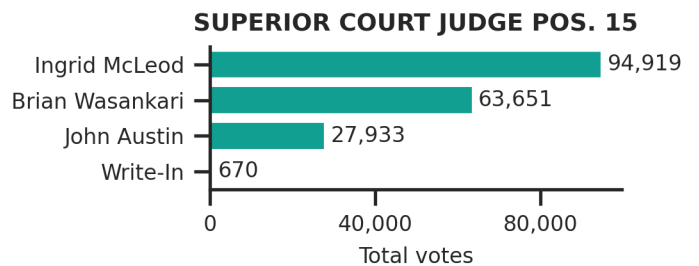
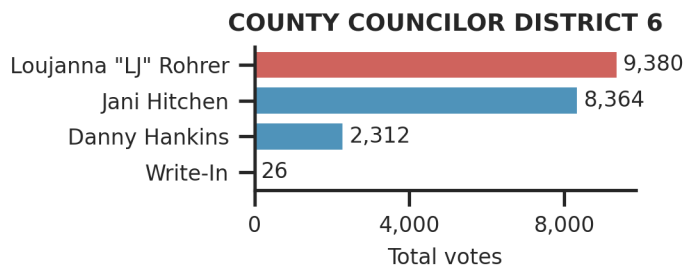
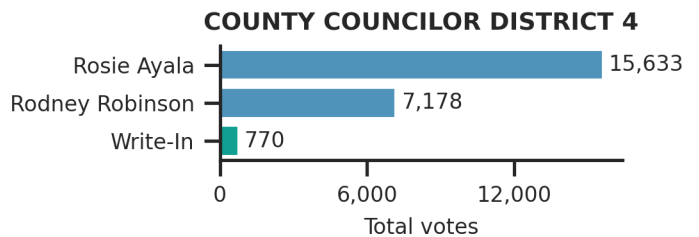
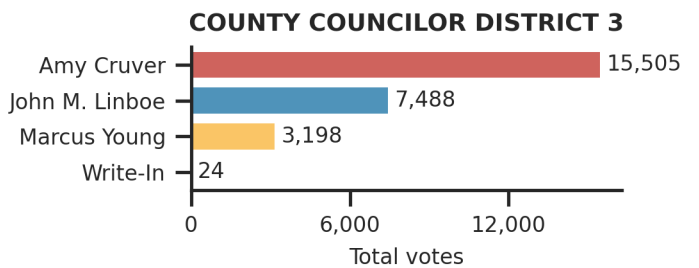
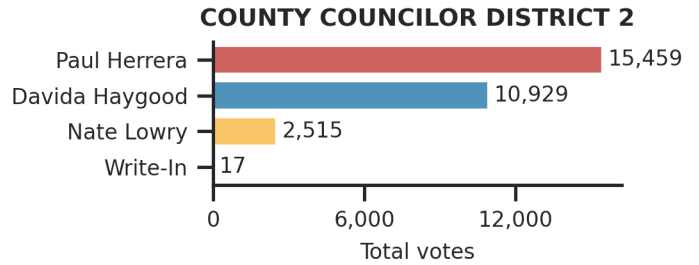
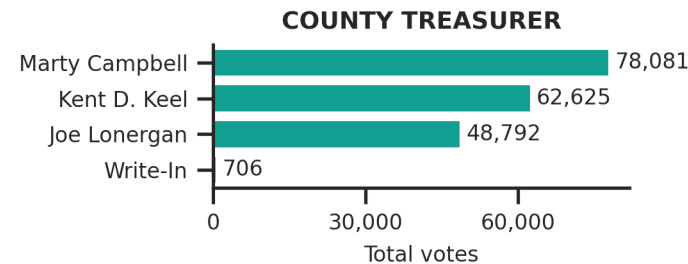
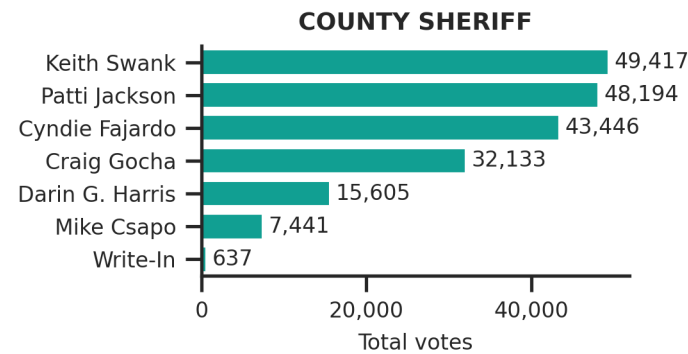
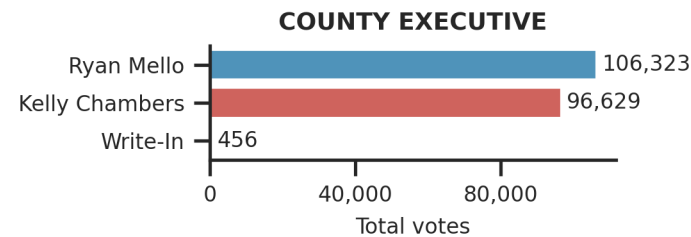


**Fig 8.6 | Voter turnout in Pierce County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

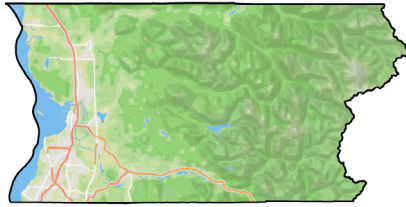


**Fig 8.7 | Election results in Pierce County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

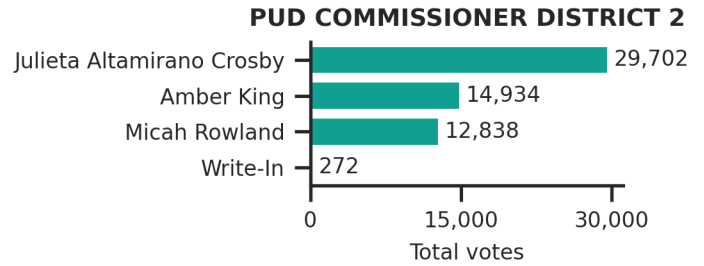

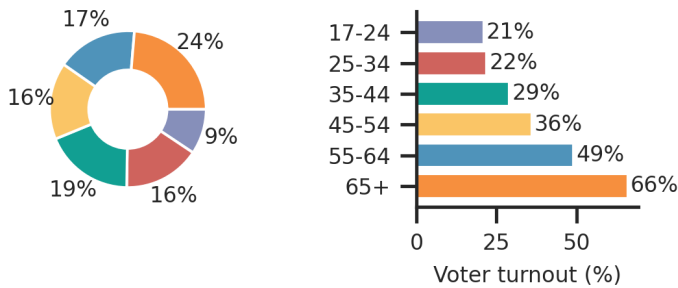

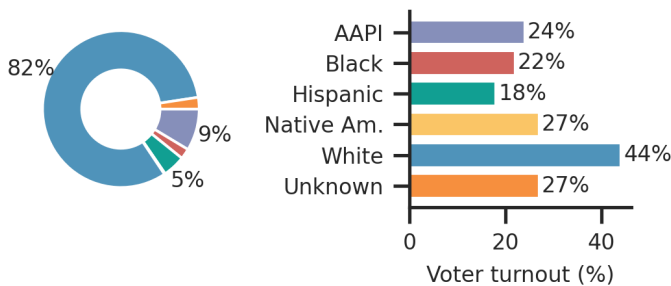


**Fig 8.9 | Election results in Snohomish County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates will face-off in the General Election (non-partisan office).

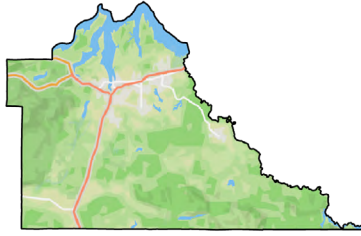


**Fig 8.8 | Voter turnout in Snohomish County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

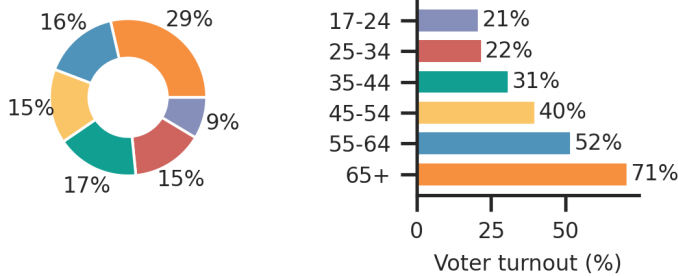

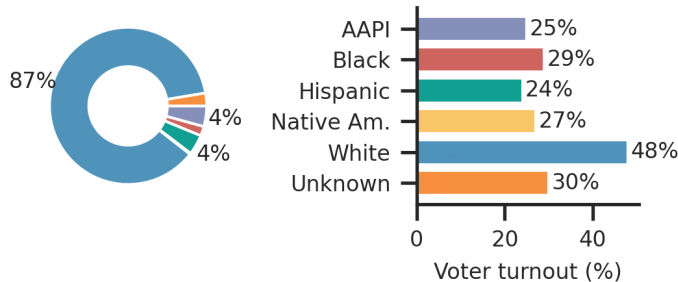

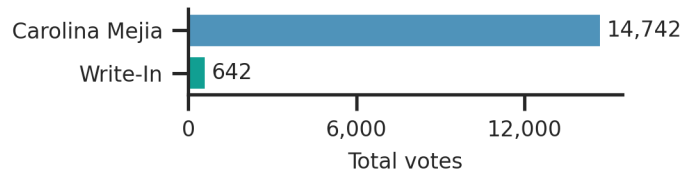


**Fig 8.10 | Voter turnout in Thurston County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

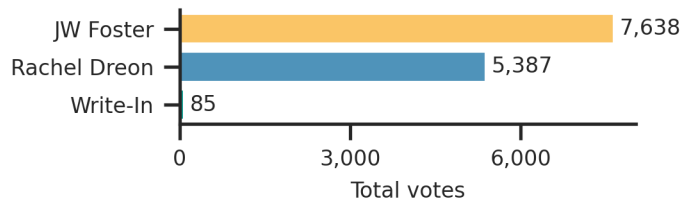

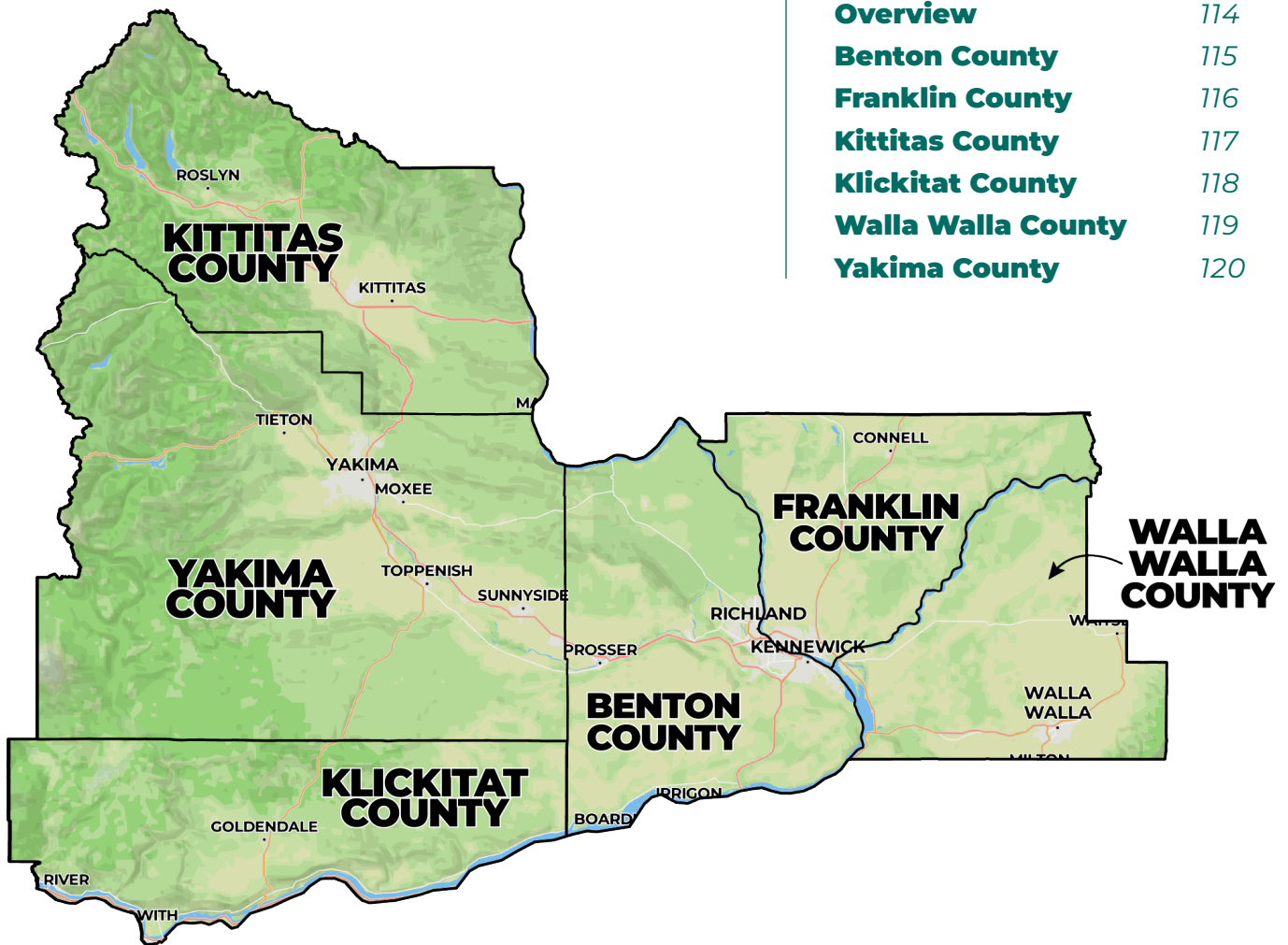

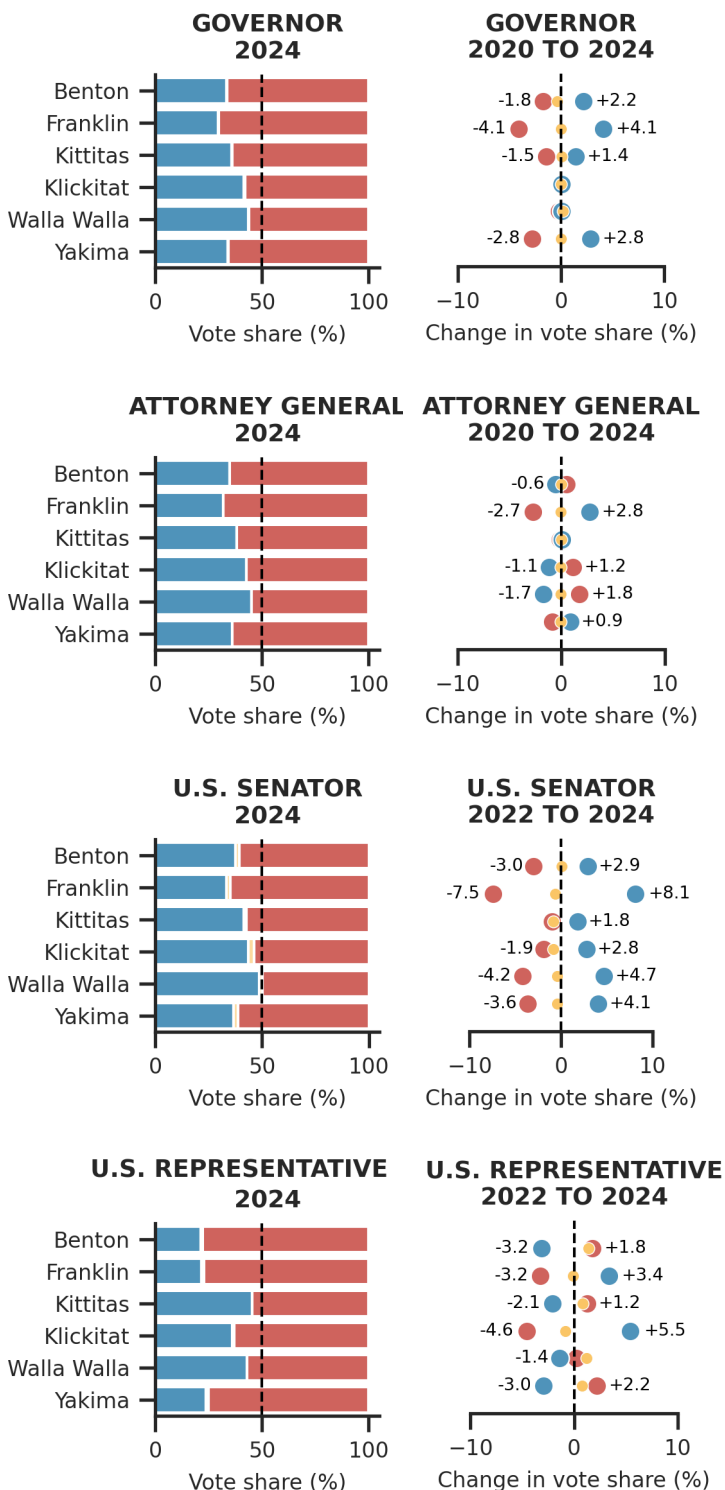


**Fig 9.1 | Voter turnout in South Central WA for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

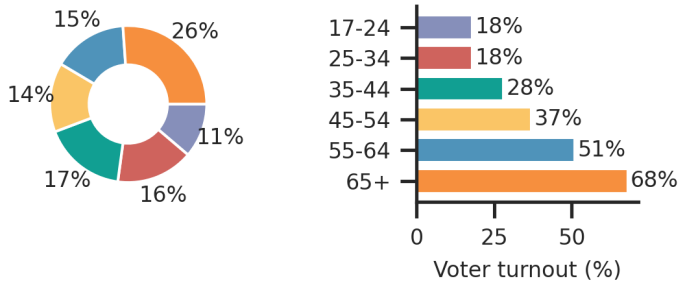

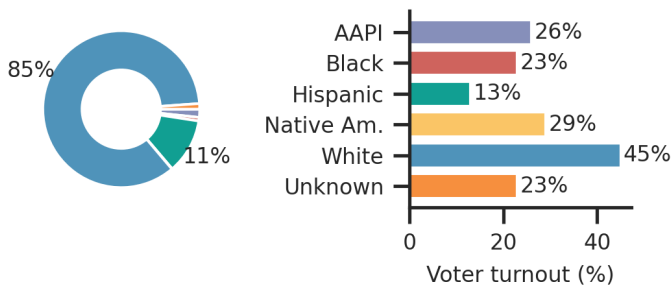

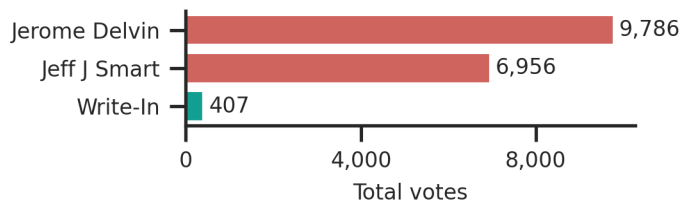


**Fig 9.3 | Voter turnout in Benton County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

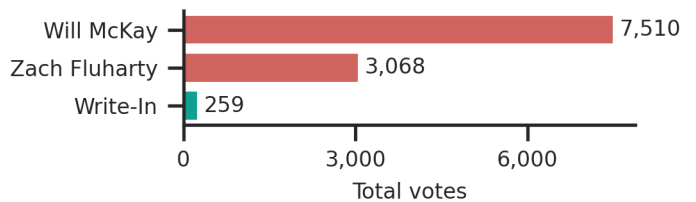

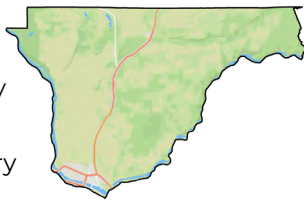


**Fig 9.4 | Election results in Benton County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

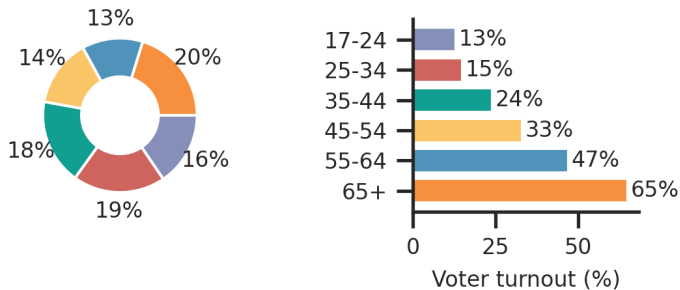

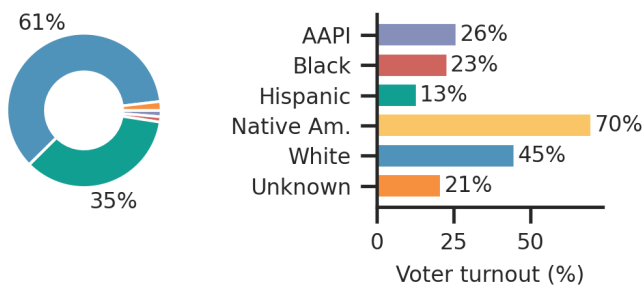

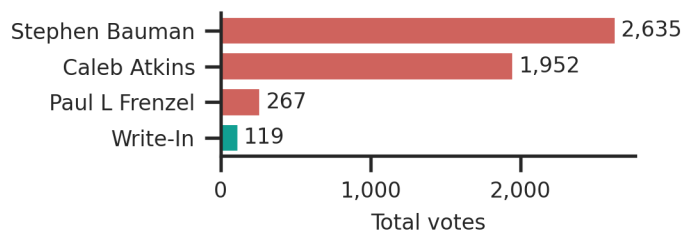


**Fig 9.5 | Voter turnout in Franklin County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

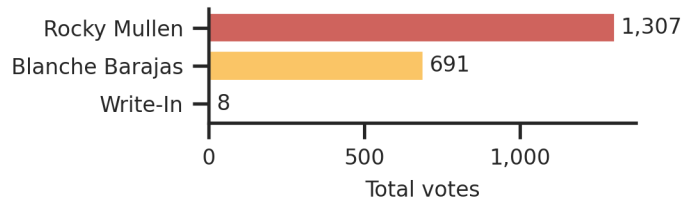

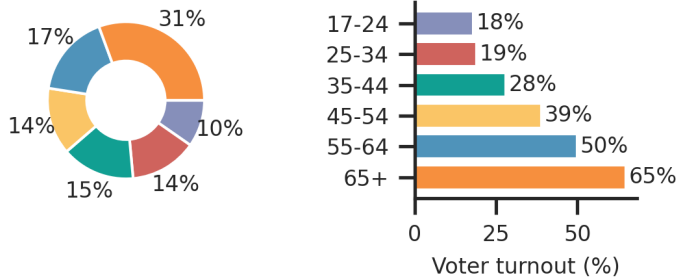

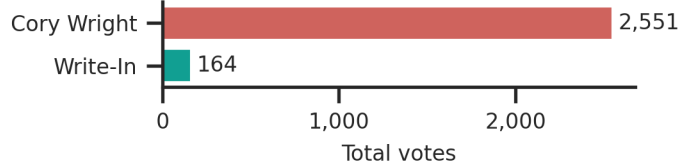


**Fig 9.7 | Voter turnout in Kittitas County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

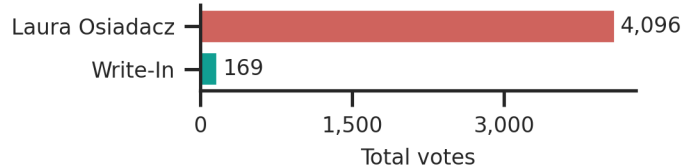

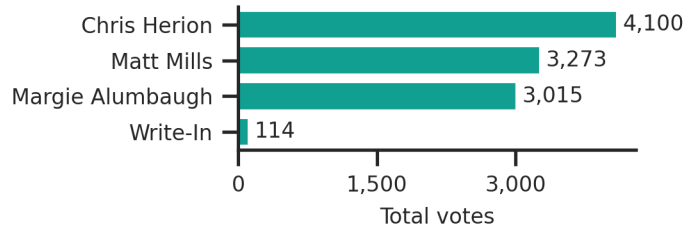

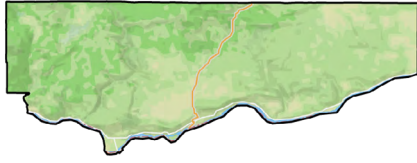


**Fig 9.8 | Election results in Kittitas County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

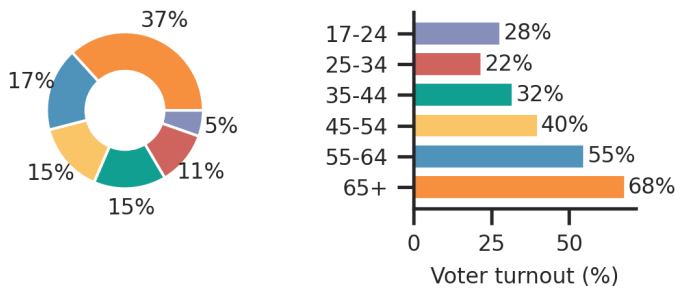

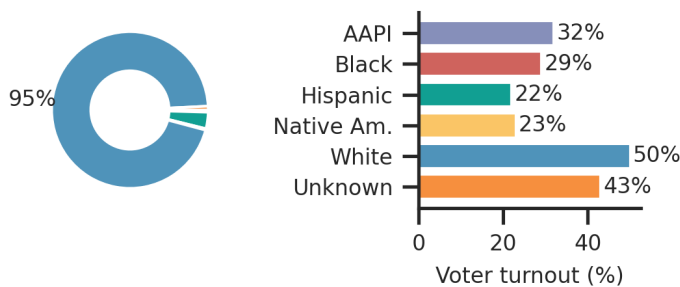

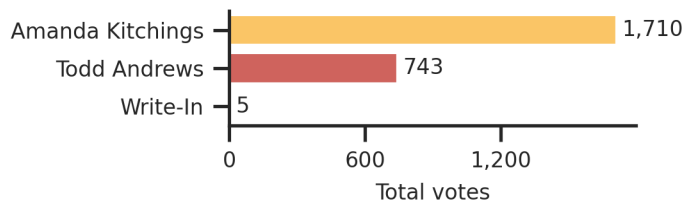


**Fig 9.9 | Voter turnout in Klickitat County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

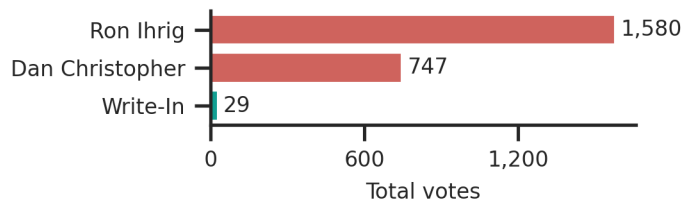

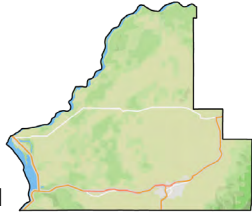


**Fig 9.10 | Election results in Klickitat County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

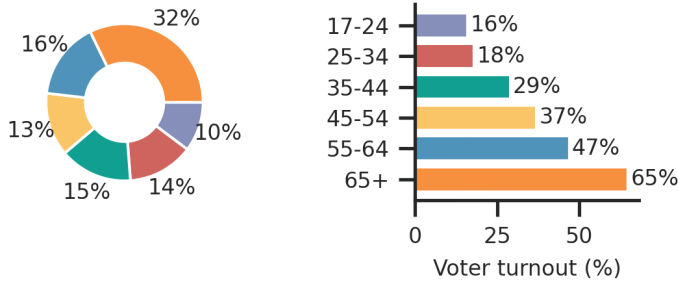

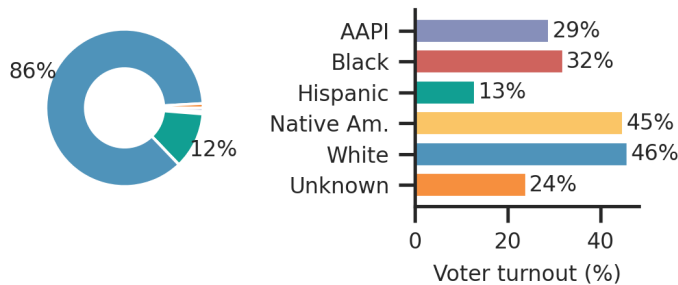

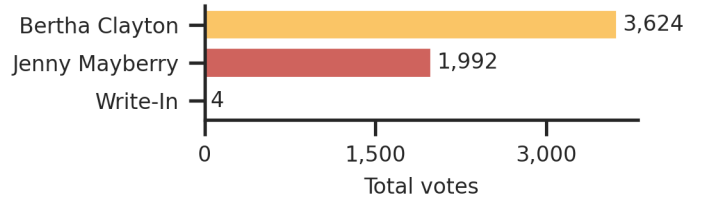


**Fig 9.11 | Voter turnout in Walla Walla County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

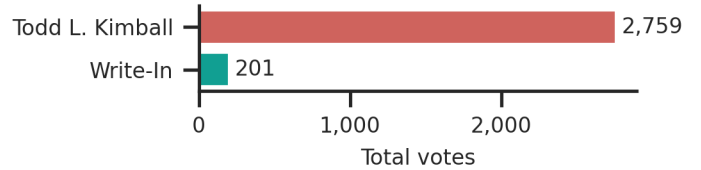

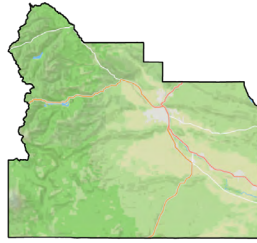


**Fig 9.12 | Election results in Walla Walla County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

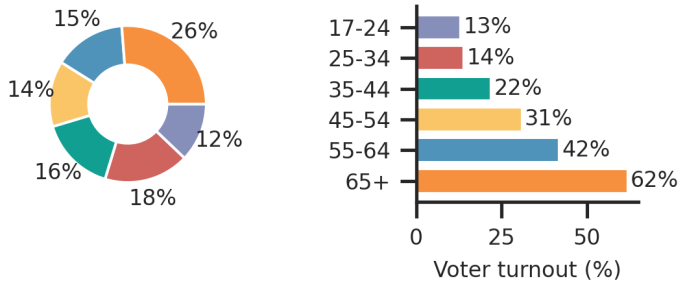

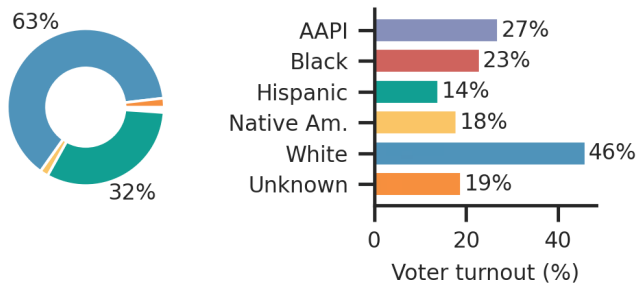

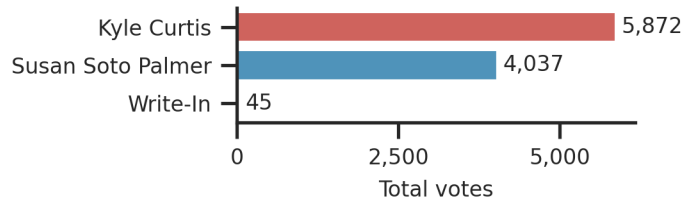


**Fig 9.13 | Voter turnout in Yakima County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

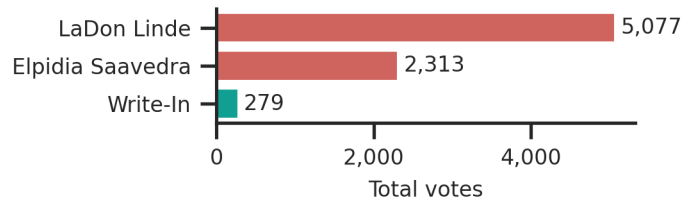

Voters in Yakima County cast their ballots for two races in the 2024 Primary Election: Kyle Curtis (R) finished first in the race for County Commissioner District 2 with 59.0% of the vote, followed by Susan Soto Palmer (D) with 40.6% of the vote; LaDon Linde (R) finished first in the race for County Commissioner District 3 with 66.2% of the vote, followed by Elpidia Saavedra (R) with 30.2% of the vote.

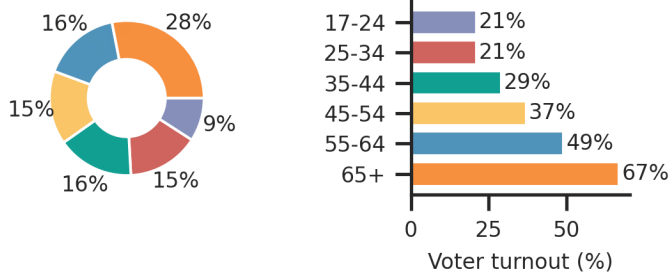

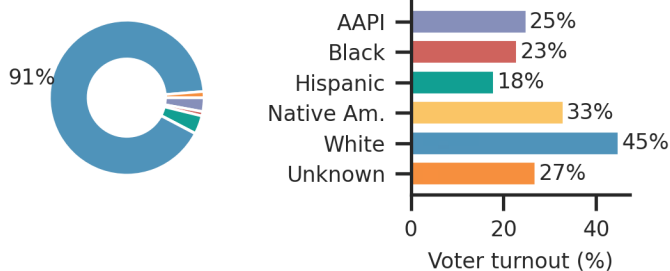
## Voter turnout

There are 471,708 registered voters in Southwestern WA, and 200,323 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (42.5%). Turnout was 0.9% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 0.3% higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 25.8% of the electorate (121,571 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 28.4% lower than older voters (21.4% vs 49.8%). Voters of color comprise 9.3% of the electorate, and turnout of voters of color was 22.2% lower than White voters (22.3% vs 44.5%). 180,177 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 48,404 young voters and 16,857 voters of color.

### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY RACE

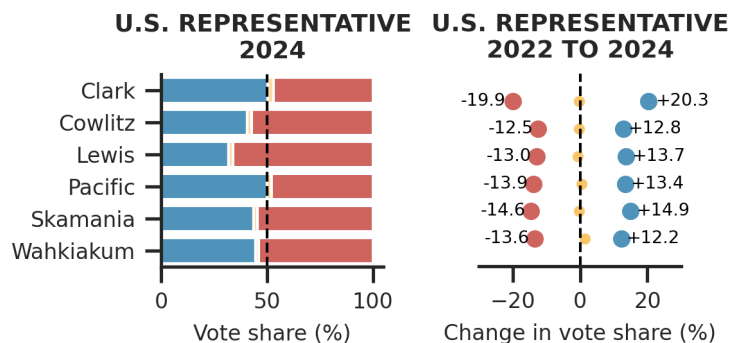
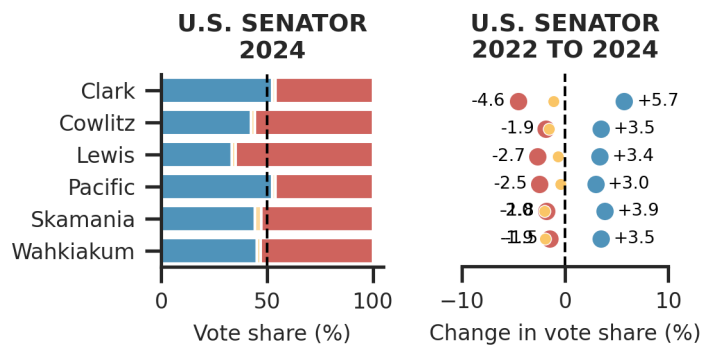
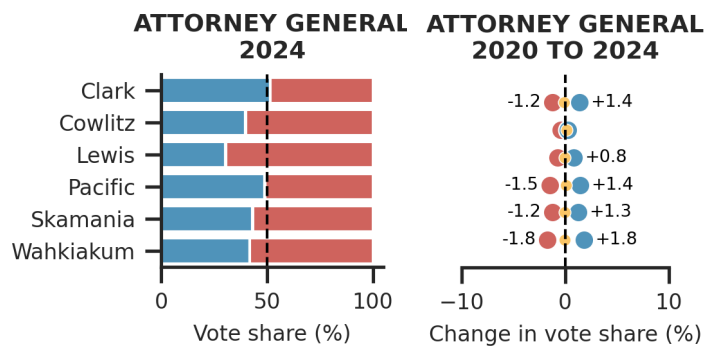
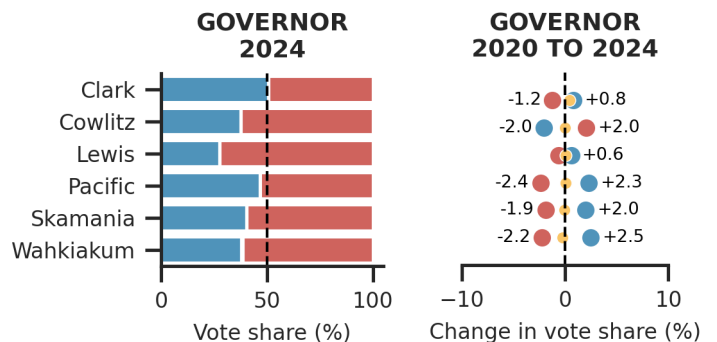


**Fig 10.1 | Voter turnout in Southwestern WA for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

## Election results

Across all statewide and federal races, Democratic candidates received the majority of votes in Clark and Pacific counties, while Republican candidates received the majority of the vote in the rest of Southwestern WA. Overall, Southwestern WA swung more in favor of Democratic candidates than any other region: Democratic candidates for statewide office increased their vote share by ~2%, candidates for U.S. Senate increased their vote share by ~3.5%, and Marie Gluesenkamp Perez – the sole

Democratic candidate running for congress in the 3rd CD – increased her vote share by ≥12% in every county.

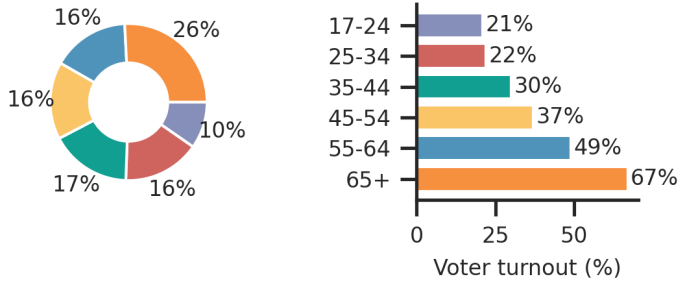

## Voter turnout

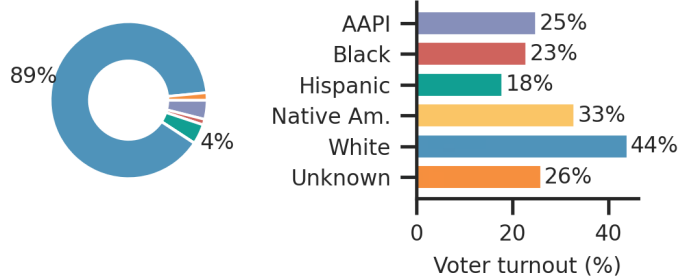
There are 319,572 registered voters in Clark County, and 132,694 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (41.5%). Turnout was 0.9% higher than the 2020 Primary Election and 0.4% higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 27.3% of the electorate in Clark County (87,166 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 27.0% lower than older voters (21.9% vs 48.9%). Voters of color comprise 11.1% of the electorate in Clark County, and turnout of voters of color was 21.3% lower than White voters (22.6% vs 43.9%). 123,571 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 34,643 young voters and 13,864 voters of color.

### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY RACE

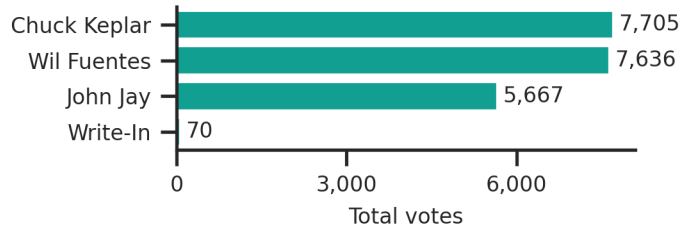


**Fig 10.3 | Voter turnout in Clark County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

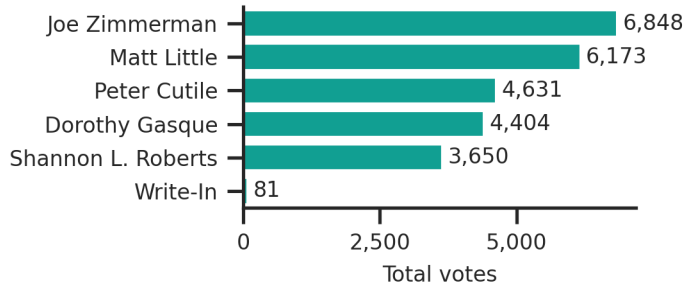
## Election results

Voters in Clark County cast their ballots for three races in the 2024 Primary Election: Chuck Keplar finished first in the race for County Councilor District 3 with 36.6% of the vote, followed by Wil Fuentes with 36.2% of the vote and John Jay with 26.9% of the vote; Joe Zimmerman finished first in the race for County Councilor District 4 with 26.6% of the vote, followed by Matt Little with 23.9% of the vote, Peter Cutile with 18.0% of the vote, Dorothy Gasque with 17.1% of the vote, and Shannon L. 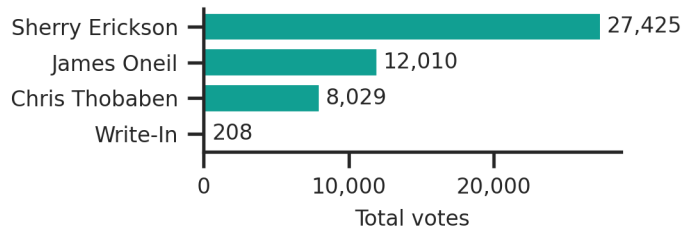

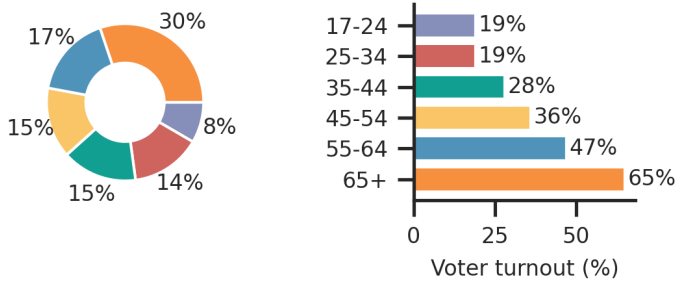
# Cowlitz County

## Voter turnout

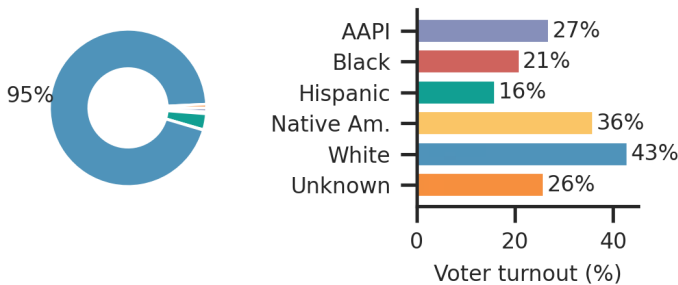
There are 70,383 registered voters in Cowlitz County, and 29,205 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (41.5%). Turnout was 4.9% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 0.9% lower than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 24.5% of the electorate in Cowlitz County (17,221 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 29.1% lower than older voters (19.5% vs 48.6%). Voters of color comprise 5.6% of the electorate in Cowlitz County, and turnout of voters of color was 22.8% lower than White voters (20.0% vs 42.8%). 27,488 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 7,022 young voters and 1,451 voters of color.

### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY RACE

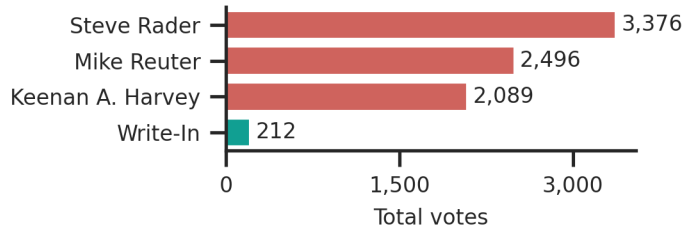


**Fig 10.5 | Voter turnout in Cowlitz County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

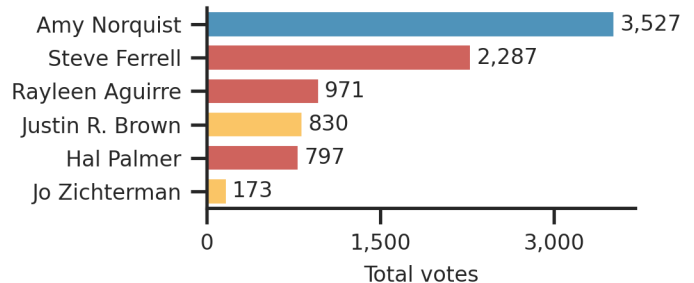

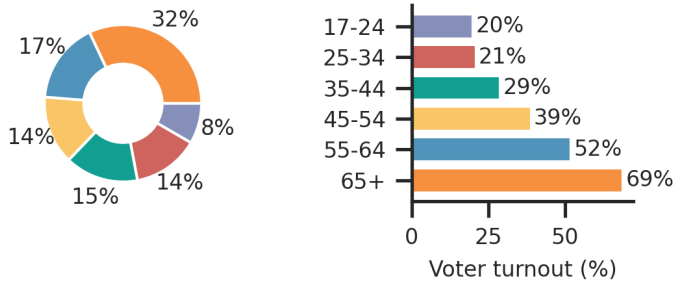

## Voter turnout

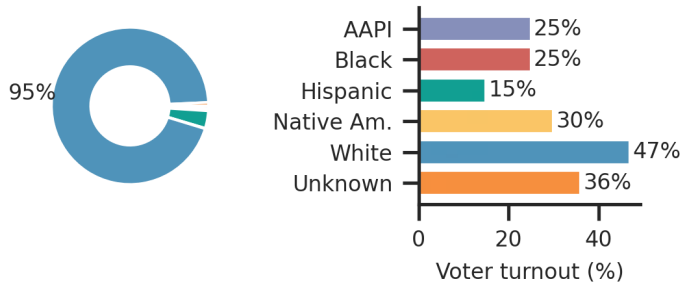
There are 53,582 registered voters in Lewis County, and 24,350 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (45.4%). Turnout was 6.9% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 1.9% higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 23.5% of the electorate in Lewis County (12,602 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 32.0% lower than older voters (21.0% vs 53.0%). Voters of color comprise 5.6% of the electorate in Lewis County, and turnout of voters of color was 27.0% lower than White voters (20.0% vs 47.0%). 19,591 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 5,016 young voters and 1,119 voters of color.

### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY RACE

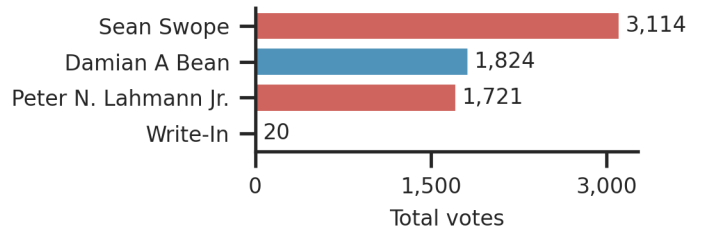


**Fig 10.7 | Voter turnout in Lewis County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

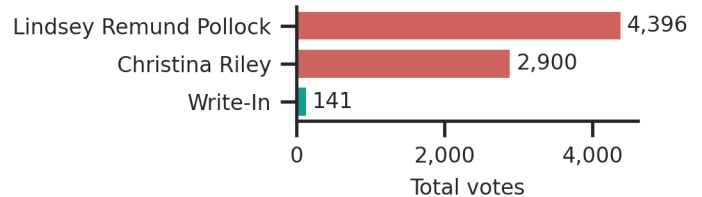

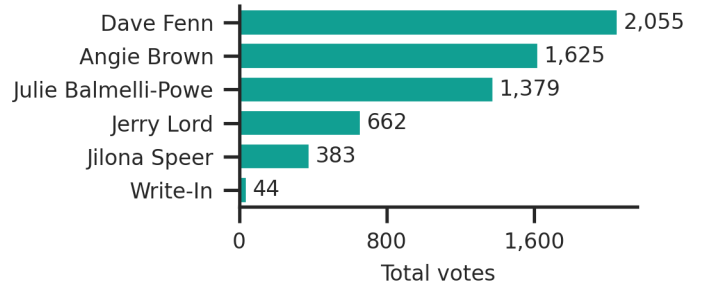

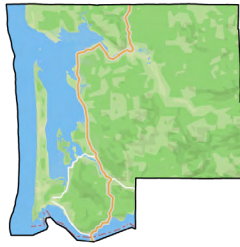


**Fig 10.8 | Election results in Lewis County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

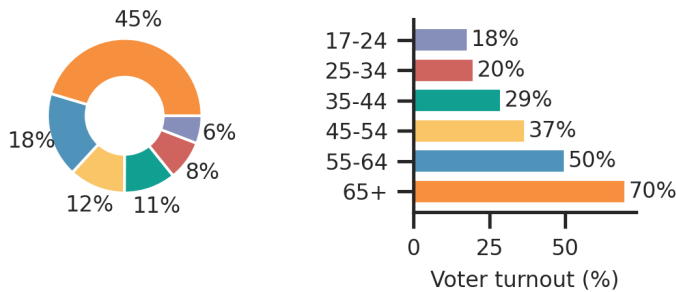
# Pacific County

## Voter turnout

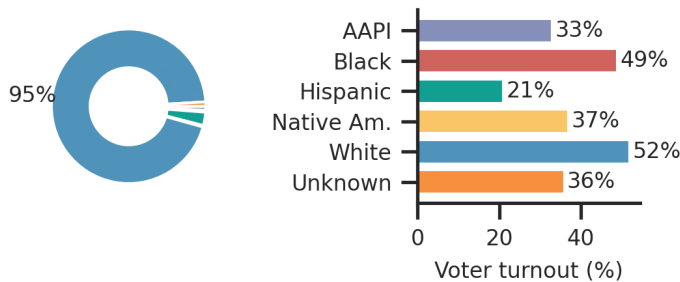
There are 16,208 registered voters in Pacific County, and 8,247 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (50.9%). Turnout was 0.7% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 1.4% higher than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 15.1% of the electorate in Pacific County (2,445 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 36.6% lower than older voters (19.8% vs 56.4%). Voters of color comprise 5.6% of the electorate in Pacific County, and turnout of voters of color was 24.7% lower than White voters (27.6% vs 52.3%). 5,294 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 865 young voters and 276 voters of color.



### REGISTERED VOTERS & TURNOUT BY AGE



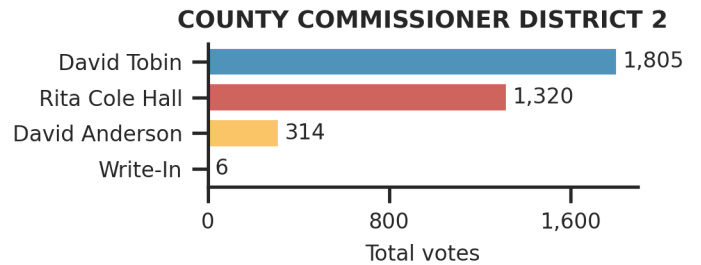
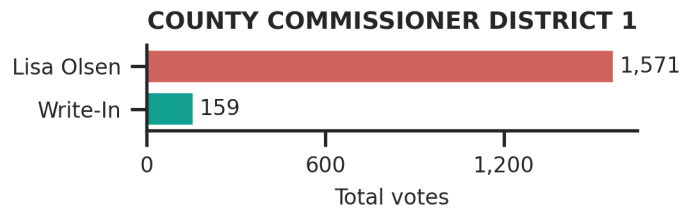

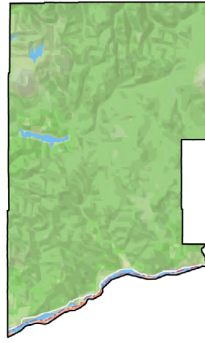


**Fig 10.10 | Election results in Pacific County for the 2024 Primary Election.** The top two candidates in each race will face-off in the General Election. Bars are color-coded by candidates' declared party preference.

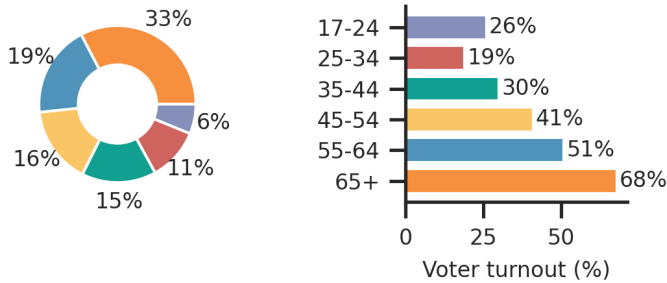

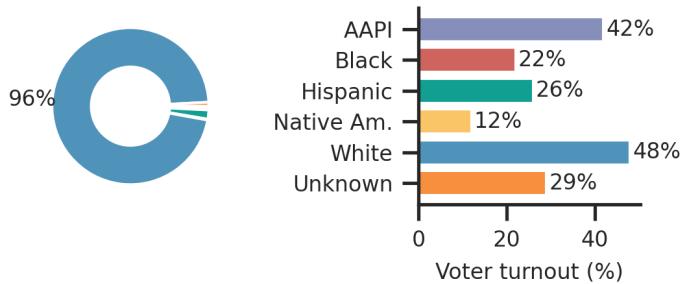
There are 8,562 registered voters in Skamania County, and 4,021 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (47.0%). Turnout was 1.5% higher than the 2020 Primary Election and 6.2% lower than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 18.4% of the electorate in Skamania County (1,578 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 31.2% lower than older voters (21.5% vs 52.7%). Voters of color comprise 3.7% of the electorate in Skamania County, and turnout of voters of color was 19.6% lower than White voters (28.1% vs 47.7%). 3,161 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 667 young voters and 119 voters of color.

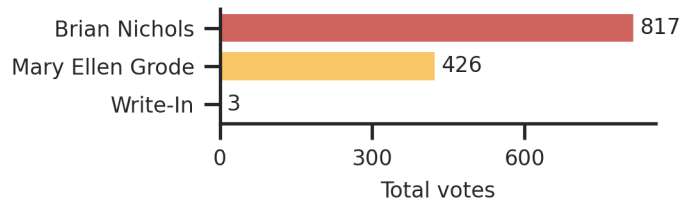


**Fig 10.11 | Voter turnout in Skamania County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (left) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (right) show voter turnout by age or race.

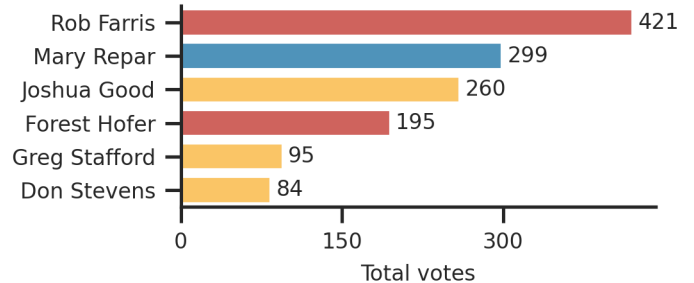

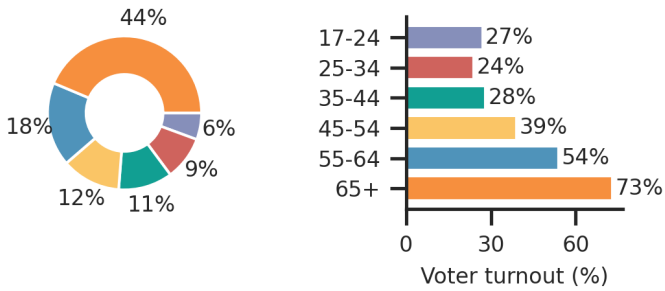

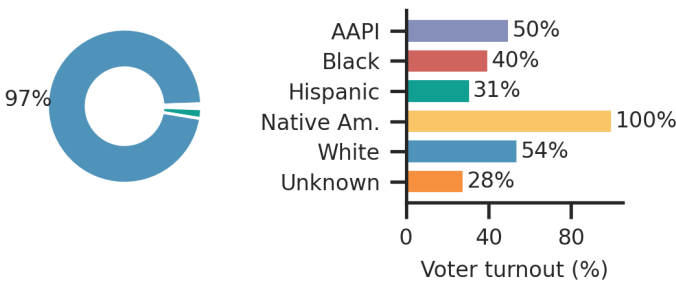
There are 3,401 registered voters in Wahkiakum County, and 1,806 voted in the 2024 Primary Election (53.1%). Turnout was 2.5% lower than the 2020 Primary Election and 2.2% lower than the 2022 Primary Election. Young voters make up 16.4% of the electorate in Wahkiakum County (559 voters under 35), and turnout of young voters was 33.8% lower than older voters (24.9% vs 58.7%). Voters of color comprise 3.4% of the electorate in Wahkiakum County, and turnout of voters of color was 20.5% lower than White voters (33.3% vs 53.8%). 1,072 voters who voted in the 2020 General Election or 2022 General Election did not vote in this election, including 191 young voters and 28 voters of color.

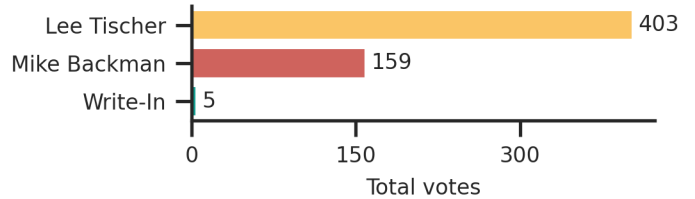


**Fig 10.13 | Voter turnout in Wahkiakum County for the 2024 Primary Election.** Pie charts (*left*) show the electorate composition, bar graphs (*right*) show voter turnout by age or race.

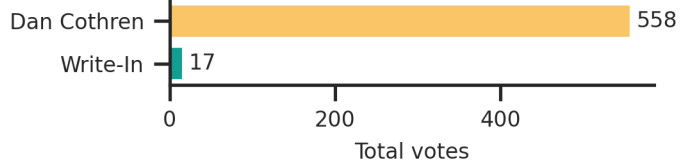

# Methodology

## Electorate & turnout

Data on Washington's population of registered voters ("electorate") was accessed via America Votes' Voter Activation Network (VAN). VAN data related to voter demographics, geography, and vote history was last updated on July 18th, 2024, so demographic data for anyone who registered to vote after that date will not be included in this report. All data processing and visualization was done using custom-written Python scripts, executed in a local Jupyter environment. Final ballot status reports ("matchbacks") for the 2024 Primary Election were downloaded from the Secretary of State's website, and voter ID's were mapped onto voter data from the VAN to update vote history data for these elections. To correct for any incomplete geographic information in the voter file, voters' precinct information was mapped onto corresponding district information (county council district, city, city council district, school district), and any missing values were updated.

Data on voters' age and sex were provided from the voter file, and data on voters' race was provided by Catalist, using mathematical modeling with census tract-level demographic data and a variety of other sources. Although extensively validated and highly accurate, modeled data is never 100% accurate, so there are minor inaccuracies in individual-level race data in the voter file; this should be considered when interpreting results and analyses of voter data accessed from the VAN. Race data is particularly inaccurate for Native American voters, who are far more likely to report multiracial identities in the U.S. Census. In general, these individuals are categorized as "Unknown", so the true count of Native Americans in Washington State likely includes some percentage of those folks. For some broader analyses of voting behavior and outreach impact, data on age and race was used to further categorize voters as "Young" (age = 18-34) or "Older" (age ≥ 35) and "BIPOC" (race = Black, AAPI, Hispanic, Native American, or Unknwon) or "White" (race = White). "New voters" are those who registered to vote for the first time since 1/1/2024.

## Voter outreach

Data on outreach work done by WCA Data Hub partners from June 1st, 2024 through August 15th, 2024 was accessed via America Votes' VAN (c4 outreach) and State Voices' VAN (c3 outreach). Voter IDs were used to map data related to outreach with the preprocessed voter file to allow detailed analyses. Only data collected by WCA Data Hub partners and returned to the VAN by August 15th, 2024 was included in this report, so the extent of voter engagement work may not be fully represented herein.

## Election results

Results for the 2024 Primary Election were downloaded from the Washington Secretary of State's website, and processed and visualized using custom-written Python scripts. Data on the current incumbent for all races on the ballot this year was downloaded from the Secretary of State's website, and mapped onto the election results. Any incumbents running under different names than the previous time they ran (e.g., Jane M. Doe instead of Jane Doe) will be incorrectly marked as not being an incumbent. Party data for individual candidates was mapped from their self-reported "Preferred Party", and aggregated into four groups: Democratic, Republican, Independent/Other, or None (non-partisan races). For simplicity, only the top eight candidates in a given race are shown on charts, though the votes from all candidates have been included in aggregation and other analyses. Throughout this report, vote totals for candidates will be color-coded based on party affiliation. Although this report will focus on overall results, precinct-level results can be found in the Washington [Primary Election Dashboard](#), WCA's interactive tool for viewing and exploring election results.
